#### In spite of the Covid CEI continues to operate...



On March 22, 2020, due to the pandemic, all schools were closed in Oaxaca, including CEI. In mid-May, operating on limited time, the staff was allowed back into the center to plan and organize for the balance of the school year. There were many changes: we operated under limited circumstances with closed doors as our beneficiaries came to the center mainly for administrative reasons; no food could be served in our dining room; cubicles had to be built in the offices and the computer room to separate and protect staff and students; registration began in late July and continued into August as all reports from schools were delayed; some laptops and tablets were loaned to students and some phones were given out as students

available, Monday through Saturday for students living nearby who are having difficulties remotely assisting their classes due to the absence of internet or data reception in their homes. Except for these students, no one else has been allowed in the building except for specific reasons. Because of the virus and serious health issues, loss of work and cut salaries, families were given a bag of groceries (12 items) and some financial support to assist needs. Up through November, each family has received eight bags. We thank all the sponsors and donors for the generous donations to help these families this year. We are doing our best to care for our 676 children and their families during this difficult time with the pandemic.

#### One family, eight success stories...

"I would like to thank CEI on behalf of myself and my seven brothers and sisters. Because of you, all eight of us have been educated from first grade through preparatory school and four of us have university degrees. CEI has been so helpful to us since arriving in Oaxaca and we have had wonderful sponsors. You were there for us and always willing to help. My family was living in Ojo de Agua, a small village in the Mixteca, a fairly remote region in the northeast of the state of Oaxaca. To help with family expenses, my father went to Sonora to work in the fields. After six months there, in 1984, he received word of political confrontations leading to violence in our village and he returned immediately and for safety reasons moved the family to Oaxaca for a better life. My family worked selling typical clothing in the market after arriving in Oaxaca. Being the youngest child, I always worked in the market with my family to help with family expenses. Operating a business has always interested me and in July, age 22, GPA of 85% I will graduate from the Instituto Tecnológico de Oaxaca with a degree in Business Administra-

tion. I have also studied English and French. My social service requirement of 530 hours will be in January in SEP (Secretary of Public Education). My six-month residency will be in August in Monterrey or Guadalajara. In the future I hope to work in tourism and sales in Oaxaca. Thank you, CEI, for everything. From 1986 to 2021, you have changed the lives of all eight of us in my family!"

The first Saturday of December, called LOTTERY SATURDAY, the families were invited

to the center for a program, were interviewed and they wrote letters to the Morris students. These creative and ambitious students have brought smiles and tears of joy to people who are struggling with all forms of hardships. The balance of the money that these generous students sent was given for groceries to a family where three members were recovering with covid.

- 54 new students entered the program school term 20-21.
- 34 students left the program at the end of school term as they graduated, entered the work world or relocated.
- 289 of our students are male and 387 are female. This is a change, when the program started only boys studied!

Mexican school year: September 21 - July 9 (a little shorter this year due to the pandemic). All schools are closed and all learning is done online.

Saturday clases are provided online for students needing extra help with math, Spanish and English.



February is inscription month in Mexico. This past February 110 families came to the office requesting assistance for educating their child. Home studies were completed and if the child qualified for help the name is put on the waiting list awaiting sponsor availability.





#### Christmas in Oaxaca...

The annual Three Kings Party on January 6 had to be cancelled this year to avoid group gatherings. This is the typical day the children receive their gifts from the Three Wisemen when they brought gifts to Jesus. However, a simplified version was held at front door of our center. Since we are not serving food at our center, the dining room was converted into the workshop of Santa Cliff to prepare gift bags and the balance of the center was a food prep area. A number of children were contacted each day and throughout the month of December, 628 children received their gift bags, letters and gifts from their sponsors. The elementary received a new backpack, toys, dolls, coloring books, crayolas, games, towels, basketballs, footballs, socks, soap, toothpaste, toothbrush, purses, pillows, clothing, etc., while the high school through university received hygiene bags, notebooks and pens and pencils. Each family was also contacted and one hundred families came



to the center each of the six days before Christmas and all 585 families were given a tub filled with twenty-five food items. In January each family will be given a monetary gift to defray expenses with the internet and phones expenses for distance learning. The party went on but in a different form. Everyone was so appreciative and there were many happy smiles for remembering them and helping them during this troubled time in Oaxaca. Thanks to everyone who contributed to this project to bring a brighter Christmas for these happy people!

#### Culture corner... La Rosca de Reyes

The celebration of Epiphany is a Christian holiday first celebrated in France in the 14th century before spreading to Spain and then to Latin America. Each country has their own traditions for the ritual of cutting the Rosca de Reyes (Three Kings Cake) in search of something spe-

cial. This is the traditional day children receive their gifts today in Mexico. The Rosca is a circular cake decorated with caramelized or candied fruits with a baby Jesus hidden inside the cake. The symbolism in the cake: the baby is hidden to symbolize the need to protect him from King Herod who wanted to kill all newborn, the circular cake represents eternal love and the decorative fruits symbolize distractions to protect the baby from being discovered. In Mexico, families and friends come together on the 12 days after Christmas to remember when the Wise Men or Three Kings visited the newborn baby Jesus in Bethlehem to deliver the gifts. Traditionally the Rosca is shared amongst the family and everyone takes a turn to cut a slice. Somewhere in the cake is the small plastic figure of the baby. The person who finds the baby in their slice of cake must host another get together on Febuary 2<sup>nd</sup>, Día de Candelaria, representing the day Mary took Jesus to the temple for the first time. The host must provide tamales and hot chocolate or atole for the guests. Mexicans love traditions and the reason for another fiesta!



#### Chiles in Mexico...

Mexico is the country of 64 varieties of chiles! Chiles are natural domesticated fruits of the American continent. Throughout history, chiles played an essential role in cosmology, rituals and offerings in the indigenous communities. Chiles are spicy because of the seeds inside that produce the capsaicinoids, giving chiles their pungency or burning sensation. They are full of vitamins A and C, very nutritious and used by pharmaceutical, war and beauty industries. Next to corn, the chile is the most valued ingredient in Mexican gastronomy and forms a part of national

identity since it is present in all dishes. Contrary to beliefs, the shape or color does not decide the spicy heat, it is the seeds inside. Many people think that chiles have one simple purpose to add heat but there are a thousand

ways to prepare them and add heaps of flavors to their many dishes. For example, a tortilla with refried beans and salsa provides a complete nutritional meal. The most popular chiles are the serrano (most popular in flavoring salsas), jalapeño (most versatile), guajillo, ancho, pasilla, habanero (most spicy and hot), de arbol and manzano. As the Mexicans say, "si no pica no sabe", "if it is not hot, there is no flavor." Without chiles, Mexicans do not believe they are eating!





#### "They had a dream..."

Harold and Jodi Bauman visited Oaxaca for the first time in July, 1985. The first evening, eating dinner in a downtown café, they met Ruben, a nine-year old boy asking for food. Due to political violence in his village, six hours away, the father was killed and the family had to flee and came to Oaxaca. With no place to live and no money, the



street was the only way to make a living by begging and selling something to survive. Many families were arriving daily due to the violence and no place to go. The Bauman's decided that they would offer their assistance trying to get the children into schools so that with an education they would have a better future. A small office was set up near the center of town to assist families and children which we outgrew very quickly. By 1994, there were 70 children being helped and more financial help was needed. So an individual student sponsorship program was implemented and each year the sponsor contributed to assist their child. We moved to another building where the first kindergarten was started, a daily meal was served, shower facilities available and families could be attended. We added Food Harvest for all students as teachers were complaining as our students were fainting and falling asleep in classes due to the lack of nutrition. Our enrollment continued to grow and with the help of many donations, we purchased our own building and in 2000 we officially received all documentation to operate as the Centro de Esperanza Infantil in Mexico as a partner with Oaxaca Street Children Grassroots in the USA.



Over the past thirty-six years, over 850 needy children have been educated, learned to read and write, be respectful productive citizens and be mainstreamed into society, escape poverty and have a brighter future. 144 young adults have graduated from universities and vocational schools on a professional level.



With the help of a sponsor who contributes \$250 USD per year, the child is given a pair of shoes, a pair of tennis shoes, a uniform, a P.E. uniform, a backpack, school supplies and the inscription fees. In addition to other donations, a daily meal, use of the computer room, the library and extra classes and tutoring are available. The goal of CEI is to help educate children from low socio-economic backgrounds who often live in a one-room tin house, dirt floors, some without electricity, running water or modern conveniences, living in crowded conditions, living meal to meal with parents trying to survive on a daily wage of \$6.00-\$8.00 USD.
