Former chief of the Gresham volunteer firefighters and longtime Gresham resident Jerry D. Foreman died Monday, March 5, at a local care center. He was 83.

A celebration of life is scheduled for 11 a.m. Monday, March 12, at Gresham Funeral Chapel, 257 S.E. Roberts Ave. Private inurnment will take place at Forest Lawn Mausoleum.

Born Sept. 17, 1917, in Portland, he was the youngest of four children born to James and Annette Foreman. He was raised in the Portsmouth area of Portland before moving to Gresham, where he attended Gresham High School.

Following the lead of his older brothers, Foreman signed on as a volunteer firefighter for Gresham, moving up the ranks until he became chief in the late 1940s.

volunteer firefighters, dies

Formed in 1910, the all-volunteer department was chartered in 1927 and provided the only fire services available to residents of Gresham until the formation of a rural fire district in 1945.

Foreman oversaw the department for nore than 20 years, working with a complement of 20 or more volunteer firefighters. Crews assisted with car accidents, eported to drownings and emergency illlesses, as well as holding periodic fire rills in the schools and talks on fire pre-

While extinguishing fires was the primay service provided by the department durng Foreman's years, fighting fires in resham has always been unique, Foreman nce said, due to Mother Nature.

"Firefighters feared the time of high east inds," Foreman recalled during a 1993 terview. "A fire at the Rotary Cut box factory at Northeast Kelly in 1954 spread sparks from the \$100,000 blaze and ignit ed small fires all over the neighborhood."

Foreman kept journals of the volunteers activities, which told the tale of their professional and social calendars.

In "Gresham: Stories of Our Past," historians noted some of Foreman's journal entries while he presided over the volunteer department.

"Jan. 11, 1956: Twenty-three men in the department. Gordon Russell arranged for fire drills in school. A count of fire hydrants in the city showed 120."

Foreman also spoke of the status firefighters held in the community.

"There was a real social part of being a volunteer," he wrote in 1993. "In that way, it was like an exclusive club. There was a

waiting list of people who wanted to belong and the members had to vote them in. Two 'black balls' by the members and you were not accepted."

Foreman left the chief's position in 1964. He saw the family tradition continue when his son Jim became Gresham's first full-time paid firefighter in 1967 and his son Jerry joined the department in 1973. Gresham Fire made the move from volunteers to professionally trained firefighters in 1974.

Foreman worked for Hessel Motors and Wagner Mining Co. until his retirement in 1980.

He married June Hildebrant on March 14, 1941, in Portland. The couple was married 57 years before June Foreman died in January 1999.

In addition to his wife, Foreman was preceded in death by his brothers, Jim Foreman in 1993 and Claire Foreman in 2000.

Kazuo Fujii, Troutdale farmer and veteran, dies


Lifelong Troutdale farmer and World War II veteran Kazuo "Kaz" Fujii, 88, died Monday, Nov. 5, at his home.

Kaz was well-known in East County, where his family name graced the Fujii fruit, vegetable and berry farms throughout the area. Kaz was also one of the first draftees from East County during World War II, serving with the famed 442nd Regimental Combat Team, an Asian-American unit composed mostly of Japanese Americans who fought in the European theater.

Kaz was born Oct. 9, 1919, in Troutdale, the second of eight children, to Bukichi and Yoshino (Yamakado) Fujii, both Japanese immigrants. Kaz and his siblings attended Troutdale Grade School. He graduated from Gresham High School in 1937.

Everyone worked on the 49acre family farm on Cherry Park Road, where they raised cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli, brussels sprouts and berries; including

loganberries and
strawberries.

forever May 7, 1942. On that day,

several months after the Pearl

Harbor bombing, the Fujii family,

along with other Japanese-

American families in East County,

received orders to leave their farms and report to the Pacific Livestock Exposition Center in North Portland by May 12, as part of the infamous wartime Japanese internment.

Kaz himself did not go to the camp because he had already been inducted into the armed forces in June 1941. He attended training in Fort Warren, Wyo., and San Antonio and was stationed at posts in Texas, Georgia and Mississippi before being assigned to the 232nd Combat Engineer Company, within the 442nd Regimental Combat Team.

Less than a month after arriving in Naples, Italy, Kaz was injured June 27, 1944, when the munitions truck he was driving hit a land mine, throwing him into the air. Though he had a concussion and experienced tinnitus for the rest of his life, Kaz did not seek medical attention immediately.

Mershon believes that had Kaz been treated for his injuries, he would have received a Purple Heart for his service.

"He should have received a Purple Heart," Mershon said. "In fact, I think now I will write a letter to President Bush requesting a posthumous honor for Kaz."

Kaz continued to serve his tour through Italy and France, where

he bore witness to a number of gruesome battles during the war — scenes friends and family say never truly left his memory.

By the war's conclusion, Kaz had earned four battle stars and about one-half of Kaz's squadron had been killed in action or severely injured.

"He went through hell over there," Mershon said. "He saw a lot of things that changed him forever. And on top of that, he had to deal with the fact that he made it home, and many of his friends didn't."

The government allowed the Fujii family to return to the Troutdale farm in February 1945, and Kaz followed suit after his discharge in November 1945. At the conclusion of a long bus ride to Troutdale and a hike up the hill to his family's home, he told his mother, "I made it."

Kaz was shocked and disturbed, however, when he walked to Troutdale the following morning and discovered that several establishments still hung "No Japs Allowed" or "No Japs Wanted" signs in their windows.

"We didn't take that kind of junk," he said during an OPB special program recorded earlier this year entitled, "Oregon at War," which coincided with Ken Burn's seven-part documentary, "The War."

Remembering his early days in the Army when he and his fellow Japanese-American soldiers had to fight discrimination, he told OPB producer Eric Cain that his war has never really left him.

"I don't think I've ever really come back from that," Kaz said.

On Nov. 6, 1955, Kaz married May Nakata in Portland. May was born in Oregon, but spent the war years in Japan. Together the couple had two children, Tim and Karen.

Kaz continued to farm the land and in its heyday, Fujii farms encompassed multiple locations, totaling more than 450 acres of fruits, berries and vegetables.

"Kaz was a very hard-working fella," said Scott Cunningham, whose parents, Andrew and Charlotte Cunningham, tended the Fujii farm at Bukichi's request while the Fujii family was interned.

"[Kaz] was a farmer, that's what he knew and that's what he did. He really loved that part of his life," Cunningham said.

Over the years though, the face of the Fujii farms changed in stride with the rest of East County's land-scape. Today, Reynolds High School sits on the site of a former Fujii farm. Part of Legacy Mount Hood Medical Center also sits on a former Fujii farm. Other portions of the Fujii properties became residential housing developments,

including the Cherry Park, Sedona Park, Columbia Ridge and Columbia Crest areas. Kaz's nephew, Ray Fujii, oversees the Fujii farms still in operation, though for the most part, they are different locations than the ones farmed by Kaz.

His daughter, Karen Fujii-Lindberg, said that her father's favorite fruit was the strawberry.

berries when he was sick," she said. "The night he passed, his last meal was strawberries and ice cream. After he finished, he took my hand — and 20 minutes later, he was gone."

In his later years, Kaz was an avid Trail Blazers fan and held season tickets for many years. He also loved to play golf and was a long-time member of the Oregon Nissei Golf Club. He played at courses all over the area, though he practiced most frequently at the Gresham Golf Course. Kaz was proud of holding perfect attendance with the club and for receiving Golfer of the Year.

"One time, he even shot a holein-one," Karen said.

Kaz also cared for his wife for more than a decade, as her condition declined due to Alzheimer's, and she eventually moved from their home to the Glisan Care Center in Portland.

"He never missed a day to care and feed her," Karen said. "He would always plan his whole schedule around her."

Kaz was an active member of the Oregon Buddhist Temple in Southeast Portland and frequented Ikoi No Kai, a senior lunch program established by the Portland Japanese community in the 1970s.

Kaz also took an active role in raising thousands of dollars for World War II Memorials in Washington, D.C., and Los Angeles, both of which he had the opportunity to visit with family.

Even after retiring from the dayto-day Fujii farm business, Kaz maintained a large garden in his backyard, and was out there every spring, "even though we'd tell him not to," Karen said.

"He'd been a solid citizen of Troutdale for all those years, and he never got in an ounce of trouble," Cunningham said. "He was just that type of individual, and we'll all miss him."

A memorial service will be held at 3 p.m. Monday, Nov. 12, at the Oregon Buddhist Temple, 3720 S.E. 34th Ave., Portland. A private family inurnment will be held at Willamette National Cemetery with military honors.

Kaz was preceded in death by his wife April 15, 2001.
