Ashe Lake Loop

Ashe Lake Loop signs have been installed. Starting at the dock towards the waterfall, mile markers are located at ¼ mile increments, for a 2-mile loop (1 mile each way). Starting at the dock towards the mailboxes on Nettle Knob, the distance is ½ mile each way, for a 1-mile loop. We are working on a map showing where the mile markers are.







Improvements to Dock Access & Parking

Posts have been added to the dock area to prevent cars and trucks from damaging the ramp. Please remember that the ramp is not for vehicle use.

Four new <u>angled</u> parking spaces were installed on Willow Lane, against lots 50 and 51. This new parking configuration leaves plenty of room on Willow Lane/Spillway for emergency access and provides our property owners with easier parking. Two more parking spaces will be added upon further clearing.

Fishing at Ashe Lake

Feeder fish (fathead minnows and reader sunfish) were added to the Lake on October 14, and they are hoping to add more feeder fish along with Large Mouth bass and Black crappie will be added to the lake in the upcoming weeks. Carolina Water Service

You may have noticed a new face servicing the water system at Ashe Lake – his name is Chad. Chad took over for Rick, who serviced the Ashe Lake water system for over 20 years.

Due to the age of the water system, they have had some quite a few leaks to deal with this year. If you see a wet spot in the road, or if you have an unusually large water bill reach out to Carolina Water and let them know there may be a leak. Their phone number is (800) 525-7990. In case of **EMERGENCY**, contact them 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

Online Dues Payment



Deer Mating Season

According to the North Carolina Wildlife Resource Commission Deer mating season runs from October through December. This is the time of year when deer are most active and when most deer-related car wrecks take place, especially at night. We urge you to take extra care when driving.

Gardening

Now is the time to get your garden Spring ready. Pull weeds, add compost, leaf clippings, manure, and other amendments and let your garden rest and recuperate during the winter season. **Our first Fall Frost date is October 1.**

Winterizing Your Home

Follow these steps to prepare your home for winter:

- **1. Check the gutters -** Prevent ice dams by cleaning out your gutters and installing gutter guards.
- **2. Protect the pipes** Protect against frozen pipes by insulating those that could be susceptible to freezing. When the temperature drops below 32 degrees Fahrenheit, keep a stream of water running in a few faucets to guard against freezing and bursting.
- **3. Seal the cracks -** Caulk holes and openings around windows, doors, air conditioners to help prevent cold air from seeping in.
- **4. Stop the slips, trips and falls -** Keep driveways and sidewalks clear of ice and snow and repair any issues with steps and handrails.
- **5. Have your heating system checked -** Furnaces, boilers and chimneys should be serviced at least once a year to clear any buildup and to keep them running efficiently.
- **6. Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors -** Residential fires are more common in winter, so it is important that all your smoke detectors work. Check them monthly and replace batteries as needed.
- **7. Clear the yard -** Keep the trees trimmed and remove dead branches and debris from your yard. Ice, snow and wind can weaken trees and cause branches to fall.
- **8. House the hose -** Remove all garden hoses that are attached to the house, drain them and store them away. Shut off the valves and insulate the faucet.

If you're heading south for the winter, you need to take extra precautions. Turn the water completely off and consider having the plumbing system drained to keep pipes from freezing. Also, have a friend or neighbor check on your home regularly to look for any issues. If a problem is detected, act quickly to minimize potential damage to your property.

The theme for this year's parade is "Holiday Traditions." Like years before, the parade will conclude with the lighting of the downtown retail district and marks the beginning of the Christmas season.

High Country Quirks

The 45th Annual Woolly Worm Festival 2022 took place the weekend of October 15th in Banner Elk. NC.

Woolly Worm caterpillars—also called woolly bears, weatherworm, and fuzzy wuzzys have a reputation for being able to forecast the coming winter weather. According to the legend the wider the rusty brown sections (or the more brown segments there are), the milder the coming winter will be. The more black there is, the more severe the winter.

The high country can expect the start of winter to be filled with below-average temperatures and snow of more than 3 inches, according to "Porta Potty," the 2022 Woolly Worm Champion. Porta Potty beat out two dozen woolly worms this weekend at the 45th annual Woolly Worm Festival. Around 20,000 people flocked to the town to see Porta Potty's 13 rings of color, coinciding with the 13 weeks of winter.

While the first four rings were black, which means belowaverage temperatures and snow of more than 3 inches, the middle of the worm was light brown which typically means average winter temperatures. The last couple of rings were light brown, fleck and black leaving readers to believe winter in the high country will end with below-average temperatures and more snow.
