Who created this museum?

Jef Verswyvel always had an interest in WWII which reflects in his career as a scale modeler. At a young age he started collecting war paraphernalia.

Maggie DeWeirdt supported his search for artifacts and encouraged him to use his skills to create realistic looking life-size models of soldiers.

They both grew up in their homeland of Belgium, where their parents shared what they went through during the war and their gratitude to the Allies who liberated their country. Creating this museum was a way of thanking these men and women.

They started to assemble what would become the "Greatest Generation" World War II Museum with a Grand Opening at their place of business on Veterans Day 2005.

In 2009 the exhibit was moved to the **Szilagyi Center** where it would be more accessible to the public at large.

They continued purchasing uniforms, arms, personal items and artifacts for their collection at auctions and wherever their travels took them. Veterans and their families also donated artifact to put on display in the museum.

THE BATTLE OF THE BULGE was the



largest land battle of World War II in which the United States directly participated. More than a million men fought in the battle; 600,000 Germans, 500,000 Americans, and 55,000 British. The temperature in Belgium during January 1945 was

the coldest on record, and casualties from exposure to the cold grew as large as the losses from fighting. Many lost fingers, toes, and feet; many died from exposure. Local citizens collected sheets and blankets to help keep the allies warm.



NAVY PILOT CHARLES H. BROWN SHOT DOWN OVER THE PACIFIC

Retired Attorney Charlie Brown was "lost at sea" and considered "killed in action". His family was notified and prepared for his funeral. However, he had been picked up by the Japanese Navy and held as a POW until the end of the war when he was released and sent home. Over the years, they saved all his uniforms, foot locker, documents, telegrams, and are now a part of the museum.



THE VIRGIL GIBSON ROOM is named for a local hero and exhibits scenes of U.S., British, German, Belgian

and Russian soldiers dressed in their national uniforms. There are several realistic, war-torn, and bullet-riddled displays. Especially detailed is the scene of the German bunker in Berlin being looted by Russians soldiers.







THE MOLLY ZELLER ROOM is named for a

local Army Nurse. You are greeted by nurses as you enter who look real enough to welcome you. This museum did not forget the women who served their country so proudly during World War II. Represented in this room are WAAC, WAVE, Red Cross and



the Home Front which Maggie recreated from photos her family had in Belgium.



THE COLLECTION IS AUTHENTIC to the WWII era,

according to Jef. The process begins with a mannequin and

special modeling clay that is used to re-sculpt heads, faces, and hands until he is satisfied with the obtained realistic look, including blood, wounds, scars, frown, or furrowed brow. The final step is dressing these mannequins in accurate WWII military uniforms with accessories such as insignias, medals, stripes, and weapons. Even the buttons and shoe laces are authentic.
