- On Sunday, November 4, the sale is open to everyone from 1 to 3 pm

and Kyle Landman, secretary. While Debbie has retired from the president's position, we are fortunate that she will remain active on the Board as Past President. And, Jean will stay involved in our "Book Discussion" and "Booked for Lunch" programs.

### Future Directions

It's a little early to get very specific about the types of events and programs the Friends will support in the future. But, I can share a little "insider information" to give you a sense of priorities:

*New Programs:* We have earmarked much of our revenues in the last few years for future capital expansion projects related to library construction. But, because specific plans and timetables are a bit fluid due to planned construction of an Ada branch library, we hope to redirect some of those funds into new programs that will be of immediate benefit to patrons of the Cascade library and the community.

*Existing Programs:* Community support for and participation in current programs suggest that there is value in continuing events like "Flix @ the Library," "Book Discussions," etc. The Board will look at these programs with an eye toward improving them. We welcome your suggestions.

*Membership:* Growth in membership has been modest in recent years. While we're grateful for any growth, we will take a look at membership structure, fees, discounts, etc. in the months ahead since those have remained static for nearly two decades.

*Member Communications:* We try not to bombard you with email, especially since some of our members have chosen

not to share their email addresses. But, we are considering creating a true digital version of our newsletter (not just a PDF of our print version) for a couple reasons. First, the cost to print and mail the newsletter is one of our larger expenses and is money we would rather invest into library programs and supplies. Second, we would prefer a medium that allows for more frequent and, hence, timely communication. If you're not a fan of digital newsletters, we hope you will make an exception for us. But, if not, we'll send you a printed copy of the digital newsletter upon request.

### A True 'Dream Team'

With all due respect to every "Dream Team" that has ever graced the sports pages, we have a team that would make

## Planning Improvements for the 4th of July Sales Event.

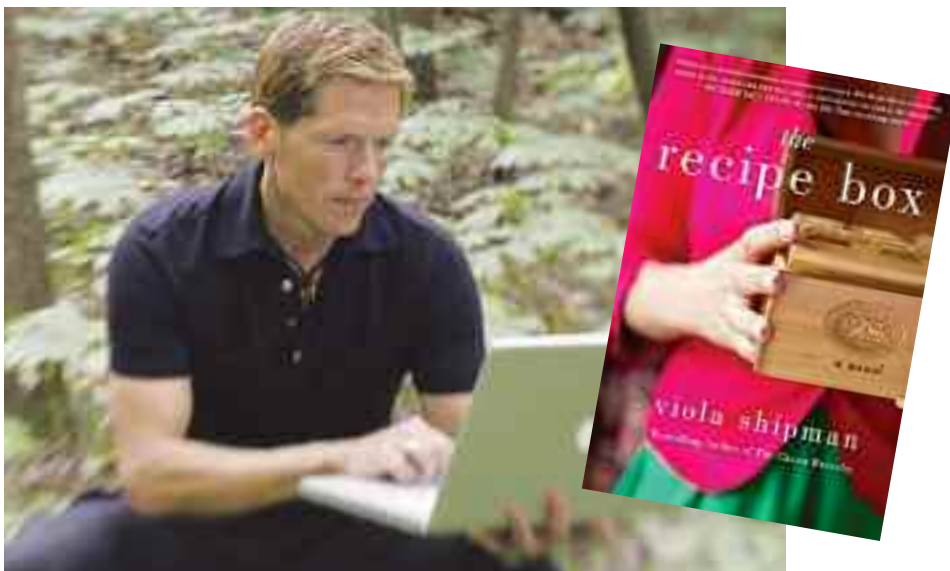

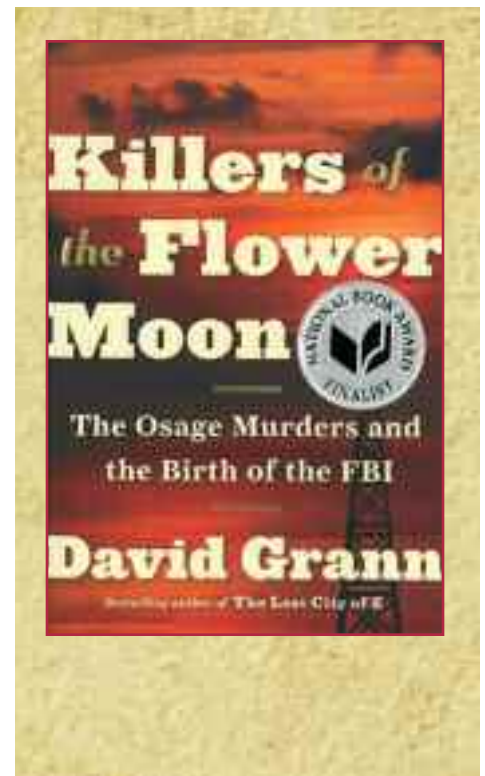

**Killers of the Flower Moon:**

**The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI** by David Grann.

From the New York Times best-selling author of *The City of Z*, comes a twisting, haunting true-life murder mystery about one of the most monstrous crimes in American history. In the 1920s the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage rode in chauffeured automobiles, built mansions and sent their children to study in Europe. Then one by one, the Osage began to be killed off. More and more of the Osage were dying under mysteri-

ous circumstances and those investigating the killings were themselves murdered. The FBI entered the case with its young director, J. Edgar Hoover, along with former Texas Ranger Tom White, who tried to unravel the mystery.
