Dr. Adix was born on March 31, 1873, in New Orleans, Louisiana. Part of his early years were spent in San Francisco, California, where his mother was an early woman physician. He was eight years old when the family moved to Portland.

A graduate of the old Portland high school in 1891, Henry Adix studied osteopathy for three years, after which he entered the University of Oregon Medical

School.

He was married on February 17, 1904, to Miss Carrie Ladd, member of a pioneer Portland family. Graduating from the medical school in 1907, he interned at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland. Following four years of practice in that city, Dr. Adix and his wife moved to Estacada, where he was a physician for the Portland Electric Power Company during its extensive power development program in that area.

Early in the year of 1919 the Adixes moved to Gresham, where they settled in the present residence on West Powell boulevard. Dr. Adix opened an office in the building at the corner of Main and First in which he practiced for the 28 years prior to his death.

Dr. Henry Victor Adix, for many years a practicing physician and surgeon in Gresham, died Saturday at his home at Gresham, following a schort illness. Services were held today in Finley's Morninglight chapel with the Rev. L. F. Evenson, curate of Trinity Episcopal church, officiating.

He was born in New Orleans, La., in 1873, and was graduated from University of Oregon Med-

ical school in 1907.

He was active in community affairs in Gresham and was a member of the Oregon State and Multnomah County Medical societies and of the Masonic lodge and Al Kader Shrine.

Surviving are his wife, Carrie Ladd Adix; son, Dr. H. V. Adix Jr., specialist with Portland offices and former commander in the navy; daughter, Mrs. Philip S. Fogg. Portland, and three grandchildren.

Dr. H.V. Adix died in 1947 at the age of 73. Dr. Adix moved to Gresham in 1919 and opened an office at the corner of Main and First streets, where he practiced for 28 years.

A Doctor Takes His Leave

For forty years Dr. Henry Victor Adix of Gresham, who died the other day, was a country doctor, as the phrase has it, and most of this long period of willing, cheerful service was in Gresham and roundabout. It is impressive to think of the thousands and thousands of people to whom he had ministered as a general practitioner. You get to know a lot of people, and to help a lot of people, when you have a country practice. This sort of doctoring has its special traditions, and to live up to them takes a good deal of casual unselfishness. And that way, of course, it is a real career. Dr. Adix lived up to the traditions.

He was, so his friends tell us, warmly disposed toward horses and dogs, and all sorts of animals, including our own kind, and had in his time owned and bred harness horses and Airedales. It followed that he was a great patron of sports-golf, basketball, baseball, football—and for fifteen years or so he always had a seat reserved at the boxing matches. Then, too, he was a musician of sorts and with all this he loved flowers. You might suppose that he never lacked for a topic that would please a patient, when he needed to interest one-and especially since he himself found life to be such a glad and interesting adventure. And as for medicine. he studied his profession almost to the day of his passing. Naturally, his folks and his friends will mourn him-but nevertheless they'll be glad that he was here such a long while.

Fond of Animals

A lover of animals and country life, Dr. Adix was a devoted fancier of Airedale dogs while at Estacada and, later at Gresham, owned several trotting horses which he entered in sulky races at the Multnomah County Fair and throughout the western circuit. He was also a sports enthusiast, and an ardent devotee of golf.

An energetic practitioner, Dr. Adix continued to minister to his many patients despite back injuries suffered in December, 1945 in a fall on icy pavement while making a call at a private home. Though failing in health since last October, he continued his office practice until Tuesday of last week.

At his home during the remainder of the week, he continued to advise patients by phone and write out prescriptions until Saturday. He died Saturday evening at approximately 6 o'clock.

Dr. Adix was a member of the Oregon State and Multnomah County Medical Societies, Masonic Lodge, Al Kader Shrine, the Grange and Odd Fellows.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Carrie Ladd Adix, of Gresham; one son, Dr. H. V. Adix, Jr., of Portland and Oswego; one daughter, Mrs. Philip S. Fox, of Pasadena, California, and three grandsons.

Originally, the general manager of Hessel Chrysler Plymouth, he returned to work for the Hessel companies after retiring from a career in the military and continued to report to do bookkeeping and other duties for a small leasing company until he was 90.

"He was quite a spirit," said Don Hessel, who described Allesina as "incredibly close to our family. He was more like a brother to my father and an uncle to my brother, Jim, and I."

"He'd show up about 10 a.m. every day in the tiny office in the garage that we called World Headquarters. Lots of people would stop by for a visit. It was a place for Clarence to go. He was still driving when he was 90," Hessel said.

"I never dreamed I'd ever own the place. It is beautiful, really beautiful," he said in a 2002 interview with *The Outlook*.



Boring resident, Sandy's biggest fan, Miles Aubin dies at 95

Boring resident Miles Aubin, local historian and one of the biggest supporters of sports at Sandy High School, died Tuesday, Nov. 24, at the age of 95.

"He was an outstanding historian and had a great memory and a great sense of humor," said fellow local historian Phil Jonsrud.

Aubin was born Mildan Lloyd to Marvin and Lorena (Olson) Aubin in Portland on Aug. 6, 1914. He was raised in the Boring and Sandy

areas, playing in some of the earliest basketball, baseball and football teams, and graduated from Sandy High School in 1933.

During his senior year in high school, he met Eleanor Vossen, a girl from Portland, on a weekend get-together with some friends. In a Jan. 23, 2008, article in the Sandy Post, Aubin said their first date was a random chance encounter.

"She wasn't my high school sweetheart or anything like that," Aubin said at the time. "I just asked her out because I thought she was nice and cute. I can still picture her as I asked her out, and I never thought she would go out with me. Boy, was I surprised."

The pair dated 11 years before marrying in 1944. They were happily married for 63 years until Eleanor's death in 2007 at

the age of 86.

"That was the saddest day in my life; we were together for a long time, and she was the love of my life," Aubin recalled in 2008. "I can still see her, feel her and know she is with me every day. She was simply the best thing that happened to me in my life."

After graduation

After high school, Aubin worked in logging and then for the Civilian Conservation Corps before joining the Army to serve in World War II. He later attended Oregon Normal School (now Western Oregon University) and Oregon State University, where he graduated with a degree in English in 1947. He later went back and received a master's degree in biology.

Aubin was hired as a teacher and coach in Oakland, Ore., where he taught biology, English and science while coaching football and baseball and trying to finish his degree. He established a winning program during his two years at Oakland, but spent the next 22 years of his career

teaching biology at Benson High School in Portland — his final full-time job.

In 1963 he put together the first Sandy High School alumni dinner. Today, more than 300 people attend the event.

"We just felt that it would be a great idea to get graduates together to celebrate their past," Aubin said for the 2008 article. "It started with one class, and then suddenly more and more people wanted to be part, so we had to find larger places to hold the dinner."

Aubin and his family returned to Sandy in 1970, and following his retirement in 1976, he shifted his focus back to his hometown.

His retirement allowed him the time to begin researching Sandy history, which he wrote about in articles for The Sandy Post and The Gresham Outlook. Aubin also wrote articles for the Buckboard Tales, the Sandy Historical Society newsletter, and was known as an incomparable source of historical information for the community.

Aubin made his return to athletics during retirement, officiating at games around Oregon as a referee for the Oregon Schools Activities Association, which he found almost as gratifying as teaching.

While refereeing, Aubin got to know coaches, fans, students and people throughout the area. He credited getting back into the excitement and community of athletics was the catalyst that has kept him going to as many games

as possible.

He also enjoyed listening to music and at one time had a huge collection of LP records. He also loved to garden and always had a large and fruitful vegetable garden.

His family

Aubin was also preceded in death by brother Kenneth Aubin, and is survived by his son, Stephen, of Sandy. Stephen recalled going to sporting events with his father, from local high schools to Trail Blazers basketball games, and said his father preferred local sports, questioning who would want to watch "overpaid" athletes.

"He was my best friend," Stephen said.
