Noted Oregon

The Rev. Rene Malcolm Bozarth, 58, founder of St. Luke Episcopal Church in Gresham and of the monastic Society of St. Paul, died Friday after a heart attack at the society's retreat center in Palm Desert, Calif.

Bozarth founded Oregon's Holy Trinity Episcopal School and was its headmaster from 1958 to 1964; he founded St. Jude's Home Inc., a long-term patient care facility in Sandy; and he was the founder and editor of St. Paul's Press, the printing and publishing arm of the

Society of St. Paul, also in Sandy.

Bozarth was born in Sedalia, Mo., and moved with his mother to Olympia, Wash., where he was graduated from high school. After a career as a syndicated newspaper columnist and radio station program director in Los Angeles, he was graduated from the Anglican Theological College at the University of British Columbia. He was ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1951 by the Right Rev. Benjamin Dagwell, Bishop of Oregon.

That same year he founded St. Luke Church in Gresham and served as its rector until 1964. He founded the Society of St. Paul in 1958 and served as its first rector, but did not take his life vows as a monk in the society until after the death of his wife, Alvina, in

1972.

He served eight years as a member of the Multnomah County Welfare Commission, two terms as president of the Oregon Prison Association, was a past president of the Portland Chamber Orchestra Association and past chairman of the Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee.

He was also a member of the Oregon Historical Society, a fellow of the American College of Nursing Home Administrators, a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and a past president of the Gresham Ministerial Association.

Since 1970 he had been president of the National Guild of Churchmen.

Bozarth initiated the Sandy Centennial celebration and was a member of its steering committee. A street in Gresham, Rene Avenue, was named for him in the 1950s.

In 1975 he resigned as rector of the Society of St. Paul because of ill health, and in 1977 moved to the society's newly opened novitiate and retreat center in Palm Desert, where he resided until his death.

In California he was a member of the San Diego Diocesan Hispanic Commission and the Bishop's Urban Coalition of the Eighth Province of the Episcopal Church. He was also associate rector for St. John

He was born in Sedalia, MO, on Nov. 25, 1923, and as a child, moved to Olympia, WA, where he


completed high school.

Florence Levy Bellis, a former Gresham resident and a primrose grower of international fame, died at her home Nov. 14 in Lincoln City. She was 81.

Mrs. Bellis came to Gresham in 1935 and founded Barnhaven Nurseries. She recently wrote a book about her gardening work called "Gardening and Beyond," which was reviewed in the July 15 issue of The Outlook.

There will be no funeral. The re-

mains were cremated.

Born Florence Hurtig on May, 19, 1906, in New Orleans, La., she moved to Portland with her parents as a child. She studied music with the aim of becoming a concert pianist and during the 1920s and early 1930s was active in music and theater groups.

Her primrose career and the national fame that accompanied it began when she came to Gresham. In 1969, when she discontinued the Barnhaven gardens, she moved to Lincoln City. First married to Lewis N. Levy, she later married Robert Bellis. He died in 1971.

Mrs. Bellis wrote articles for English and American gardening journals and newspapers and cofounded the American Primrose Society in 1941. She was founding editor of the society's quarterly publication, which was first published by the Gresham Outlook when Tom Purcell was editor.

Her recent book tells the story of how she carefully nurtured her primrose seedlings at Barnhaven on

Johnson Creek and how she discovered the secret of hand pollination. Her revolutionary methods produced the most colorful strains of primroses ever known.

When Mrs. Bellis went indoors to write in her tiny loft study at Barnhaven or later at her home in Lincoln City, she handled prose with the same care she gave her fledgling blooms. Reviewers of "Gardening and Beyond" in major Oregon newspapers, as well as the New York Times, have all called attention to her poetic use of language in the

book. She is survived by one daughter, Penny Levy Craig of Troutdale, and four grandchildren, including Valerie Willson, who illustrated Mrs.

Bellis' book.

Harry Barger's done it all — except retire

GRESHAM — In a way, looking at Gresham is

like looking at Harry Barger's résumé. He built many of the roads in the downtown

area. His factories milled wood and produced furniture for houses all over town.

Some of those houses were built by his construction company. And to this day, at Hoodland Carpets at 406 N.E. Fourth St., he sells floor coverings to make many a Gresham house cozier.

At 84, you might think he'd take a break from a working life that started when he was 12. But he

won't hear of it.

"I just can't do it," he says, tapping his finger impatiently on his fist. "I worked all my life. I can't stay still. I've got to do something." "He'd probably curl up and die if he had to sit

down," says Mike McKeel, a dentist who has known Barger for decades.

"The list of things he hasn't done is shorter

than the list of things he has done."

During his lifetime, Barger has tried just about

everything except genuine retirement.

He's been a farmhand, a pilot, a factory worker and a military man. During the 1940s, when he built a lumber mill on Eastman Parkway — on the current site of Gresham City Hall — he was a boss with the largest payroll in the city.

At other times, he barely had two nickels to rub

together.

He and his wife, Pearl, 76, met and married in Lincoln City during the Great Depression.

When they moved to Portland in 1939, "we had 50 cents in our pockets," he recalls. "Things didn't

get better for a long time."

Harry Barger was born in 1907 in rural Pennsylvania, where his father was a house builder. He and his six brothers and sisters all worked at an early age. His first job was milking cows and feeding pigs on a farm.

Later, at the age of 15, he became a "bobbin boy," fetching and carrying rolls of raw silk in a local textile mill. Before he left the factory, he rose to the rank of inspector, earning 25 cents an

hour.

But life on the East Coast paled for him after he enlisted in the Army, which sent him to a base on

Honolulu.

He spent a couple of years working in a military machine shop, then bought a car and drove across the country back to his home.

It wasn't long before he returned to the West, this time to work in the wheatfields around Spo-

kane.

Next came a stint as a home builder in Lincoln City, where he married Pearl, the principal and

head teacher of a school.

The couple struggled through the Depression, with Harry doing carpentry work and Pearl working in a restaurant. When they moved to Gresham in 1939, Barger said he was "just roaming around and bumming around," trying to survive.

"I think about it now, and I don't know how in the world a person got by," Harry Barger says in

wonderment.

"The younger generation thinks these are tough times. They don't know what tough times is. They think everybody has to be born with a silver spoon in their mouth."

He not only watched Gresham grow up, he also

helped it grow. Barger acknowledges that he has mixed feelings about the results.

His sawmill closed in the 1950s when timber prices rose and regulations began to bog down the business.

Then he went into heavy construction, working on earth-moving and road-building. Yet another venture — furniture manufacturing — lasted for seven years.

He ran his own plumbing and electrical company. As a residential developer, he said, he owned

Former Oregon Journal editorial editor dies

Roy Beadle, a career Oregon journalist, was known for his gentle manner and for standing up for his beliefs

Roy J. Beadle, whose "gentle liberalism" was the signature of The Oregon Journal editorial section for 26 years, died Wednesday, Nov. 18, 1998, in a Portland hospital. He was

Mr. Beadle spent 43 years in journalism, nearly 40 of it with The Journal. He worked 26 years in The Journal's editorial page department, 18 of them as its editor. His two editing stints were from 1955-1967 and from 1971 until his retirement in April 1977.

The late Ed O'Meara, Journal city editor and later managing editor whose career paralleled Mr. Beadle's, once described Mr. Beadle's

style as "gentle liberalism."

Mr. Beadle was a Gresham man through and through. He was born there May 9, 1912, and lived there at the time of his death. He graduated from Gresham Union High School in 1930, then began his long connection with Linfield College that fall when he enrolled at the McMinnville school.

After graduation in 1934, Mr. Beadle went right back to Gresham to work as a reporter for the Gresham Outlook. On Sept. 20, 1937, he signed on at The Journal as a reporter.

Mr. Beadle enlisted in the Navy in 1943. He served during World War II at Mare Island Naval Station in Vallejo, Calif., and in Hawaii as a journalist.

Upon his discharge in December 1945, he returned to The Journal. Six years later, he moved to the editorial page department. Four years after that, in 1955, he started the first of his reigns as the page editor.

"He was a very mild-mannered

Donald J. Sterling, who was an associate editor under Mr. Beadle in the 1950s and later served as The Journal's last editor. "But he could surprise people and get pretty

fired up.

"During the newspaper strike (1959), he wrote some really hardhitting editorials on why The Journal was right and the strikers were wrong."

Sterling also noted Mr. Beadle's backing of Portland Mayor Terry Schrunk in 1957. Schrunk was accused of illegal activity during his term as Multnomah County sheriff, but Mr. Beadle stuck with him. The mayor was acquitted quickly by a

Honored with award

In 1978, a year after Mr. Beadle retired, he was one of seven citizens who received the Aubrey Watzek Award for adding "a special dimension to the quality of life in the Pacific Northwest."

Mr. Beadle was as much a Linfield man as he was a Gresham man. He served for 43 years on the college's board. In 1990, he was named a trustee emeritus by the school.

Mr. Beadle is survived by his wife, Thelma; son, Charles of Portland; daughter, Mary Greenwell of Vancouver, Wash.; five grandchildren; and four great grandchildren.




