



ANOTHER FAMILY... ANOTHER MIRACLE

Hi! My name is Shunashi. I am 7 years old and in second grade. This is my sister, Emily. She is 5 years old and in kindergarten. When our father abandoned us, my mother, my two sisters and I went to live with my grandparents and great-grandmother. They share their four-room home with us. We have one room and all four of us share one bed. My aunt and her two children share another room. We have one room we use as a kitchen for all ten of us living there. Mother sells handicrafts, my aunt is a waitress and grandma does laundry for others. We all share and contribute so we can survive. Grandpa has a bad heart and cannot work. We needed help and CEI helped us. Now we get to go to school! With the help of our kind sponsors, CEI gave us our uniform, shoes, tennis shoes, P.E. clothes, a backpack, inscription fees and school supplies. In addition, after classes we can go to the CEI center for a good meal; there

are tutors who help us with homework; we can use the computers, use the library and play games. We are so happy; CEI is our second home.

Looking at this photo, one wonders how a father could walk away from these children and tell them that he never wanted to see them again...

CEI is currently helping educate 629 children from various ethnic backgrounds, ranging in ages from 4 - 27, and enrolled in kindergarten through university level in 40 schools in Oaxaca. We thank the sponsors and donors from 15 countries of the world who believe that education can make a difference in the lives of needy children who want to learn, escape poverty, become productive and respected citizens in society and have a brighter future. A sponsorship of \$250 U.S. or equivalent per year gives a child this opportunity to have a better life through education. **Remember... every child wants to learn, and can learn if** given the opportunity.





SHORT ... SHOELESS, BUT CAN THIS BOY SHOOT!

Just three years ago, Triqui basketball players from Oaxaca gained fame around the world. With their skills, they were beating opponents on the world stage who were better fed and better dressed. Their opponents wore shoes - the Mexicans were barefoot! Sergio Zúñiga, coach and organizer of the indigenous Basketball Academy of Mexico, is a former professional basketball player and an undocumented immigrant himself. He now has over 1,000 children training under 25 trainers in three different camps in the mountains of Oaxaca.

At age 17, CEI ´s Vicente Celestino Bautista is now living and studying in San Juan Copala, and has been training since he was 13 years old.

After school, we practice for two hours from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. It is heavy training and conditioning. We play a fast-paced game of basketball. There are no charges to play; they give us our uniforms, shoes and socks, but we prefer to play barefooted. To be eligible to play, you must have an 80% GPA in school. We have a home team and a traveling team which makes long trips to play other schools. Sometimes, we have three-day tournaments. My team won our division championship! The highlight of the game was that playing forward, I was high point man, scoring 22 points, both 2 and 3 pointers....and I was barefoot! It was so exciting. I am only 5'1" tall, but we are all short! My goal is to get better and have a position on the traveling team so I can go to the USA to play, and maybe even study there with the other players in Houston, Texas.



CULTURE CORNER... ELOTE OR ESQUITES?

In the late afternoon and early evenings in Oaxaca, it is common to see many Mexicans walking down the street enjoying an ear of corn or a cup of corn, popular street snack foods.

ELOTE is cooked or grilled corn on the cob, stuck on a stick, spread with mayonnaise and topped with crumbly cheese, chile powder, lime juice and salt. ESQUITES are cooked corn kernels, prepared with chiles, scooped out of a big steaming pot into a small cup and topped with mayonnaise, crumbly cheese, salt, chile powder and lime juice and eaten with a spoon. These are perfect and healthy snacks!

There are many elote and esquite vendors



on various street corners with their wagons that are built on a three-wheeled bicycle that serves as a heated minikitchen. Each vendor has his clientele who prefer his way of preparing the corn. Ismael, Jesús, Felix and Rodrigo, former students with CEI, along with their father, have a family corn business. Starting at 3:00 p.m. each day, they prepare 500 ears of corn: 300 remain intact to be eaten on the cob and 200 are prepared for esquites. By 4:00 p.m. their wagons are ready for the evening demand. They can then leave and be on their street corners in time for hungry clients to enjoy their choice of a hot snack treat. For 15 pesos (75 cents U.S. currency) you can enjoy a stroll down the street and munch on your ear of corn!

PROUD GRADUATES



José Antonio de los Reyes Flores When José was four years old, he attended kindergarten at CEI and has been with us for his entire education. Coming from a family of nine children, he needed assistance. During his education, he has worked to help with family expenses: selling chile peppers, singing on public buses and working in the family market stall selling typical clothing.

With his interest in the outdoors, he decided to study a career in forestry. He entered the Instituto Tecnológico del Valle de Oaxaca where he has studied for the past five years. His social service requirement (460 hours) was completed on the campus working with different seed projects. He is currently finishing his professional service requirement (6 months) on campus working with various agricultural projects and gathering information for his thesis.

In July, age 22, GPA of 82%, José will graduate with a degree in Forestry Engineering. His future plans are to continue working for a masters degree and work in villages on correct seeding, planting and reforestation. Thanks to a great organization and my wonderful sponsors for assistance. CEI has been my second home for 18 years!

When I was 15, entering preparatory school, coming from a single-parent family, I needed help. CEI was there to help me. I always enjoyed working with children so I entered the Escuela Normal de la Educación Prescolar de Oaxaca. I have studied four years: in second year, I practised two weeks; in third year, two to three months of practice; and in fourth year, I am now completing my entire year of practice teaching with 18 children (4-5 years old) in San Bartolo. I am also working with a special government project "School Violence, anti-bullying which begins at home and carried to school". I have to report my results every two months to the government. I am also currently working on my thesis. I have always wanted to be a teacher. A beginning teacher helps form the child´s future. With classes and games, one learns how to help a child. I hope to work in Oaxaca as there is much need in rural areas. In July, age 23, GPA of 90%, my dream will come true when I graduate with a degree in Pre-School Child Education! CEI is an excellent place to prepare us for the future. I want to send an emotional thank you to my sponsors, not knowing me, helped me to this level in my life.





When I was 13, my family of five children, came to Oaxaca from the village. None of us could speak Spanish, only Zapotec, our native indigenous language. It took me two years to learn enough Spanish so I could pass the exam to enter high school. Ready to enter the preparatory school at age 15, I came to CEI asking for assistance. With my interest in nature, I later enrolled in the Instituto Tecnológico del Valle de Oaxaca and studied forestry. I have completed my social service requirement (480 hours) with private consulting companies working with projects for rural communities. My professional service requirement (6 months) was completed working with the same organizations. I am also finishing my thesis on Global Carbonization in a village three hours from Oaxaca studying the dangers of pollution to plants and forests. Now 25 years old, I will graduate in February, 85% GPA, with a degree in Forestry Engineering. CEI and my sponsors gave me this opportunity and opened my world to my love of nature...thanks so much!

When Miriam was 21 and in fifth semester in the university, she came to CEI for help to finish her education. She has always been interested in all areas of medicine (herbal, blood work, cosmetic, etc.) due to the influence of an aunt who also works in this area.
