

This year, Pastor Gunia will be writing on piety and spirituality. The intention is to help you live your life with increasing joy, closeness to God, and love for others. Don't take these as the Law, but rather think of them as suggestions from someone whose been working on his personal piety for quite some time now and who would love to see your faith grow stronger.

Give. Generosity is an act of courage, which stems from our faith in God's promises.

This is exactly the way I shouldn't start out this series, but I'm going to do it anyway. I'm going to start by talking about your money. But the only reason I'm starting off this way is because you should be receiving this newsletter right before the beginning of 2020 and I imagine some of you are doing long-range budgeting or making new years resolutions. So, I'd like you to encourage you to think of generosity as you make your 2020 plans. We begin our consideration with the words and promises of God.

God has revealed himself as "Our Father who art in heaven." He instructs us to pray: "give us this day our daily bread." By calling himself our Father, God has obligated himself to lovingly provide for his children. God would not instruct us to ask him for the things we need to support our bodies and then tell us "no!". When Jesus fed the 5,000, he did it by taking the very little that the assembly had, he looked up to heaven, and then he instructed his disciples to give that very little bit away. In looking to heaven, Jesus teaches us about the love of God and the fact that he is the source of all that is good. In instructing the disciples to give the meager portions away (the disciples presuming they would go hungry for giving away their food), Jesus tests their faith. In multiplying the bread and fish, Jesus demonstrates the faithfulness of God.

Paul writes of God's faithfulness in the book of Romans. He writes, "The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs—heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ... What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?" (8:16-17a, 31-32)

In the book of Malachi, the Lord speaks through the prophet and condemns the Israelites for withholding their contributions. The Israelites were withholding their contributions (in part) because they no longer a prosperous people and they were afraid that they would bring themselves to financial ruin if they contributed the full tithe. However, God commands them to give the full tithe anyway and gives them a promise. "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need. I will rebuke the devourer for you, so that it will not destroy the fruits of your soil, and your vine in the field shall not fail to bear, says the Lord of hosts. Then all nations will call you blessed, for you will be a land of delight, says the Lord of hosts." (3:10-12).

This is the only place I can think of in the entire Bible that God actually commands us to put him to the test. God made a promise and God instructs his people to hold him to his promise—test me and see whether or not I'll be faithful. In a Bible study, Pastor Julio Orozco (one of our members) said that he believes that the United States is the most prosperous country in the world because Americans are the most generous people in the world. He makes this claim based on the prophet Malachi. I think this is a brilliant insight and I'm pleased to share it with you.

Therefore, I encourage you to grow in your faith by giving away that which is yours. Give away your money for the ongoing proclamation of the Gospel and to the poor. Give away your precious time to those who would benefit from your friendship or help. Give away your talents by doing some work pro bono. If you're an artist, create some art and give it as a gift; if you're a carpenter, help someone fix something around their house. I know of a group of Christian women in Israel who set aside a few days per month and use it helping overwhelmed housewives clean their home from top to bottom.

Doing this is frightening. When you're trying to make ends meet or save up for retirement or you're living on a fixed income, your instincts are shouting "No! Don't give that much!" But the shouting actually comes from your sinful flesh, which believes that God is a liar.

I can tell you from personal experience and from the stories people tell me that God keeps his promises with regard to giving. The more Kathy and I give away, the better financial position we find ourselves in. The same is true of others I've spoken with about generous giving. Every single one finds their needs met with something left over.

God is faithful; generosity is an act of courage which confesses our belief in God's faithfulness. Generosity puts our money where God's mouth is.

Now, for some practical suggestions on how to grow in your faith through generosity.

1. Pray as you prepare your offering or contribution, especially reminding God of his generosity, his Fatherhood, and his promise to provide.
2. Increase your planned giving by 1% per year until you are giving 10% of your income away (note: the New Testament does not assign a percentage like the Old Testament does; but the New Testament does instruct us to give cheerfully).
3. Find someone at church to befriend and plan out time to give them regularly. Invite them out for lunch or coffee. Spend at your house or hers drinking tea and telling stories. Encourage one another.
4. Set aside time to purposefully pray for a person or group. There is an online community where members select public figures and dedicate time each day to pray for him or her. You could do that. You might instead select a friend or neighbor. Or you may decide to pray for those afflicted by a particular disease or recovering from a tragedy (it takes more than a few weeks for the emotional wounds to heal). Plan out that time and give it away in prayer.
5. Dedicate time to working for free. Bake a pie for someone. Help plant the garden of someone with health problems.
6. Volunteer to help the poor. Soup kitchens, food pantries, refugee organizations, homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters, crisis pregnancy centers, and other organizations run on volunteers.

God's promise is that by faithfully doing such things, he will work through others to bless you. We don't give from a selfish motivation, though. We give as a loving response to all that Christ has given to us---which is everything.

**Money principle #10:
Prosperity Can Be a Blessing**

The Lord will open to you his good treasury, the heavens, to give the rain to your land in its season and to bless all the work of your hands. And you shall lend to many nations, but you shall not borrow.—Deuteronomy 28:12

As God lays out the potential blessings for Israel's obedience, he includes this promise: "you shall lend to many nations, but you shall not borrow." This promise comes from a time when debt was reserved for the most desperate situations, and could quite literally make someone beholden to their debtor. The writer of Proverbs communicates this well when he says, "the rich rules over the poor, and the borrower is the slave of the lender." (Prov. 22:7)

In this time period, debt was tied to slavery. Because of this, being a lender as opposed to a debtor was linked to having power and, in this instance, God's favor. With this promise, God tells the Israelites that their obedience would lead them to a place of prominence and power over other nations.
