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When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3). And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).

"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures; who gave her everything she had; who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil; who called her by the gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament; would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts, it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us. We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire. We give small gifts because we are not content with what God has already given.

We are not slaves, children of the slave woman, under the Old Covenant (Galatians 4). We are adopted sons of the free woman. And since we are sons, we are also heirs. And heirs receive the inheritance. For everything is already ours in Christ. And thus, moved by the willing spirit of adoption, we do the will of God in financial matters far beyond all that done by those under the Old Covenant who were forced by legal demands.

So, what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide.

We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Corinthians 16:1–2, 2 Corinthians 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Corinthians 8:7)!

We are not free to live selfishly outside the Gospel, without regard for God who gives us all good gifts, without generosity for our neighbor who needs us and our gifts, without supporting the community of faith in which we live, without care for our spiritual fathers and those who teach and help raise our children in the faith, and without resources for the poor and needy.

In short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us. For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matthew 22:34–40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

Lutheran Heritage Foundation continues its work of translating, publishing, distributing, and introducing Lutheran materials throughout Africa where the population is more than 1.216 billion people. Sadly, over half those souls are still waiting to be introduced to the one true Savior, Jesus Christ. Islam has made huge inroads in the continent. But thanks be to God, Christian missionaries have been spreading the Light of the Gospel also. Economic and political conditions may force missionaries to leave a country, but the Lutheran books they leave behind stay — and teach — for generations. This grant will fund the printing and distribution of 129,500 engaging, colorful books which will introduce children to Jesus in their Lutheran schools, Sunday schools, and orphanages.

Testimonies from Around the World: Malawi

The power of literature has been demonstrated in a local Market in Malawi. One of the youth members from Christ Church came to our distribution center and god one 50kgs bag of literature and decided to distribute in the market. When people saw that it was spiritual books, Bibles and gospel tracks, there was a great commotion in the market as everyone wanted to have at least a copy. He called us explaining the situation and we took several more bags and ended up having a crusade. Several people gave testimonies that they were changed and inspired, and many have confessed Jesus as Lord and savior. Another young man took some literature to a government office and give to some security guards. When the boss was passing by, he asked, "What is happening?" He got a copy of Real Life Story, now he has asked for more to be distributed to the whole institution.

Showing Jesus to Children

Savannah Schmitz is the kind of young person who gives great hope and inspiration for current and future Lutheran witnessing. She is a freshman in the Lutheran Teachers Education Program at Concordia University Chicago. Her major is Middle Grades Education, with an emphasis on Science and Literacy.

"After I graduate in 2024, I hope to teach amazing students all about the love Jesus has for them and I hope to show them how to serve people everywhere as Christ-like individuals," said Schmitz.

A member of the AALC, a Lutheran Church body in fellowship with the LCMS, Schmitz grew up attending Ascension Lutheran Church in Waterloo, Iowa. She attended Lutheran elementary, middle, and high school, so she is well versed in the knowledge of the LCMS Church.

During her high school freshman year, she worked with about fifty children at a Chicago kids camp. A challenging part of this mission was that the missionaries were not allowed to talk about Jesus specifically for risk of offending some campers. This is a frustration as we know that it is our joy to share the message of Good News that is ours in Christ. Instead, they were asked to show God's love through their actions.



"When you have to actively show Jesus rather than just speak what He says to us in the Bible, your actions become so much more intentional," said Schmitz. *"The children embraced us quickly, and I truly believe this was no coincidence."*

Schmitz also went to Houston, Texas, during her junior year of high school to help rebuild hurricane-ravaged houses, served at her church Vacation Bible School during high school summers, and put in over 160 service hours at her school and in her community.

At CUC, Schmitz has been able to worship in person for quite a while now. They have masked and socially distanced chapel every day in addition to Evening Prayer offerings several nights a week.

"By attending these services, I can learn more about the faith to use when I have the opportunity to witness to people on campus and in my daily life," she said.
