Obituary of W. G. Cathey.

The funeral of William G. Cathey, whose death was recorded in the last Outlook, was held at the Gresham Baptist church on Wednesday afternoon. The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. Alexander Beers, who was summoned from San Francisco for the purpose. Rev. J. A. Hopper, District Elder of the Free Methodist church, and Rev. S. G. Roper of Portland, both of them former pastors of the deceased, spoke in appreciation of the life and character of Mr. Cathey. Rev. A. S. Hisey of the Methodist Episcopal church offered prayer.

Rev. Mr. Beers took for his text, "A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches—and is like precious ointment poured forth and the day of a man's death is better than the day of his birth." He spoke out of his knowledge of the man through nearly half a century, of his sturdy Christian character, his interest in community and church life and in education, and especially of his influence in his own home, as shown in the lives of children and grandchildren. Until the feebleness of old age came upon him, Mr. Cathey was always foremost in deeds of kindness to those about him and in work for the general welfare.

The address was listened to by a large number of old friends and neighbors of the early day who had gathered to do honor to one they loved. The body was borne to the grave by grandsons of the deceased, Dr. George Cathey and Dr. Collie F. Cathey of Portland, Cecil Cathey of Albany, Clarence Cathey, Jackson and Guy D. Jones of Gresham

William G. Cathey was born in Pettis county, Missouri, April 15, 1833. On April 17, 1853 he married Miss Thursey Cornutt and within a few days, in company with his wife's father and family, they started for Oregon by ox team and reached the mouth of the Sandy river late in the fall of that year. Soon after their arrival they moved onto their donation land claim where they resided until their death.


To this union were born eight sons and three daughters. Those surviving are Dr. B. A. Cathey of Condon, Oregon, Rev. D. M. Cathey of Gresham, W. W. Cathey and Rev. F. W. Cathey of Seattle, Washington, Mrs. Elizabeth A. Jones of Gresham.

In 1888 Mrs. Cathey died and in 1891 Mr. Cathey married Mrs. Elizabeth Phillips, who died in 1907. Besides the children mentioned above, Mr. Cathey leaves a step-son, William Hicks and a step-daughter, Mrs. Leona Stacy, also 29 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren

From the time of his conversion at the age of 21, Mr. Carney took a deep interest in the cause of Christianity and helped in the work both by his means and personal labors. Only a few days before his death in the home of his son, D. M. Cathey and wife, he took part in family worship and prayed fervently and intelligently for himself and gave clear evidence of his preparation for the change that was so soon to come.

PIONEER DIES AT CRESHAM, WHERE HE LONG RESIDED.



Funeral services for William G. Cathey, Oregon pioneer, will be held at Gresham tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Cathey died yesterday at his home at Gresham, where he had lived for 67 years.

Mr. Cathey was born in Missouri April 15, 1833. He married Thursy J. Cornutt in the spring of 1853 and within a few days they started by ox team for Oregon. They arrived at the mouth of the Sandy river late in the fall of 1853.

Soon after Mr. Cathey settled near Gresham, Or., on a donation land claim, which bears his name. Here he lived until his death. His wife died in 1888. Five of their 11 children are living. They are: Four sons, Dr. B. A. Cathey of Condon, Or.; Rev. F. W. and Rev. W. W. Cathey, both of Seattle, and Rev. D. M. Cathey of Gresham; and one daughter, Mrs. E. A. Jones of Gresham.

The funeral will be held at the Baptist church of Gresham. Interment will be in the family lot in the Gresham cemetery.

HEART ATTACK TAKES FORMER MAYOR FRIDAY

Chas. Cleveland Dies at Home; Had Been Here 65 Years

OTHERS CALLED

Charles Cleveland, pioneer, exmayor and many years one of the outstanding breeders of purebred livestock in this state, died suddenly at his home at the north edge of Gresham about 5:00 o'clock Friday morning. He had been ailing with arthritis for about two years, but was up and around until the evening before he died. He suffered an acute heart attack while reading a newspaper early Thursday evening. Just a few minutes before he had considered attending a meeting of the Multnemah county fair board, of which he was a member.

He was born February 27th, 1862 and had passed the four score mark. His birthplace was Westmoreland county, New Brunswick, Canada.

As a boy of 15, he came with his parents to Oregon. After a brief residence of one year in Portland they settled in 1878 on a 160-acre farm at the north edge of Gresham, which had been his home ever since. This farm, named the Cedar Grove farm, throughout the years came to be one of the best known stock farms in Oregon.

Kaised Blooded Stock

He specialized in Jersey cattle, Shropshire sheep and Essex hogs, having one of the best herds of Jerseys west of the Rocky mountains. For years, he made the circuit of the big fairs of the west, and always took home his share of the ribbons. He was a lover of fine animals all his life.

He attended school at the old White schoolhouse which stood near where the Baptist church now stands, and later took a business course and graduated at the A. B. Armstrong business college in Portland.

Married Gresham Native

Mr. Cleveland married Annie Tomlinson, a native born Gresham girl, on September 8th, 1884. She survives Mr. Cleveland and is one of the oldest natives of Gresham still living here.

Bereft also are one daughter, Mrs. S. E. Woodworth of San Francisco; two sons, Charles E. of Sprague, Washington and W. H. of Heppner, Oregon; three grandchildren, Mrs. Frank Lockyear of Portland, Mrs. Ralph Eastridge of Seattle and W. Howard Cleveland of Heppner; one great grandson, John Cleveland Lockyear of Portland; one brother, Albert Cleveland of Portland; and one sister, Mrs. Paul Bliss of Portland.

Four Terms As Mayor

Mr. Cleveland served four terms as mayor of Gresham, his tenure of office being from January 1st, 1925 to January 1st, 1933. He had previously served on the city council. He also had served as justice of the peace.

He took a keen interest in education and was a leader in the organization of the Gresham union high school district. He was chairman of the school board when the first Gresham high school was built here in 1915.

Was On Fair Boards

His ability as a stockman and an executive was recognized by both the state and the county fair. For a number of years he was a member of the state fair board and since 1931 had been a member of the Multnomah county fair board.

He was a veteran of the Oregon national guard and at one time was captain of the troop of national guard cavalry stationed here.

Fraternally, he held membership for many years in, and was a past master of, Gresham Lodge No. 152, A. F. & A. M.; in Al Kader Shrine of Portland and was a charter member of the Gresham chapter of Eastern Star.

Funeral services were held in the Gresham Methodist church Tuesday afternoon, Rev. John L. Magoon of the Baptist church officiated and was assisted by Rev. Sydney W. Hall.

Interment was in the old Gresham cemetery, with the Gresham Masons in charge of the rites at the graveside. Pallbearers were O. J. Brown, Fred Powell, Will Metzger, Burton Walrad, Jr., Willard Bliss and Dr. Will Ott.

Earlene was born in Ogden Utah on January 23,

They were married on December 16, 1947 and started Hunter Ho Kennels and enjoyed riding their Tennessee walking horses. Their first child was an adopted baby girl, followed by 2 daughters and 5 sons. Earlene and Vern owned Clifford's Barbeque, a popular local restaurant for 25 years. As busy as she was, Earlene always had time for the activities of her children who were always first in her life.

In July of 1970, the family moved to Portland Oregon to provide greater opportunities for college for the children. She worked for several years at Red's Coach Inn of Milwaukie followed by US Bancorp Leasing and Financial in Portland. True to her work ethic and life, she continued to work until 1992 when she retired at the age of 69.

During retirement she enjoyed occasional travel, her many dogs, roses and gardening. Her first love continued to be the avid interest in and devotion to family activities of her children.

Earlene was preceded in death by her beloved husband Vern in 1991. The went to be with Vern and our Lord on October 3, 2010. The is survived by her children Lanna Hampton, Tracy Clifford of Portland; Mitzi Carson of Happy Valley; Vern J. Bliss, of Sycamore, and two sons, Charles and Albert Cleveland, well-known residents of Gresham. Death was due to a gradual failing of physical forces, Mr. Cleveland having been in good health nearly all of his long and useful life. The funeral took place this morning at 10 o'clock from the Baptist Church of this place, Rev. C. A. Nutley officiating. Interment was in Gresham Cemetery.

Famous 'shoeless' artist subject of Gresham display

A free-spirited Gresham woman who cropped her hair short, walked barefoot around town and made a name for herself as an artist will be featured this month in the historical display at Gresham City Hall.

Gresham Historical Society members Hazel Wogsberg and Margaret Moir have set up an exhibit of the work of Annie T. Cleveland in the display case opposite the Gresham police department.

"While other women were still wearing their hair long, Annie T. Cleveland had shorn hers, and when she walked about Gresham shoeless, she was forgiven for her lapse because she was an 'artist'," says Wogsberg. Cleveland was talented in numerous art fields. She painted on both china and canvas, worked in metals, made some jewelry and even stenciled fabric. She taught art in her Portland studio and gave much of her work to friends and relatives. She painted into her old age and died in 1948 at the age of 84.

Included in the City Hall

display of her works are oil paintings, hand-wrought copper and pewter bowls and cache pots, china items including snuff boxes and wicker baskets.

"She is said to have had a standing order for china blanks (unpainted china) with fine factories all over the world such as Limoges, Haviland, Saxony, Satsuma and Setji," says Wgsberg. She adds that Cleveland's art deco and art nouveau works appeared in a 1979 copy of "Antiques" magazine.

Cleveland made major contributions to the artistic world in Gresham by serving many years as the chairman of the arts department and flower sections at the county fair. Her husband, Charles, was mayor of Gresham. The Cleveland home still stands, now a home for the elderly at 115 NE 10th Drive. Cleveland Street is named after the family.

"Mr. Cleveland is said to have started the Baptist church and instituted the Multnomah County Fair in Gresham," says Wogsberg. "They gave the land where Gresham High School now stands, and Running Springs Ranch on Hogan Road was part of heir claim."

The Clevelands had three children, Charles, Wendell and Maude, all deceased. Information on the family came from Margaret Ott Sluman, a cousin of the family, who has loaned many Cleveland works for the display.

The Cleveland exhibit will continue through June at city hall.

The deceased was a member of Al Kader shrine, Portland; A. F. & A. M. in Gresham, and a charter member of the Order

of Eastern Star here.

Native Daughter of City Dies on Monday

Mrs. Charles (Annie) Cleveland, considered the oldest nativeborn resident of Gresham, died Monday at her home. Mrs. Cleveland, who was widely known in the west as a fair judge and also as a gifted painter of China, had been in failing health for some time. Despite that, she had set up the art exhibit at the Multnomah County Fair Sunday and was preparing to go to the fairgrounds Monday when she becaume ill.

Mrs. Cleveland, who has been superintendent of the art department for the Multnomah County Fair asociation the last 20 years, was the widow of Charles Cleveland, who passed away about 5

years ago. Mr Cleveland, former mayor of Gresham, was a member of the Multnomah County Fair board 15 years and before that a member of the Oregon State Fair board.

Mrs. Cleveland's family came to what is now Gresham so many years ago that even the old timers don't remember the exact date. She was born Margaret Ann Tomlinson, March 22, 1869, in Gresham. She was 79 years old at the time of her death. She grew up in Gresham and married Charles Cleveland Sept. 8, 1884 at Vancouver, Wash.

The Clevelands were prominent in the growth of Gresham and both Cleveland avenue and the Cleveland Addition are named after the family. Mrs. Cleveland was a member of the Bethel Baptist Church and a charter member of the Gresham chapter of Order of Eastern Star No. 117. She was a past matron of the Troutdale O.E.S.

Mrs. Cleveland used to tell many anecdotes of the Indian wars that were still going on when she was a child and of the Gresham of early days when less than 20 people lived in the area-

Longtime fruit stand operator dies

Gresham farmer Felix Chiodo, who ran a popular roadside produce stand in Gresham for nearly seven decades, died Monday in Portland hospital after an extended illness. He was 87.

The funeral will be at 11 a.m. Thursday in St. Anne Catholic Church, 1015 S.E. 182nd Ave.

Chiodo, the son of James and Maria Chiodo, was a lifelong resident of East Multnomah County. He lived at the family's fruit and vegetable farm on Powell Boulevard, not far from downtown Gresham.

Chiodo, who attended Gresham schools, farmed all his life except during the Great Depression when he went to work for Columbia Brick Co. in Gresham.

In 1917, Chiodo opened a strawberry stand on Powell in front of his farm. In an interview in 1985, he said it was the state's first roadside fruit stand. It became a wellknown landmark in east county and continued under his supervision for nearly 70 years until a road project to widen Powell forced its closure in 1986.

In its last years, the stand, which featured strawberries, apple cider and various fruits and vegetables, was operated by Chiodo's children and grandchildren.

Chiodo was a member of St. Anne Catholic Church, the Pleasant Valley Grange, the Multnomah County Farm Bureau and the Gresham Historical Society. For many years, Chiodo played the accordian with the Charlie Dahlquist Band at the Springers Dance Hall in Pleasant Valley.

He is survived by his wife, Elsie, to whom he was married on Oct. 8, 1927, in Oregon City; three sons, Edward of Rancho Cordova, Calif., and Robert and Gary, both of Portland; a daughter, Nancy Delano of Palo Alto, Calif.; five grandchildren; and six greatgrandchildren.

Produce-stand pioneer dies at 87

Felix Anthony Chiodo, a native of Gresham whose produce stand on West Powell Boulevard became an East Multnomah County landmark, died Monday.

Chiodo, 87, died at a Portlandhospital after an extended illness.

He was born to James and Maria Chiodo on Feb. 5, 1900, on the farm on East Powell Boulevard at about 194th where he lived his entire life. He attended Gresham schools before becoming a full-time farmer. He was a farmer all of his life, except for a brief period during the Depression when he was employed at Columbia Brick Works.

When Mr. Chiodo was 17, he planted 1½ acres of strawberries, planning to sell the fruit to a cannery, he told The Outlook in a May 1985 interview. One day, he set out a few boxes of berries on a plank balanced on a fence in front of his parents' home. He sold every strawberry he grew that year to passers by.

From then on, for nearly 70 years, he operated a roadside stand. Eventually it was so successful that he built a shed and sold produce such as

corn, tomatoes, squash, potatoes and pumpkins, and homemade apple cider by the glass.

He married his wife, Elsie, on Oct. 8, 1927, and the newlyweds moved into a three-room house on the south part of his parents' 23-acre farm.

They performed as musicians throughout the area, Mr. Chiodo on the accordion and Mrs. Chiodo on the ukelele. For many years Mr. Chiodo played with the Charlie Dahlquist Band at Springers Dance Hall, later Springers Flea Market.

Together the Chiodos operated the produce stand, Mr. Chiodo handling the produce end and Mrs. Chiodo taking care of the business end, she said in the 1985 interview.

Eventually they planted about 15 acres of raspberries, and each year families from Portland spent the raspberry season on their farm picking berries. In the early years, the pickers lived in tents. Later they stayed in wooden huts the Chiodos built.

For the last several years, their granddaughters, Sue Coleman and Sandra Chiodo, managed the business. The stand was forced to close in 1986 because of a highway project to widen and straighten Powell Boulevard.

The couple sold 20 acres of their farm in 1971. They kept about three

acres, including the three-room house, which they had enlarged over the years to accommodate their family.

Mr. Chiodo was a member of St. Anne Catholic Church, where he and his wife recently celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. He also was a member of Pleasant Valley Grange, the Multnomah County Farm Bureau and the Gresham Historical Society.

Mr. Chiodo is surived by his wife, Elsie Chiodo of Gresham; his children, Edward Chiodo of Rancho Cordova, Calif., Robert Chiodo of Portland, Nancy Delano of East Palo Alto, Calif., and Dr. Gary Chiodo of Portland; five grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

Casterline's life celebrated

About 350 friends, family members and co-workers celebrated the life — rather than mourning the death — of Polly Casterline during a memorial Monday in Portland for the Multnomah County commissioner, who died last week of cancer.

They brought with them laughter in paying tribute to Casterline's playful sense of humor. They came looking forward, as speaker after speaker said Casterline had. And they pledged to continue what they proudly remembered as Casterline's unwavering service and commitment to others.

"She wouldn't expect us to be sad today," Gladys McCoy, chairwoman of the county Board of Commissioners, told those gathered in the First Congregational Church in the South Park Blocks. "She would expect us to continue to celebrate life and serve to the end, just like she did," McCoy said.

Casterline, 65, who was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in October, died Thursday in her Troutdale home. Despite debilitating chemotherapy, she continued almost daily contact with her county office and constituents and participated in board meetings over a speaker phone from her home.

The Rev. Lincoln Reed, minister

emeritus of First Congregational, told those gathered for the service that when he last visited Casterline the Monday morning before she died, she was "busy with her staff."

"In retrospect, with the last ounce of her energy and the last second of her life," Reed said, Casterline continued to serve others.

Besides spending the last two years of her life working for constituents in District 4 and especially supporting countywide health and social programs, Casterline had been heavily involved in activities at Mt. Hood Community College. Trained as a teacher after receiving a degree in medieval history from the University of Oregon, she taught in the Oakridge and Portland public schools from 1947 to 1955. She was elected to two four-year terms on the Mt. Hood Community College board of directors, serving from 1976 to

"In the beginning were the Casterlines, and then came Mt. Hood Community College," Paul Kreider, the school's president, remembered to laughter during the service Monday. "Polly was very much involved in the founding of Mt. Hood Community College," and her husband, George, a retired dentist, was a member of the board of founding trustees, Kreider noted.

Kreider said Polly Casterline

had brought "focus and cohesiveness into the (college board's) decision-making process," while others pointed to the unique way she had blended common sense and idealism.

"I want to say that Polly was 'Polly-dimensional,' "Reed said to lighthearted groans from those who appreciated Casterline's sense of humor. "Much has been said about her puns, and that was part of her ability to look at things from a rare perspective," he said.

She didn't hestitate to let others know what that perspective was, several at the memorial recalled. "When she had an opinion, she spoke her mind; she didn't shilly-shally," said the Rev. Royald V. Caldwell, another First Congregational minister emeritus, who had known Casterline and her family for years.

And while her way of looking at things often led to controversial stands, Casterline's eldest son, Milton, pointed out that his mother didn't get flustered, didn't put on airs and didn't ever quit caring.

"She had a consistent character," Milton Casterline said, telling stories about how she broke her ankle rolling on campfire logs with her children and how she wasn't concerned about punishment but instead about what could be learned after he had started a fire in their barn as a youngster.

"She was the same mother as she was a board member," he said.



1999 Citizen of the Year Florence Carroll dies at 84

Florence Carroll, who nurtured a community, loved its children and buried its dead, died Tuesday morning in her Gresham home of cancer at the age of 84.

A memorial service for the woman named Gresham's Citizen of the Year in 1999 will be at 11 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 16, in First Baptist Church, 224 W. Powell Blvd., Gresham.

"I have always been in awe of Florence," said former Gresham Mayor Gussie McRobert. "If each of us contributed to our community one-tenth of what Florence did, we'd be in very good shape."

Carroll's list of Gresham firsts began in 1945 when she started the first United Fund Drive in the community. She and two friends launched what would become the Toy and Joy program. In the funeral home which she managed with her husband, Lew, she and others created an aid program from shoe boxes full of index cards bearing the names of needy families that evolved into Snow-CAP. She started the first Campfire Girl program, was one of the founders of Mount Hood Community College and served 50 years as leader and secret banker of a 4-H equestrian group.

"She was always strength," remembers Bonnie Irwin, lifelong Gresham resident and wife of former Outlook publisher Lee Irwin. "Strength was in her walk and in her talk and in everything she did."

Though Carroll never spoke of it, her life was shaped by hardship. She was born Feb. 22, 1916, in Underwood, Minn., to Charles and Annie Battleson Brown. When she was 12, her father abandoned her mother and nine children.

"They were dirt poor and abandoned in the plains of Minnesota with no social services, no Social

Security. She was the second oldest and took a lot of responsibility," says her son, Kelly Carroll.

In July at the Multnomah County Fair, the Mount Hood 4-H Equestrian Team honored Carroll for a half-century of horse sense. Carroll, who mucked her own stalls until the age of 80, once said: "Why deprive your children? When they ask for the moon, why don't you say, 'Wouldn't you rather have a horse?'"

In at least one case, friends say, she bought a child a horse. Kelly Carroll said he learned only recently that his mother kept money from a Montana land inheritance to pay unexpected costs for the equestrian group. For that reason, the family suggests donations in her memory to Mount Hood 4-H Equestrian team at Merchants Bank in Gresham.

Carroll was a founding member of Soroptimist and named a Patron Saint of Mt. Hood Community College in 1974. She worked on the Oral Hull Foundation for the Blind garden in Sandy, won a preservationist award from the Gresham Historical Society, attended First Baptist Church for 50 years, took on foster children and followed her own two children and grandchildren through sports and school events.

She was a teacher in Estacada when she met Lew Carroll. The two were married June 12, 1942, in Rhode Island when he was in the Navy. After the war they returned to Gresham to join his father in the family business, Carroll Funeral Home. For 20 years she was the only licensed female funeral director in Oregon. They retired in 1984. Lew Carroll died in 1995.

She is survived by her daughter, Kacy Carroll of Nampa, Idaho; son, Kelly Carroll of Gresham; brother, Lynn Brown of Riverside, Calif.; sisters, Bernice Waye of Elbowlake, Minn., and Lucille Satter of Portland; and four grandchildren.

GRESHAM — Florence Carroll displayed just one award in her tidy ranch house: a green plaque for 50 years of service to 4-H, hung above the telephone.

She had the others stored away. "Patron saint" of Mt. Hood Community College. Founder of the east Multnomah County Toy & Joy drive. Woman of Dedication. Greater Gresham Citizen of the Year.

Mrs. Carroll, who devoted more

than half her life to community service, died of cancer Tuesday at her home. She was 84.

"If all of us did just a

tenth of the things Florence did, this community would never have to worry," said Carol Nielson-Hood, executive director of the Gresham Area Chamber of Commerce. "She was just a part of our lives, everywhere we looked. When she saw a need, she took the time to fill it."

Mrs. Carroll grew up on a Minnesota farm and worked as a maid

in order to attend high school and in the funeral home basement to college. She hitchhiked to Oregon and took a job as a grade-school art teacher in Estacada when she was 23.

She met her late husband, Lew, at a basketball game. He asked her to hold his letterman's jacket while he officiated the game; she kept it all her life.

They were married June 12, 1942. The couple moved to Gresham after Lew returned from World War II service in the South Pacific. They took over his family's mortuary, Carroll Funeral Home, which they ran until he had a heart attack in 1984.

Florence Carroll lived by her favorite saying: If something needs to be done, do it yesterday.

teaching kids how to ride while guiding 4-H. She quietly paid for new bridles and children's dues.

"It's hard to imagine somebody who was so focused on service." said her son, Kelly Carroll of Gresham. "You don't teach people to do that. They just have it in their heart."



with gusto, embraced his terminal illness in the same way, living his last year on an oxygen tank, but still riding in a flashy Corvette and singing the praises of caregivers at Mt. Hood Hospice. He had a "short list" of people he wanted to see before he died, and on Oct. 4 at his last public appearance, sat with Portland auto dealer Ron Tonkin and Jerome Kersey, former Trail Blazer, at the Mt. Hood Hospice auction.

Carlson, who once said that he couldn't afford advertising and needed a gimmick, was famous for his signature stunt, a skate journey in a Santa Claus suit across the notyet dedicated Glenn Jackson Bridge on Dec. 21, 1982.

"It was uphill the whole bloody way," he said last year, remembering the unwise decision to skate from Oregon to Washington, instead of the other direction. "Now I can't even walk upstairs. Look how things have changed."

Carlson glommed on to the idea to skate from state to state after a suggestion by his wife, Janie, and daughter, Nancy Jaksich. Jaksich tipped off television newsman Dick Bogle, who caught up with the redsuited Carlson on the windy, blustery bridge.

Though he was about to give up,

wind of publicity at his back and Bugle's encouragement. "That man talked me all the way across," he said. Law enforcement officers with flashing lights and severe expressions waited at the other end, but relented in the glare of publicity and Carlson's contagious enthusiasm — "You wouldn't give Santa a ticket?"

As a businessman, he took even greater risks in 1968 when he made the leap from being a Union Avenue used car dealer to buying the Ralph Richardson Chevrolet dealership in Sandy.

"At the time, they (Chevrolet) weren't that cordial to used-car dealers," Carlson remembered in 1993 on the 25th anniversary of the Sandy dealership. The Carlsons had to sell their home to make the purchase and he broke the news to Janie, then in New York on a fashion-buying trip for Charles F. Berg, that they would move to Sandy.

"Remember Sandy," he told the stylish Janie. "The town we go through on our way to skiing? That's where we are moving."

The move was not that big a reach for Carlson, who was born in 1923 in his family home at Orient.

In a 1993 reminiscence in The Sandy Post, Carlson said sales averaged seven cars and trucks a month in the beginning and "in the Carlson was bolstered by the hot glory years" soared to 800 vehicles

a year, and more than a 1,100 counting leased cars. With 45 employees, the Sandy dealership was one of the town's major employers.

"He was grand marshal of the Mountain Festival parade this summer," said friend Bill Hunter, former Outlook publisher. "It took a lot of strength for him, but people yelled all along the route, 'Hi, Pete. Hi, Pete.' Never, Mr.

Carlson, but Pete."

Pete and Janie Carlson rode a Corvette in the parade. The sports car became a specialty and Carlson sponsored the Rose City Corvette Club. Sales prizes took the couple all over the world, permitting him to climb a pyramid, cruise the Greek Isles and, as it turned out, discover skating in Stanley Park in Vancouver, B.C., Canada. He eventually moved on to roller blades, and at 64, skated 42 miles in a benefit for Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

Carlson retired in December 1995, selling his dealership to his daughter, Nancy Jaksich and her husband, Jerry, forming the Suburban Auto Group. Son Jerry Carlson runs Carlson's Suburban Trailer Sales.

Produce and preservation rooted life

Elsie Kuhnhausen Chiodo loved things that grew, except developments that gobbled up farmland

Elsie Kuhnhausen, daughter of a German butcher, and Felix Chiodo, son of an Italian farmer, made a good team, and because of that their farm prospered.

Elsie was the business end; Felix did the farming. Their Powell Boulevard produce stand, which opened in 1918 and was said to be the state's first roadside fruit stand, became a Gresham landmark.

For more than 70 years, the Chiodos (pronounced CHY-do) operated a 23-acre farm that had been in Felix's family since 1899. They farmed mostly berries and sweet corn, and made a living at it. Work was seven days a week, and the days were long but happy for

Then Gresham grew right out around them. Skyrocketing property taxes forced them to sell 20 acres. The land was paved to build apartments and widen Powell.

Elsie was disgusted. She cringed at what she called trading "potatoes for pavement." As she continued to grow vegetables and fruit on

her remaining 21/2 acres, she fought to preserve farmland.

She wrote to city planners, newspapers, senators, mayors and commissioners, on everything from land use to tax deferral and zoning. She circulated petitions, which she called "clipboarding." She was not afraid to lock horns with anyone, and when there was a meeting, she was there.

To her dying day, her abiding concern was vanishing farmland and the prospect of worldwide famine. "Where will food come from to feed everybody?" she asked. She advised her children to seek more lucrative and stable occupations.

Elsie Kuhnhausen graduated from high school in Oregon City. At 18, Elsie, a Lutheran, met Felix, an Italian Catholic; her conversion was not up for debate. To supplement their income, Elsie played the banjo uke and Felix the accordion. They had four children.

Elsie made some of the best Italian food, and her husband made homemade sauerkraut, but she sometimes served both pasta and potatoes. And the family always ate the bruised produce. "Don't throw that out," she always said. "It's perfectly good."

She spent so many years without money that when she got it, she refused to spend it. She liked Taco Bell for free coffee. And she

hated gifts so much her family composed a ditty: "I don't want it, I

don't need it, I can't use it, take it back."

Elsie retired when Felix's health declined in the 1980s. They had been married 60 years when he died in 1987. She got involved in the Gresham Historical Society, contributed to books on Gresham's history, and received volunteer and pioneer awards. At the museum, she organized documents, polished the brass and scrubbed every window.

She had breast cancer but beat it. Her vision failed, but she was not undone. She became a fitness buff; for-years she worked out at a gym three times a week until age 93, hauling homegrown vegetables in the bus to share with employees.

She continued to love to see things grow. If it was green, she liked it, and if it was green, and you could eat it, so much the better.

She lived on the same land from age 18 until shortly before her death May 20, 2004, at 94.

People still buy fresh fruit at the produce stand on Powell Boulevard. But the surrounding land that used to sprout raspberries now houses a 440-unit apartment complex. And her four children took her advice. None works the land.

"We as a community have suffered a plethora of varied emotions," said Paula Gubrud-Howe, dean of the school's Allied Health Division.

Among the feelings expressed by students and staff, there was tangible joy at the privilege of getting to know Classen.

Her students remembered not only the challenges she presented to them, and the large amounts of homework she assigned, but they also remembered her less traditional teaching methods.

"She certainly was not a conventional teacher," said Tony Davais, a second year student in the medical picture Classen asking herself two assistant program.

Classen was known for bringing a bag of neckties to class, and making her students wear them as she videotaped mock-interviews. The intent was so the students could see how they presented themselves in business situations.

"Field trips" of sorts were often part of Classen's curriculum as she taught her students appropriate etiquette for business lunches.

"EveAnn was the epitome of the successful woman," Davais said, describing Classen as being influential, compassionate, graceful and

inspirational.

Always impeccably dressed, Classen was both an entertainer and an educator, Davais said.

He remembered being surprised to see Classen on campus late in the evening one day, wearing "very neat, pressed jeans," which although still nice, were far from her usual attire of a suit and high heels.

When he inquired as to why she was on campus so late, she told him she'd come back to take a welding class.

Classen had a hunger for knowledge, and always wanted to learn something new her peers said.

Gubrud-Howe said she could questions everyday, "What will I wear today?" and "What will I learn today?"

"The best of EveAnn was joy," said Carole Wickham, medical office program coordinator. "She was hilarious."

Medical office student Alanna Carabott agreed. "EveAnn was a celebration in a teensy little package," she said. "She made us laugh everyday."

Beyond Classen's humor was also a deep sense of caring, and a desire to help her students succeed. Classen, whose family

could not afford to put her through college, struggled to put herself through school and has an innate desire to help her own students succeed, Gubrud-Howe said.

"She had a special bond with everyone of these students in her own special way," Davais said. "She radiated energy in everything she did."

When Classen would return papers to her students, there would always be comments on them, not just praise for excellent work, but things of a personal nature inquiring about the health of a family member, or the welfare of a pet, Davais remembered.

Classen's caring nature was also evident to everyone that knew her in the way she talked about her two sons.

"She really couldn't contain her endless love and pride in her sons," Wickham said.

Davais and Carabott both remember how often Classen mentioned her sons in her classes, and said they feel as if they know them, even though they had never met them.

"Heels not withstanding, we've all been made a little bit taller by EveAnn," Carabott said.

Despite the circumstances of her death, Classen's coworkers are focusing on the positive.

"My choice is to remember EveAnn at her very best in this life," Wickham said.

Farmer/developer dies at 87

Gresham | Ralph Clinton was working to use his land to revamp Pleasant Valley

Ralph Clinton, who for decades harvested hay on his family homestead, the Butler Big Oak Century Farm, died Tuesday, April 3, 2007, at age 87.

For most of the past eight years, the farmer and master carpenter had been working on a plan to develop his land with high-quality custom homes, as one of the first new residential neighborhoods in Pleasant Valley.

According to his family, Clin-

ton "wanted to see this development come to fruition as his legacy to the community." The farm, on Southwest Butler Road, was established in 1878 by Clinton's great-grandmother, Euphemia Butler, and had been in the family since.

Though he did not live to see the new houses, family members say they will carry out Clinton's vision for the property. The 54-home, large-lot project — scheduled to break ground late this summer — is a collaboration between developer Mike McKeel and Persimmon Development Group, with the homes expected to reflect the craftsman era in which Clinton grew up, according to Persimmon's Brian Lessler.

"He had the spirit of a pioneer

... who lives close to the land," Lessler recalled Thursday of Clinton, "and a twinkle in his

Interviewed last year during his final hay harvest, Clinton acknowledged it was hard to see development overtake the area but added: "We know it's going to happen, so it has to happen." He insisted on quality, even making a concession on land price, McKeel said, to attract the right kind of developers.

About two acres of the 17-acre farm will be preserved, including a home that Clinton built, a landmark oak tree, and a tiny pioneer cemetery.

A memorial service for Clinton will be at 11 a.m. Wednesday at Gresham Funeral Chapel, 257 S.E. Roberts Ave.

Farmer: Ralph wanted 'quality' development

Portland's Old Town to help with the harvest, and until 1979, lived in the historic and drafty old farm house built about 1900 on what was known as Lone Oak Farm.

Rooted on 19 acres - now 17 — at the corner of Butler and Rodlun roads, he and his wife, Bessie, saw the historic farm named an Oregon Century Farm in 1985. He died last week after a brief illness, anticipating that 15 acres of the farm will now grow houses as a high-end residential development, the first in Gresham's Pleasant Valley plan. A farm home he built himself, the historic oak tree planted by his ancestor, Euphemia Butler, and a gravesite where her two children are believed to be buried, will be preserved.

"He wanted the sale of the land to pay for his grandchildren's education, but most of them are out of school now," said his son, Carl, of Portland. "So it will be up to us to see to that legacy."

One thing is sure, said his son, Keith of Bend, "Dad wanted quality." They remember that their father once quit a carpenter job because he refused to do sloppy work.

"After he built the house, he spent two years looking for putty the right color to finish the nail holes," Carl Clinton remembered.

Ralph was a volunteer for the Gresham Historical Society and helped rebuild the Bethel Baptist Church, later destroyed by an arson fire in May 2004.

Born Ralph Newton Clinton on

Jan. 23, 1920, in Portland to Samuel and Etta (Vollum) Clinton, he graduated from Gresham High School in 1938. Clinton started work on the family farm before his parents could afford a tractor, helping to till the field with a single-bottomed plow pulled by horse. After high school, he went to work at the Oregon shipyards at St. John's, building templates for every piece of steel that went into the Liberty Ships. His construction experience sent him to the South Pacific as a member of the Navy's first World War II construction unit, even before the term "Seabee" was coined. As part of the Third Naval Construction Battalion, Ralph followed the Marines to Pago Pago, Eniwetok, Kwajalein, Engebi and Manus Island.

Still in the Navy, he met Bessie

McDaniel at a dance in Seattle. They were married June 8, 1946, and he convinced her to live on a farm.

"My father practically gave me the place," Ralph Clinton said in a 1990 interview with *The Gresham Outlook*. He and Bessie moved to the farm as newlyweds and raised three children there.

"We didn't have any extra money to spend," he remember in 1990, "though we did mange to buy a new car in 1951."

A severe freeze in the winter in 1955 destroyed Ralph's crops and forced him to go to work as a carpenter in Portland, where a steady paycheck and prospects of a pension kept him at the job. He and Bessie raised their last berry crop in 1980. But the Clintons continued to raise beef cattle and hay. Bessie Clinton died in February

2006.

After retirement from carpentry work in 1982, the Clintons traveled to Seabee reunions. He was an avid fisherman and hunter, and in his younger days, led a 4-H photography club and was an assistant Scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 289. He was a 51-year member of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners.

He is survived by his sons, Carl Clinton of Portland and Keith Clinton of Bend, daughter, Irene Rathmann of Portland, as well as eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, and a sister, Nellie, of Redmond.
