This year, Pastor Gunia will be writing on piety and spirituality. The intention is to help you live your life with increasing joy, closeness to God, and love for others. Don't take these as the Law, but rather think of them as suggestions from someone whose been working on his personal piety for quite some time now and who would love to see your faith grow stronger.

How to go to confession.

First, before you go any further, change your thinking on the subject. It's not a "Roman Catholic practice," it's a gift to the entire Christian Church on Earth. It is our common heritage, just like prayer, worship, Baptism, and heaven are our common heritage.

It's not a Law—something you have to do or God will be angry with you; it's the Gospel—a gift God gives you in his love.

It's not presumptuous. It's not me granting forgiveness by my own authority (as if I got some super powers when I was ordained), but rather it's Jesus speaking through my mouth to grant you everything he won for you on the cross.

It's not optional. The Small Catechism begins the Chief Part "Confession and Absolution" with the words, "How Christians should be taught to confess." It never entered Martin Luther's mind that faithful Christians would avoid confession as if it's optional. If Confession is optional—a gift of Jesus you don't have to take if you don't want to—then I suppose Holy Communion, Baptism, the Word of God, worship, prayer, and forgiveness are just as optional.

It's not redundant. Yes, you can pray directly to God asking for forgiveness. "...and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." But does God ever answer you back with the assurance that you are forgiven? You get that assurance, comfort, and encouragement as God grants you these things through a pastor's mouth.

It's not me being nosey. I can assure you, I would go through life perfectly fine and happy without knowing about the sins you've committed and the things you struggle with. I get no kicks learning about Hollywood scandals or what became of my old friends from high school. I will get no cheap thrills learning about your sin.

It's not bad for you. It is my duty to listen to your troubles so that I might apply God's grace to you exactly where it hurts. And, remember, I have sworn by a sacred oath never to reveal the sins confessed to me. I tell my Confirmation classes that I would go to jail rather than reveal these sins (and I would). If I were to talk about sins confessed to me, I would be defrocked (and I should be). God has not instituted Confession and Absolution to hurt us, but rather to help us today and to assure us of eternity.

Rather than me give you tips, let me walk you through how Confession might go.

- 1. Contact me or the church office to arrange a time. Block off a half-hour. It will probably take less time than that.
- 2. Review the Ten Commandments from the Small Catechism. Think about the sins you've committed and the ways you've fallen short. It's uncomfortable. Think about it anyway and feel the emotions associated with it.
- 3. Meet me when and where we've agreed to meet. Your palms will be sweaty and you'll be nervous, especially the first few times, but don't let your sinful flesh keep you away from God's grace.
- 4. Pray.
- 5. When you see me, let's do a quick, friendly greeting, and then get down to business. Think of it as a doctor's appointment. You're both there for a purpose—so that you might be healed. Your doctor greets you, examines you, and applies the medicine. Let's do the same. Quick greeting, diagnosis, and I will apply the Gospel for your healing. (But I won't take your insurance card and send you a bill).

- 6. We will use the rite on page 292-293 of the Lutheran Service Book (our hymnal). It's reads like a script where you say your part and I say my part. This serves to get make a stressful time more objective, it gives you the words to say so that you don't have to search and struggle for you own words, and it gives you the opportunity (at an appropriate place) to say out loud things that are eating at you.
- 7. Immediately upon your confession, I will pronounce forgiveness. I will not condemn you. I will not gasp in shock. I will not look at you sideways. I will not investigate or cross-examine you. The only reasons I've ever gone off script is either because I don't understand and need clarification, because I'm not sure that the thing confessed is actually a sin, or because you've begun talking about something else and I need to get us back on track.
- 8. After I pronounce forgiveness, I may take the opportunity to give you some brief comfort. I may speak some Scripture verses that come to mind. I may pray with you. I may offer you my own words of encouragement or assurance. I try to let this time be very brief or non-existent; you don't need to hear from me, but rather from God.
- 9. Leave in joy, knowing that the forgiveness you just heard came directly from God.
- 10. Say a prayer of thanksgiving and go about your day.

I place this article at the beginning of Lent because I will remain in the sanctuary on Wednesdays until 8:15 PM to hear confession. You are invited and encouraged to take the opportunity to receive the healing balm of absolution.

Our hymnal has prayers to say before church, communion and before the sermon. Can't find one? A few words from your heart to the Lord will do. Some listeners make notes during the sermon and maybe even mark the passages from the readings that strike them. Making notes keeps one alert and you can also jot down questions that come to mind as you listen. I'm sure Pr. Gunia would be thrilled if people asked him questions about his sermon and/or the readings. No time to ask on Sunday? I imagine he would be ready and pleased to answer at any time. Finally, the Witness says "Repent and return" as the final step in faithful Sunday worship. What do you think that means for you?

There is a brief article about "saints singing their faith." One of the most useful and exciting things about being a Luther-an Christian is the wealth of hymns we have at our disposal. Those of us raised and educated in a Christian home and day school have many hymns in our heads. The amount of theology (a big word) in our hymns is such a blessing to us. Yes, "Jesus Loves Me" is a simple song that just about everyone who has ever been to Sunday School or VBS or even a camp, has heard and learned. It's packed with theology! Do you know what it is? Sometimes an older person in nursing home or assisted living facility recalls that song from long ago. Their eyes light up in joy. I can imagine our Lord's eyes also lighting up when He hears those words spoken or sung by one of His children, old or young.

By the time you read this, the season of Lent will be just before us. Ash Wednesday kicks off the season with a moving confessional service and imposition of ashes. Will you be there?

Approximately one half of this population is under the age of 14, and 15 percent of this population will take their own lives, out of despair and hopelessness.

Through this mission grant, LAMP will fulfill their mission of sharing the Gospel by expanding their staff of full time missionary pilots. They will recruit and train 100 to 200 additional volunteer missionaries committed to serve at least five years and help LAMP reach their goals.
