Competition open to amateur growers only. An amateur grower shall be a person who does not grow flowers for sale to the public. Please check number of blooms and stalks or spray or spike in Premium List needed for exhibit. Flowers must be grown by exhibitor.

**Bloom:** An individual flower, solitary flower terminating in a stem such as a rose or peony.

**Stalk:** A stiff stem, branched or unbranched, with one or more blooms and buds; i.e. gladiolus or hybrid lily.

**Spray:** A small branch bearing dependent branchlets; i.e. petunia.

**Spike:** An unbranched single stemmed, elongated flower cluster in which the flowers are practically stemless; i.e. snapdragon, delphinium.

**On Lily's in the cut flower group,** do not take off anthers. In the arrangements they can be taken off. "Anther" is the brown pollen on the ends that stain if touched.

**Harden off cut flowers,** this means you should pick your flower choice the day before the fair exhibit and put in a cold place, basement or refrigerator. They will not wilt as easy.
