Hi! My name is Fredy. I am 6 years old and in first grade. This is a photo of the one-room house where my mother and I live.



It is made of tin, a dirt floor, no bathroom or modern conveniences, no electricity. In fact, we don't even have a door on the house. There is only room for a bed in our house.

My father left us when I was three months old. My mother sells churros on the street to support us, but only earning \$6.00 U.S. each day, there was no money for me to go to school. We went to CEI and asked for help. Now I get to go to school! With the help of my nice sponsor, CEI gave me my shoes, tennis shoes, school uniform, P.E. clothes, school supplies, my inscription fees and a new backpack. This is how CEI helps needy kids like me. I go to school in the mornings and then I go to the CEI center and they offer other help: I have a good meal each day, I can use the computers, the library, play games and there are even tutors

who help me with homework. CEI helps all of us in so many wavs!

CEI is Fredy's second home and also to 600 other children from

various ethnic backgrounds, ranging in ages 4-25 who are enrolled in kindergarten through university level in over 40 schools in Oaxaca. Thanks to all the generous sponsors, volunteers and donors from 20 countries of the world who have the same belief in helping make a difference in the lives of needy children who want to learn, be respectful and productive citizens, be mainstreamed into society, escape poverty and have a brighter future. The sponsorship contribution of \$250 U.S. per year gives the child this opportunity to have a better life with an education.





ONE FAMILY... SIX SUCCESS STORIES

I would like to thank CEI on behalf of myself and my five brothers and sisters. Because of you, all six of us have earned university degrees. CEI has been so helpful to us and we have had such great sponsors. You were all there for us and always willing to help.

My father died when I was only a few days old, leaving my mother to raise six children and care for my ill grandmother. She supported us by selling tortillas but needed help. I am the youngest of the family. When I was seven years old in second grade primary, I too entered CEI. Since high school, like my older brothers and sisters, I also worked to help with family expenses. I worked in a cafeteria washing dishes, babysat, worked in a tortilla stand and in a grocery store. We all worked to help the family survive.

I always enjoyed working with people and helping others. I think helping care for my grandmother helped me become interested in nursing. So, I entered the University of Benito Juarez and studied nursing. Each semester we did practices applying what we had already learned. My work now consists of caring for patients in homes and hospitals. I really enjoy working with older people as they can tell me where it hurts.

In July, with a GPA of 83%, I will graduate from the University of Benito Juarez with a degree in Nursing. Then I will spend one year of social service working in a hospital in the city or in a rural area as I gather information for my thesis at the same time. My future plans are to stay in Oaxaca and work in a local hospital.

Thank you, CEI, for everything. You have changed my life and the lives of each of the other children in my family because we all now have university degrees!!

Our Graduates

Coming from a single-parent family of three children and the mother supporting the family by washing clothes and cleaning houses, Patricia, age 15, came to CEI asking for assistance with her studies. Patricia said, Since the age of 13 I have always worked to help my family. During vacations, I worked in a bakery, shoe stores, in clothing stores, and now I work in an ice cream stand. Now, at age 21 with a GPA of 85%, my life will change as I will graduate in March with a degree in Business Administration from Benito Juarez University. Patricia is currently completing her social service requirement of 144 hours in Urban Affairs, a government office that distributes funding to areas of the city. She plans to continue working in administration in factory management. CEI helps so many families with needs. With all their guidance, encouragement and my helpful sponsor, I now will have an education so I can help my family and others.

When I was very young, my father went to the USA to work to help us have a better life, but he was killed there in an accident while working. So my mother brought me to CEI for help. I liked school and continued to study. In high school, I was introduced to the computer, electricity and automotive care. Because of a good teacher, I became more interested in cars and motors. After preparatory school, I enrolled in Grupo Dedwa (a vocational school run by the Secretary of Education). I studied a two-year course, three semesters each year, in auto mechanics. With each course, we had constant practices to apply immediately what we had studied. With 90 computers in the school, we had information and experiences working with every kind of

Aracelí has been with CEI for 17 years! She was accepted at five years old as she entered kinder. She had serious problems with her teeth and needed ongoing dental work. All this attention and dental visits created interest in her becoming a dentist. While studying, she worked in several jobs to help with family expenses: sales, a dental clinic, sold candy on the streets and even drove a mototaxi in the suburb where she lives.

Dentistry is a six-year program: five in the classroom (with clinics) and one year of social service. She has completed several mini clinics and has presented several lectures on dental care in schools throughout Oaxaca. She will finish all her mini clinics in February - May, In August, Aracelí will be sent to a rural area for her one-year social service requirement. In June, 23 years old, GPA of 80%, Aracelí will graduate from the University of Benito Juarez School of Dentistry as a certified Dentist. It was a long struggle but well worth the effort. At the age of 20 and in second year university she was accepted into CEI. She has completed her social service requirement (two hours daily for six months) in the Judicial System of Oaxaca working in the offices of auto theft. In June, age 20, GPA of 91%, Aurora will graduate with a Law Degree from the University of Benito Juarez Law School. I hope to work in a government office in Mexico City in the future. Last year, she was granted a scholarship for one month of language studies at the University of Maine, USA. Her practices (three months, two hours daily) have been completed in an elementary school. She is now completing her social service requirement (student teaching) for six months, four hours daily in a primary school in Oaxaca and writing her thesis "Teaching English to Bilingual Students: Triqui -Spanish."

In June, 25 years old, GPA of 85%, I will graduate from the University of Benito Juarez with a degree in Teaching Languages (English, Spanish, French). He has been accepted to do these practices in a famous hotel in Cancun, Mexico, from January through April. Upon returning to Oaxaca, he will take three exams and present his final project on a special food preparation.

CEI and my sponsors have been my life line; without all your help I would not have been able to finish my degree. I have learned so much from CEI and I hope to come back here and help other kids like me who are in need. Thanks to everyone!

When I was 12 years old, in sixth grade primary, my family of four was struggling financially due to serious health issues. I was accepted into CEI so I could continue my education. Twelve years ago, Gabriel, 10 years old, entering 6^{th} grade primary, came to CEI asking for help. Coming from a family of six, there were economic needs. With interest in the science and math areas, he entered the university to continue his studies.

I will graduate in March, age 22, GPA of 90%, from the Instituto Tecnológico in Oaxaca with a degree in Electronic Engineering. I have completed my studies in four and one half years. My social service was completed (480 hours) with the university internet and communications services. My professional practice (600 hours) was with the Federal Electric Commission as we installed a communication receiver in a village in the Sierra for the telephone company. There never was a phone system there before. I received a 95% on the project.

CEI's help with kids is excellent. I also want to thank my sponsor, who didn't know me, still helped me to this level of my life. Thanks so much for all your help. I am now prepared to work with a company to install communication systems.

When I was six years old my family came to Oaxaca looking for a better life. Coming from a family of nine children and me being the second oldest, I have always worked in the market and cared for my younger siblings. I think this is why I wanted to be a pre-school teacher. I have completed my practices (4 hours daily for 6 months) in a Day Care Center and am now ready to do my social service requirement (student teaching) for six months in a public elementary school. In July, 25 years old, GPA of 77%, I will graduate with a degree in Early Child Education. Thanks to my sponsors and CEI for 25 years of help and encouragement. My future plans are to continue working at the Day Care Center in Oaxaca.

Everyone enjoyed pizza, tartaletas, cookies and soft drinks. When leaving the party, everyone was given a new backpack, several pieces of new clothing, a gift bag and a candy bag. The smiles, laughter, noise and hugs indicated that the party was a huge success. Throughout the month of December, the high school students through university students were all given gift bags of shampoo, tooth paste and brush, hair gel, two pair of socks, soap, a notebook, a pen and pencil, several pieces of clothing, a candy bag and many other miscellaneous items. The piñata is commonly associated with Mexico. However, history tells us that piñatas may have originated in China. Piñatas are often made of papier-maché, pottery or cloth. It is decorated and filled with candy, fruits and small toys and then broken as part of a ceremony or celebration.

When the first missionaries arrived in Mexico, they were faced with a very different way of life. They imposed a new language, new customs and habits and among others, a new religion. It was not easy to teach the mysteries of one God as opposed to their belief of many gods. One of the most complicated dogmas was sin and how Satan tempts us. We must be strong to beat the devil. So the church interpretation of the piñata rested on the struggle of man against temptation. The seven points



represent the seven deadly sins. The pot represents evil, and the fruit and candy inside, the temptation of evil. The person with the stick is blindfolded to represent faith. The turning, singing and shouting represent the disorientation that temptation creates. As the participant beats the piñata, it is supposed to represent the struggle against temptation and evil. When the piñata breaks, the treats inside represent the rewards of keeping the faith. However, the piñata now has all but lost its religious significance and become popular with all types of celebrations, especially Christmas and birthdays. The traditional seven-star piñata (Star of Bethlehem) is only used at Christmas. Piñatas today, due to commercialization, come in all sizes and shapes with most representing cartoon or other Disney characters known to children.
