

He wanted to be a submariner, but at 6-feet-4-inches tall, enlisted in the Army in 1942 to serve in World War II. He took a piece of shrapnel in Holland and spent two months in an English hospital.

He was honorably discharged in 1945 with the rank of private, 1st class. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Silver Star for his service.

On July 8, 1944, he married Augusta "Gussie" Lofstedt in Colorado Springs, Colo. They moved to Corbett in 1945 and to Gresham in 1977. He worked at the Bridal Veil Lumber and Box Company from 1945 until the company closed in 1960.

Kendrick worked as a maintenance mechanic for the city





Rudy E. Klobas

Sally King leaves behind a legacy of volunteering from the heart

Longtime Latourell resident died Friday

Some called Sally King the queen of Vista House.

Others described the Latourell resident, who died April 26 in a Portland hospital at age 77, as the heart of the historic visitor center on Crown Point.

Either title worked for the woman who swept her hair up into a crown and went to work for 31 years at a humble desk in a

downstairs storeroom of the landmark building. King coordinated volunteers, helped with the gift shop and spent considerable time coping with leaks in the basement.

When Vista House celebrated its 100th birthday last year. Teresa Kasner, first manager of the Vista House Project, described her relationship with King: "I was the head and she was the heart ..."

Ultimately King became a part-time employee, but her efforts went well beyond paid hours. In 2006, she was recognized for an estimated 10,000 volunteer hours by Oregon Parks and Recreation Department and later won the department's Stewart Volunteer Award for her contributions to the site, which is an Oregon State Park. She retired in 2015 but continued to work and volunteer in other roles.

Until shortly before her last illness, King also volunteered in the museum of the Troutdale Historical Society.

King had mobility issues and did not like to volunteer alone anymore, but arranged for friends to share her volumeer shift, said LeAnn Stephan, Troutdale Historical Society

executive director.

A resident of Latourell Falls since the 1970s, King was twice evacuated for fires in the Columbia River Gorge. She was featured in The Outlook in September 2017 when she, as well as a single mother and two children living with her, along with three dogs, fled the Eagle Creek Fire. King spent a week

in the Red Cross shelter at Troutdale hoping that her home, along with batch of wandering chickens and the feral cats she fed,' would survive. Firefighters saved the structures at Latourell, and she was able to return to the house she and her husband built

in the 1970s.

A lifelong resident of the area, she was born in Portland on Oct. 10 1941, to Evelyn and Carl Kruger. She attended Pleasant Valley Grade School and graduated from Gresham High. She was one of three siblings and is survived by her brother, Kip Kruger, Happy Valley, as well as foster daughter, Dallas Wilkie.

Sally met her husband, Ivan King, at church. He was an outdoorsman, rock hound, fisherman and hunter, and she hunted deer and elk in Eastern Oregon with him.

"After 15 years he finally realized she would never shoot one," wrote Margaret Rice in a profile on King in the Troutdale Historical Society newsletter last year.

Ivan King died 22 years ago. Sally King remained active all her life in the Bridal Veil Community Church and was also a member and officer of the Portland Women's Forum.

Remembering former County Commissioner Sharron Kelley

Advocate for parks, community services, libraries, died July 11

ormer Metro regional government and Multnomah County Commissioner Sharron Elayne Kelley died Thursday, July 11.

Kelley served as a Metro councilor from 1983 to 1989,

when she became the ^SMultnomah County ^ECommissioner for District 4. She held that post from 1989 until Så 2000. District 4 covers most of East Mult-'nomah County, north of the Clackamas border and east to the "Hood River County ^{li}border.

The district includes the cities of Gresham, Wood Village, Fairview and Troutdale.

During her tenure, Kelley focused on improving parks and sewers, her husband Larry Kelly said.

"She just had a really desire to help people," Larry said. East County was not developing like she thought it should, the got sewers going. She did so many things."

Investing in the sewer system helped improve East Mult-

nomah County's infrastructure, and attracted more businesses to the area.

After she left office, the county commissioner who took her position dedicated the conference room on the second floor of the Multnomah County Health Center, at 600 N.E. Eighth St., in Gresham, as the Sharron Kelley Room.

Kelley was instrumental in making sure the county provided strong health services in East Multnomah County. That's why she received the naming honor, said Gary Hansen who

served with Kelley on both the Metro and Multnomah County boards.

Hansen and Kelley were generally on the same page about most issues. On the occasion when they ended opposing each other, Hansen would took another look at the initiative since Kelley was often

better versed in the material. "When I'd get a staff report, I'd skim over something, and find that I can support it — then Sharron would read every word and ask questions about it." Hansen said. "She was so thorough, and so conscientiousness - sometimes in politics that doesn't always happen."

Hansen added Kelley was a wonderful person.

"She was the finest public official I had the pleasure to serve with," Hansen said."It's an incredible loss. She was just a very special public servant."

Robert Trachtenberg, county commissioner staff assistant, reiterated Kelley was dedicated to giving back:

She was a great commissioner and a great person to work for. She was very dedicated. She worked long hours," Trachtenberg said.

Kelley expected her staff to work hard. When a phone rang, someone was expected to answer.

"She did not believe in voicemail as a way to represent constituents," Trachtenberg said. "So we were always on the hook to do that."

Kelley also supported parks, libraries, social services and While she has a room named law enforcement.

"They were services she cared about, and she also wanted to improve the perception of government by residents of East County," Trachtenberg said. "So it was important to her that the county was listening to them, and the county was responsive."

One farge project she was involved with was transferring the

county library system from the nonprofit Library Association of Portland, to Multnomah County.

'It made them more accountable and transparent," Trachtenberg said. "The asso-ciation was not visible at times."

There were occasional issues with the nonprofit, and the switch made it easier to build public trust.

"The changes weren't immediate, but it helped set the stage for the next 30 years," Trachtenberg said.

Larry remembered his wife as a great person to share a partnership with, both in business and at home.

"She was the kindest, nicest person and just loved humanity, and the county," Larry said. "Particularly, she was always thinking positive about doing everything,"

January 7, 1923 was a chilly day in Blanca, Colorado: only a high of -4C or 28 degrees F. William Charles Strayer Kitchen (Harold) was born to Katherine (Hard) and Harold Robert Kitchen. It may have been a chilly day but just two weeks before, mother and unborn child had gone riding and enjoyed a gallop over fields, jumping ditches

It wasn't a very comfortable day for driving an open car the twenty some miles from Alamosa to Blanca and the doctor didn't manage to arrive on time. As a matter of fact it was a few days before he got around to stopping by the Kitchen home where he found experienced midwife and grandmother (Margaret Strayer) had done right by mother and child. Somehow he also didn't manage to fill out the birth certificate correctly and baby acquired Strayer as part of his name. This oversight was not discovered for many years until - grown now and looking for work, he needed his birth certificate and found the error. Because he was the first born son the family decided that Junior was a fitting name to hang on the little fellow and he began to be called Harold after his father. That alias also went undiscovered for many years. By that time the name had stuck and he was known to most people as Harold as long as he lived. Daughter Nancy always knew what part of his life an old friend came from by the name he was called. If he was called Bill it was someone from his military past. If it was Jr., it was a distant relative, Harold and it was a local friend, William and it was probably a doctor's office. No matter the name he was always himself.

Harold married Lura Elnora (Margie) Davenport on August 16, 1942. Their family grew to include Nancy, Barbara, David and Bill. In addition they opened their home to several teens in need and lovingly fostered them for a number of years. Daughter, Barbara and foster daughters Martha and Carol

predeceased him. Harold served honorably in the Army Airborne in the South Pacific and even though he received a bullet wound which removed the top of a vertebrae he went on to work on the green chain in a local mill and run and work hard at manual labor and do all the work of any vigorous man of his acquaintance. He always felt incredibly blessed that God had seen fit to allow that vigor. The outcome could have been so much different. The family proudly displays the purple heart award he earned because of that wound. He was hospitalized and away from his unit for about six months before creatively finding a way to return to them. Harold was a quick and intelligent man and was chosen by the Army especially because of his ability to think sharply. He was a cryptographer and received many important messages, some of which undoubtedly changed the course of

Because he was a sharp thinker and a man of strong convictions, he was asked by the neighbors to run for an open position on the local school board. He served on the Bull Run and Sandy High School boards as well as the Cliffside Cemetery board and the church Elder board for many years. Because he worked shift work as a hydroelectric operator, serving on those boards was done at great expense to himself. He never complained but the fatigue showed in his face and sometimes the older children and Marge worried about him. He provided pack donkeys for Youth Adventures and Wilderness Trails organizations. These organizations were designed to give troubled youth an opportunity to develop in an outdoor setting where it was challenging to carry one's own pack and learn teamwork. They were given an opportunity to learn of the love God showed toward them by giving his son, Jesus Christ as a sacrifice to cover the cost of their sin. For many it was the first time



they were loved. Let alone loved by God. In addition to serving the needs of troubled youth, he provided the means for guiding youth from the church. He worked at the power plant, farmed his property, served on the local boards, taught youth and never complained at the work required. His family never suffered because of his faithful service because he was a steady, hard worker. He was not afraid of personal growth and continued to work on his relational skills until the day he died. Seldom did he even advocate for himself. He had a true servant heart and was generous with his time, resources and finances. Harold was not a perfect man and he was grateful to his heavenly Father for providing him with forgiveness which leads to eternal life. As he lay on his deathbed he would often break into conversations with his Lord and he was never afraid that he would not "go to heaven". He was loved and safe and he believed it with a strong abiding faith. Harold went to be with the Lord on Sunday, October 31, 2021. He was 98 years old. A funeral service was held on Saturday, November 6, 2021, at Sandy Baptist Church. 
