es. "With over 30 counselors engaged in providing services through Love Heals Youth, we were honored with the oppor-tunity to create a crisis team that can travel to Uvalde at the end of sum-

ovance at the end of summer, as the next school year begins," Smith said. "This will be a difficult and highly stressful transition into the 2022-2023 academic school year. The community and the parents will be played. The community and the parents will be plagued with fear that another tragedy will strike. The children, who look to the adults for comfort and reassurance, will instead recognize the anxiety in the faces of the adults but they trye."

With the funds raised on Tuesday, Love Heals Youth counselors will be creating toolkits for the teachers and students, Smith said. These tools will be donated to the schools in an effort to address the grief, fear and anxiety. and anxiety.

6-vear sentence in DWI case

Earlier this month, a Conroe woman was sen-tenced in the death of a pedestrian while driving intoxicated in 2018 after previously being convict-ed in the county of a

ed in the county of a DWI.

On June 2 in the 359th District Court, Kristina Nicole Hardin, 31, was sentenced to six years in prison by Judge Paul Damico after she pleaded guilty to the second-degree felony offense of intoxication manslaughter with a vehicle, according to Montgomery County District Clerk records. As part of her plea deal, a third-degree felony offense of tampering with physical evidence

with physical evid with physical evidence charge against Hardin was dismissed, according to Montgomery County First Assistant District Attorney Mike Holley. On the afternoon of

On the afternoon of Aug. 21, 2018, Hardin was driving her SUV west-bound on the 1900 block of Texas 105 when she fatally struck 33-year-old Conroe resident Brian Scott Vines and two other adult pedestrians, accord-ing to a report from The Courier at the time. The three pedestrians were walking their bikes on the road's shoulder, ac-cording to The Courier. Vines died at the scene, while a woman was hos-

Vines died at the scene while a woman was hos-pitalized with non-life threatening injuries and the third pedestrian was not injured, The Courier detailed.

Witnesses at the scene described Hardin tossing a bottle of pills out of her vehicle not long after the

which not long after the wreck.

The prosecutor on the case, Montgomery Coun-ty Assistant District At-torney Wesley LeRoaux on Wednesday said Hardin was intoxicated on

pills.

Hardin was previously convicted of a 2014 DWI and received one-year probation, according to the District Attorney's

The defense attorney for Hardin did not re spond with a comment.


