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This year, Pastor Gunia will be writing on piety and spirituality. The intention is to help you live your life with increasing joy, closeness to God, and love for others. Don't take these as the Law, but rather think of them as suggestions from someone whose been working on his personal piety for quite some time now and who would love to see your faith grow stronger.

This month's article is on the spiritual discipline of sharing the Gospel. It is also called proclaiming Christ, or witnessing, or evangelizing, or giving a testimony. It has a lot of names. We tend to give a super-abundance of names to things we're uncomfortable about.

It can be worrisome, especially in our modern world (increasingly intolerant of our Christian faith) to “out yourself” as a practicing Christian. It can be worrisome to speak about something so deeply connected to our core identity. It can be worrisome not knowing how others will react when we speak of Jesus. It can be worrisome because speaking about Jesus can lead to confrontation or expose or ignorance of the doctrines of the Church, or come back to bite us later.

You have to speak about Jesus anyway. That's God's command so it's our obligation. And yet, there is also Gospel, as you speak the Gospel, you also hear the Gospel proclaimed from your mouth. God works through your own words to give you the benefits of the Gospel. The Gospel remains the power of God for salvation for all who believe, yourself included.

The Holy Bible is the pure and perfect Word of God. All people should go to the Holy Scriptures to read them, learn them, and inwardly digest them. But, realistically, how many non-Christians are going to decide to pick up the Bible and start reading it? If the faithfully attending members of strong congregations neglect their Bibles, what makes us think that those estranged from the Church are going to pick up the Bible and start reading it? When's the last time you felt the urge to study the Koran or the Hindu Vedas or the Book of Mormon? So then why would a Muslim, a Hindu, or a Mormon feel the urge to study the Bible?

Why would they? Because they first heard the Gospel through you.

Our God is so loving, that he allows the Gospel to go beyond the Holy Scriptures into human words and works inspired by and faithful to the Scriptures. This includes our essays, books, sermons, hymns, speeches, spoken prayers, and even works of visual art. This also includes the faithful words that come out of your mouth.

I don't, by any means, believe my sermons are on par with the Holy Scriptures, but I recognize that God's Gospel is present in my words. And God even works through my worst-constructed and worst-delivered sermons to give hearers forgiveness of sins, and life, and salvation.

Think of your favorite hymns. The Gospel is contained there as well. Whether it's “Amazing Grace” or “Salvation Unto Us Has Come” or “Silent Night” within that text and that tune is the Gospel, which has the power to bestow the entirety of Jesus' riches.

I'm sure you've been strengthened by some sermon you've heard or by some hymn you've sung. I'm sure some prayer has touched something within you or you read a blog post that really struck you. These are all imperfect works created by imperfect human beings. And yet God in those works to bestow wonderful, unexpected blessings.

The very same is true of you, O imperfect reader and your imperfect words (or songs or art). Your words are not amazing or eloquent or persuasive in themselves. But Jesus promises to be present in even your weakest words according to his commands and promises. “Make disciples of all nations, teaching them...” “Preach the word. Be ready in-season or out of season.” “I will be with you always.”

So, here's some advice for growing in your piety by spreading the Gospel.

1. Begin with yourself. You can't give what you don't got. If you don't know about Jesus, how are you going to talk about him? Be diligent in exposing yourself to the Gospel in the Holy Scriptures, in prayer, in worship, in song, and in books (especially the Small Catechism). Grow in your faith and understanding. By so doing, you strengthen your own faith and prepare yourself to speak of Jesus to others.
2. Talk to "safe people" about Jesus. Talk with family, fellow church members, or your pastor about Jesus. This gives you experience talking about your faith. Experience tends to take away the fear of the unknown.
3. Pray for those people you would like to speak with about Jesus. This develops a genuine care for them. Remember, if we are only performing loving things for a person because we think we're going to get something out of them, that's called manipulation. We renounce manipulation, deceit, and all underhandedness. We love all people, but we do so because of their personhood and the instructions of Jesus. Our love for them is not contingent upon their attitude toward Jesus.
4. Pray for opportunities to speak of Jesus to others, for the wisdom to see these opportunities, and for the courage to speak. You might be surprised at the ways God grants this prayer.
5. Support others in the spreading of the Gospel. This is more than writing a check to an overseas missionary. Encourage those you actually know and interact with at Church to do 1-4 above. Write letters of encouragement to overseas and domestic missionaries. Remember them in your prayers.

Talking about Jesus can be frightening if you convince yourself that others' eternal salvation is riding on you—the words you choose, the way you present yourself, your mental nimbleness. But it doesn't depend on you; Jesus works through you and he, himself does the work.

Talking with Jesus can be frightening if you consider the all the possible negative consequences. It becomes much easier when you remember that Jesus will never leave you nor forsake you. He will be with you always to the end of the age.

The NID staff has assembled resources on their website (nidlcms.org) for use by our congregations, schools, and ministry partners to equip us all to help combat the spread of this illness and to ready us to be Christ-like caregivers to our neighbors in this time of need.

In these hours of seeming uncertainty and potential fear, what an opportunity our Lord gives us as the Church to proclaim Him to those around us! According to His merciful will, may our neighbors see and hear from us who know our Savior our confident hope in His redeeming grace and the compassionate touch of His loving heart.

Where Mites Go

Mobile Medical Mercy Missions Bus for Guatemala

Grant: \$100,000

Over 50 percent of the children in Guatemala are malnourished and have no access to any form of medical or dental care. A network of LCMS partner churches and the Lutheran Church of Guatemala have partnered to share God's physical and spiritual healing with as many souls as possible. This mission grant will be used to purchase and retrofit a bus with medical equipment. Bible school equipment will also be purchased, enabling teams to heal both the physical and spiritual needs of the Guatemalan children. While physicians tend to physical needs, ministers and lay leaders will go into villages and set up Bible classes, Vacation Bible School, and worship services.

Love Packages

Testimony from Zimbabwe

This was amazing - this church called Christ Assembly only had one Bible. The pastor and congregants fasted several times each week for 4 years. They survived with 1 Bible only, so it was a great day, a great day indeed when they all got Bibles from Love Packages. The report I got was that they had a service from 10 am to 6 pm just reading the Word, each one taking turns reading. They could not believe they were actually holding their own personal Bible. The pastor was in awe, awe, awe!

First, a fascinating book about a pastor in Romania who spent 14 years in communist prisons due to his Christian faith and his public witness. 2nd, an illustrated book and personal story of a Lutheran missionary to the people of Enga, a rugged province in Papua New Guinea. Third, a charming book about a rescued donkey named Flash. Fourth, "The Hope of Glory," black/white and colored, illustrations, reflections on the Last Words of Jesus from the Cross, authored by Jon Meacham, biographer and historian. The box was delivered and received at GlenBridge at the door. One just hopes the contents did get to the residents. We won't know for some time, I fear. It's good to remember them in our prayers: Micha, Donna, Marianne, Corina. Andy, Kim, Ed, Stephen.

Normally, one looks forward to Easter and the festive service on Sunday with special music,—Monty usually finds a trumpet player, and the choir sings—and there are Easter lilies in the chancel. We rejoice with all the saints and angels in remembering Christ's resurrection and in singing the Alleluias once more, and we love how our children and even adults appear in Easter finery, maybe even in hats! No Easter church this year, maybe not even during Holy Week. Something is surely missing in our lives.

Money Principle #13: Give Money; Don't Serve It

"No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money." The Pharisees, who were lovers of money, heard all these things, and they ridiculed him.—Luke 14:13–14

When Jesus says, "you cannot serve God and money," the word used for money is specifically "mammon." Just as "wisdom" is personified throughout the Bible, Jesus personifies money here as another entity that vies for our allegiance. What's interesting here is that the Pharisees were infected with this love of money, and it caused them to immediately discount what Jesus was saying.

It's important that we periodically do a personal wellness check in regards to our attitudes about money and possessions. One of the sure signs that there might be a problem is related to how quickly we dismiss the idea that there might be a problem.
