We have purchased new water breaks and have begun installation at the trouble spots to prevent run-off, and culverts will be repaired as needed.

Beavers at Ashe Lake



18 beavers were removed from Ashe Lake during the Fall/Winter season. As we enter into Spring and the lake gets busier we ask that you keep an eye out for other beavers and notify us if you see them so we can have them removed. Beavers are a nuisance animal and can destroy all the trees around the lake and change the flow of water on the streams.

Dreaming of Spring Garden

As we get closer to Spring (March 20, 2023), below are some gardening chores for March:

- Plant peas, potatoes and parsley towards the end of the month directly in the garden.
- If you haven't already, now is a great time to prune your fruit trees, berry bushes, and other woody ornamentals on your property. You want to complete this while still dormant and before spring growth begins.
- Direct sow outdoors seeds like Nigella, Poppy, and Larkspur so they get a few weeks of cold temps which will aid in their germination.
- The longer days and shorter nights will stimulate your houseplants to start growing again. Now is a good time to repot them if needed and give them a good feeding.
- Start transplants indoors of tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant and any other cool season veg you'd like to grow.
- On nice days, turn your compost pile. Resist working your garden soil! Working soil when it is still too cold and wet creates compacted clots.
- Clean up any leftover dried debris from garden beds and toss in the compost pile.
- Place birdhouses built this winter outdoors this month. Birds will begin looking for nesting sites soon.
- Get a soil tester if you haven't already done so.
- Towards the end of March, remove winter protection from any perennials you had in place, and pull back mulch from strawberry and asparagus beds so they can push through easily. Side-dress you asparagus with a gentle, natural, nitrogen fertilizer.



Luck of the Irish

Saint Patrick, who lived during the fifth century, is the patron saint of Ireland and its national apostle. Born in Roman Britain, he was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave at 16. He later escaped, but returned to Ireland and was credited with bringing Christianity to its people.

In the centuries following Patrick's death (believed to have been on March 17, 461), the mythology surrounding his life became ever more ingrained in the Irish culture: Perhaps the most well-known legend of St. Patrick is that he explained the Holy Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) using the three leaves of a native Irish clover, the shamrock.

<u>Spring Equinox</u>

The first day of spring is **Monday, March 20, 2023, at 5:24 p.m. EDT** Traditionally, we celebrate the first day of spring on March 21, but astronomers and calendar manufacturers alike now say that the spring season starts

on March 20th, in all time zones in North America. Regardless of what the weather is doing outside, spring equinox marks the official start of the spring season.



Household Chores You Should Do This Spring

- Change Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detector <u>Batteries</u>. Changing batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors takes only a few minutes but it can mean the difference between life and death.
- <u>Change Interior HVAC Air Filters</u>. If you haven't been changing the filters in your heating and air conditioning system regularly, do it now. Clean filters reduce the wear and tear on your furnace and improve the quality of the air you are breathing.
- Inspect Washing Machine Water Hoses. Rubber or vinyl washing machine hoses are a ticking time bomb that will one day rupture. This is the time to check hoses for minor leaks that can become big ones.
- <u>Clean Clothes Dryer Vents</u>. Even if you have emptied your clothes dryer lint filter after every load, there is still a great deal of lint that has entered the dryer ducts
- Drain Sediment From Water Heater Tank. Unless you have a tankless water heater, sediment can collect in the bottom of a water heater, causing mechanical problems and even leaks. Every six months, a standard water heater should have a partial draining.
- Do Some Pest Control. After long months of cold weather, everyone is ready to get outside, including the insects, rodents, and other pests that have been hibernating snug inside your walls or beneath the floors. Warm spring weather will bring them to life again, allowing you to spot problem areas.
- <u>Clean Gutters and Downspouts</u>. Leaving gutters and downspouts packed with leaves and pine straw not only looks messy, but it can also cause leaks, moisture and mildew problems, and rotting wood.
- Inspect the Roof. Winter winds, rains, and snow can cause problems. Do a complete roof inspection to look for loose shingles, cracks, or broken seals around pipes.
- <u>Clean Your Patio and Sidewalks</u>. You'll be spending lots of time on that patio and this is the perfect time to get it into shape for summer. Get rid of winter mud and mildew from patios and walkways. A pressure-washer is the tool of choice for co*ncre*te or mortared brick surfaces.
