The event has become a festival of events, and includes live music, food trucks, art demonstrations and more. Attendees will not only have





# Celebrate Upcoming Thanksgiving and Christmas Holiday Festivities by Barbara Bruschi



## **Free Music Concert Series Brings Classical Arts to Smoke Rise**

A young Tucker resident is bringing the sounds of classical music to Smoke Rise through her organization, the Atlanta Concert Series (ACS). This original idea, created and founded by recent music grad, Samantha Burke, desires to bring classical music to local communities like ours. As a staff singer in the choir at Eastminster Presbyterian, Samantha is involved in the Smoke Rise community and will be holding a classical music concert at Eastminster on November 15 at 3 p.m. It is free to the general public. The goal of ACS is to bridge the gap between the arts, accomplished young artists such as Samantha, and the local community.

Atlanta Concert Series was founded by Samantha Burke, a soprano and violinist major who recently graduated from Bard College in NY. After years of performing around the country and studying under world-renowned mentors, she was anxious to continue in that trajectory, but wasn't sure where to find direction when she returned to Tucker. She realized that other young, up-and-coming artists must face the same dilemma and also needed an outlet to perform. This began her vision: to provide a free concert series that allows young artists a venue, while also allowing the community the opportunity to experience quality classical music. "I brought on nine of some of the best musicians I have ever worked with from all over the globe. All of the artists just needed a platform on which to perform while they are awaiting their dream job of appearing in symphony halls, opera halls and major production stages around the world," says Samantha.

Suggested Donation of \$10 to support the Eastminster Presbyterian Church Music Program Performances by the artists will be hosted by various churches, such as Eastminster Presbyterian, local businesses and organizations. As a nonprofit organization, a percentage of each ticket donation will go back to support the host church or business. Samantha is optimistic that other organizations will catch the vision and consider holding an event.

The ACS has four main goals: to provide a platform for young artists, to give the general public easy access to classical music, to benefit and promote local churches and business that support them, and to break down misconceptions about classical music, in general. "We love to bring a fresh, young perspective to classical music

with concerts that include cabaret and jazz. We want people to see that classical music can be fun," says Samantha. "I love the idea that music brings people back to the arts and connects them together through that. I wasn't sure I would easily find a music outlet when I moved back home, but the community has showed amazing support," she says.

#### Letters to the Editor:

To all our Smoke Rise neighbors,

Please remember to VOTE in the November 3 election. There are only two items on our ballot this time, both of which deserve our YES votes. One is a measure to reform the county's Ethics Board, which is long overdue.

The other is cityhood for Tucker. As a leader in this initiative, I have been asked repeatedly why cityhood is necessary. It boils down to one thing. The one thing, although there are also many other benefits, is that CHANGE IS COMING. We can't stop it, but we can take control of it. New cities are being formed, and existing cites are seeking to expand. Voting YES for Tucker will preserve the community we've all come to love. Voting NO will leave Tucker, including Smoke Rise, subject to either annexation by another city, and/or at the mercy of DeKalb County. In the last two years, every city bordering Tucker has proposed, or attempted, to take parts of what have always been known as Tucker. The cities of Stone Mountain, Clarkston, and the proposed city of Lakeside/ LaVista Hills all have their eyes on parts of our home town, and if they all get what they want, Tucker will cease to exist as we know it. There may be a Main Street with some historical markers, but the rest will be in the city limits of other communities. A divided Tucker will never be feasible as a city.

The good news is, adopting cityhood also affords us lots of opportunities to improve important aspects of our quality of life. Overseeing our own parks, deciding our own zoning and development priorities, and enforcing building and signage codes by and for ourselves in our own immediate area will all lead to increased property values as we attract more and better shopping, businesses and residences.

But no matter how strongly you feel about the issue, it doesn't matter at all if you don't vote. Passage or failure only requires a simple majority of whoever shows up, so if you want to have a say in your future, get to the polls now, before it's too late!

Perhaps I am confused, but I wonder when I step outside and see Stone Mountain from my front yard, or see the mountain as I drive on nearly every street around my neighborhood or hear the laser show and fireworks each summer night why I would vote to be annexed by Tucker. I love my Tucker and Lilburn neighbors, but there is something historical and beautiful about being associated with Stone Mountain. Whenever I travel, even outside of the U.S., I encounter people who actually know of or have visited our neighborhood. Their faces light up as they recount some happy adventure or family gathering they had while visiting the park or a restaurant or shop nearby. In fact I believe Stone Mountain is one of the most recognizable areas besides Atlanta outside of our state.

My husband and I moved to Smoke Rise fifteen years ago and we love it. Residing on a large wooded lot, we sometimes feel like we live in Stone Mountain Park. And we are thrilled to live less than five minutes away from this historical monument. So we find it very curious that some of our neighbors now want to be part of the City of Tucker. I still don't understand what the benefits are. I have searched the Tucker2015 site for answers but all I can conclude is that our taxes would increase because in addition to funding our current set of county commissioners we would now have to pay a mayor and six council members (\$104,000 annually). Personally, I would like to continue to proudly proclaim that I am from Stone Mountain, GA and to celebrate my connection to this amazing geological wonder.



Susan: As you commented earlier all clubs go through challenges When you took over at Druid Hills what were some of the challenges the club faced and how did you approach them?



## **Smoke Rise Elementary Charter School** to be Torn Down and Rebuilt

Did you know that the Smoke Rise Elementary Charter School is one of seven elementary schools in DeKalb County that were chosen by the District to be torn down and re-built? The project is part of money allocated from the SPLOST IV program. SPLOST stands for Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax. This tax is not a new tax, but the continuation of a penny sales tax voted on



Using a prototype building will significantly save in building cost and planning. It will also help the site architect uniquely configure the prototype building to each site without having to start from scratch at each location. Each school has \$18.4 million budgeted for the construction of the school and all site preparation work. You can see drawings of the prototype building on the following link: www.dekalb.k12.ga.us/splost-iv/elementary-school-prototype-design.

The DeKalb County School District used a fourteen-member committee of citizens to help evaluate the proposed prototype plan. Two members were selected from each of the school locations. Aaron Moore, previous Principal of SRECS and Marcia Ashby represented Smoke Rise on the committee.

The Smoke Rise ES Replacement project is slated to begin in March of 2016 and be completed by July of 2018. Dates are approximate and include planning, design and construction completion. Watch the Smoke Signal for more updates on this project.

#### With Thanksgiving travel coming up, here are some tips from AAA to help keep your belongings and home safe while you are away.

Long-Term Parking: Your vehicle in the lot tells thieves you're not home. Your vehicle registration, insurance cards and other identification tell them where you live. Remove these items from your vehicle before you leave it.

Luggage Tags: Never attach your home address to luggage, which tells thieves where you live and that you're not home. Instead, use your email address and/or phone number.

Electronics: Devices stored in your car such as a GPS unit and garage door opener give thieves your address and an easy way to get inside without being noticed, so remove both. If your GPS unit is mounted in the vehicle, delete your home address from it.

Social Media: Don't announce your vacation plans on social media. Wait until you return to share your vacation photos and videos on sites like Facebook. You run the risk of making your house a target for break-ins when you broadcast that you're away. Instead, text and email those close to you and wait until you return to share your experience on social media.

The Simple Basics:

- Stop delivery of mail and newspaper, or have a neighbor pick these up each day.
- Set timers on lights, TVs and a radio to give the appearance someone is home. Vary their on/ off times to avoid a predictable pattern.
- Never hide a key outside. Thieves know all the best hiding places.
- Make sure all windows and doors with deadbolt locks are securely closed and locked before you

#### **HEALTH NOTES:**

#### It's Cold Season Again!

Does anyone remember a stern warning from your mother to "wear a coat or you will catch your death of a cold"? Have you ever wondered if cold temperatures really do cause colds, respiratory infections and other diseases? OR Are certain infections seasonal--so that they only look like they are caused by cold weather?

Many diseases do have a seasonal pattern, meaning they seem to occur more frequently during a certain time or season of the year. Influenza, cold viruses and several diarrheal diseases like the noro and rotavirus in particular, are among those that appear more often in the winter months. The reason for this seasonality is not completely understood. However factors like humidity, crowding and temperature preferred by the organism seem to play a part.

Lower humidity in the winter months causes drying of the nasal surfaces. This can make you more susceptible to upper respiratory infections, the flu and even meningitis. Overheating your house can drop the humidity in your house to as low as 10%. Room humidifiers can help with over-drying nasal surfaces, but haven't been shown to prevent disease.

Cooler Temperature: Some viruses just prefer to grow in a cooler environment. The Noro- and Rotavirus infections, which are responsible for outbreaks of diarrhea, are in this category. Good hand-washing and not sharing drinks or eating utensils will help during an outbreak.

Other diseases that seem to be related to the cold are: Cold Induced Asthma, Raynaud's Phenomenon, winter depression, Gout, and joint pain from arthritis. Heart attacks, stroke, high blood pressure, blood clots and angina are all more common worldwide during the winter.

Less Light: Studies in Scandinavian countries and in the far north have helped identify the link between fall and winter depression and lack of sunlight. This is called Seasonal Affective Disorder. Using a special lamp that emits the right light wavelength spectrum (sometimes in combination with medication) can markedly decrease depression due to this cause. See your doctor if your depression is seasonal- you may have SAD.

Crowded conditions, enclosed spaces: Studies in the United Kingdom show that Measles, Mumps, Rubella and Chicken Pox rates spike during times that school is in session and decline during summer months and school breaks. Having your children immunized will prevent spread of these illnesses to the community.

Immune suppression: Though not proven, there is some evidence to suggest that less ultraviolet radiation (less sunlight) may cause immune suppression. This may be why Psoriasis, Atopic dermatitis and Multiple Sclerosis are worse in the winter.

Mixed Causes: Some diseases may have seasonal cycles that are due to more than one factor. Studies of Cholera -which is not often seen in the US, but is a major killer worldwide-show that humidity, amount of saltiness in the air and temperature all play a part in the disease cycle. Most likely, many of the respiratory illnesses that occur in the fall and winter are due to multiple causes.

Here is a small list of things that you can do to prepare for the cold weather months:

- 1. Get your flu and/or pneumonia shot (if you are over 60)
- 2. Use careful hand washing when you have or are in contact with a respiratory illness.
- 3. Do not share drinks or utensils.
- 4. Plan to exercise regularly.
- 5. Get outside and soak up the sun. If you have SAD, get a phototherapy lamp and make a plan with your doctor.
- 6. Make sure you have an Asthma plan of action and needed medications and inhalers available.
- 7. Modify your exercise in cold weather if you have angina and maximize your medicines for high blood pressure and heart disease.
- 8. Make sure your children are up to date on immunizations.

### Help for Creatures Big and Small at AWARE Wildlife Center

One of the delightful perks of living in the Smoke Rise area is how our human dwellings are intertwined with nature. It's not unusual to spot an occasional deer, opossum, hawk, turtle, chipmunk, and more. We even see some wild critters most of us would rather not encounter – like snakes, bats, and coyotes.

Have you ever discovered a wild animal that was injured? In these circumstances, I used to chalk it up to Mother Nature, or life, or even unfortunate human interaction. But, I have since learned about the Atlanta Wild Animal Rescue Effort (AWARE) Wildlife Center. In 2006, this 501 (c) (3) organization set up shop on seven acres at Arabia Mountain Park in Lithonia to preserve, protect, and promote wildlife and habitats in the southeast region. AWARE helps care for injured and orphaned native wildlife. It operates 365 days a year and is especially unique in accepting all species of native wildlife (everything from turtles, skunks, birds of prey, bobcats, ducks, lizards and more). AWARE rescues and rehabilitates almost 2,000 wild animals each year. Most of these animals are returned back to the wild.

AWARE also educates the community about habitat preservation and peaceful coexistence. The center responds to 10,000 calls and emails regarding native wildlife annually. It is evident that the staff at AWARE care about our wildlife and the environment. So, the next time you discover an orphaned or injured wild animal, remember AWARE.

One of the easiest ways to help an animal at AWARE is to 'adopt' an animal in rehabilitation. Adopters receive a certificate of adoption along with a picture of their adopted animal. Proceeds benefit AWARE's rehabilitation and education efforts. If you would like to adopt a rehab animal, you can learn more online at: http://www.awarewildlife.org.

AWARE relies heavily on donations, sponsorships, and volunteers. There are many opportunities to get involved on many different levels. Be sure to check out the same website for details. 

#### **Jack Frost's Anticipated Arrival is November 16**

- Light Freeze occurs at 29-32 degrees. Tender plants may be killed.
- Moderate Freeze occurs at 25-28 degrees. This is destructive to most vegetation.
- Severe Freeze: 24 degrees and below causes heavy damage to most plants.
- Clean your flowerbeds after the first killing frost.
- When the temperature drops below 40 degrees, take your tropical and subtropical plants indoors.
- When the temperature drops to 55-60 degrees for 4-5 nights in a row, spray your garden or lawn with winter weed pre-emergent.

#### **Mountain Mums Garden Club**

October 14 was a spectacular day for the Mountain Mums Garden Club to meet to talk about gardening. The brunch meeting was held at the home of Jody Currie. Sally Young, Debbie Jones, and Ann Purr helped make the food and fellowship extra special.

The program portion of the meeting was given by Dawn Hines, Master Gardener and Co-Leader of Trees of Tucker- where she identified and marked thirty-seven varieties of trees behind the Tucker Recreation Butterfly Garden. Her talk entitled Wildflowers included information on native flowers, shrubs and trees and some heritage plants that have naturalized into Georgia over the last one hundred years.

Here are several points you might be interested in from her talk:

- 1. The Cherokee Indians identified over 750 native plants that they used for food, clothing and medicine.
- 2. Native plants are irreplaceable as hosts for caterpillars, bees and other pollinators. In fact Goldenrods host 170 pollinator types, Blueberries 250 and Oak Trees 465 varieties of pollinators. 3. And of course, she gave a short-list of Exotic Invasive plants. These plants were introduced to Georgia from other locations and have run rampant, oftentimes destroying the native habitat that our true native plants enjoy. This list includes Kudzu (no surprise here), Chinese Privet (the seeds are viable for up to seven years), English Ivy (harbors rats, snakes and mosquitos and contrary to popular opinion, does not really kill trees), Bamboo, Bradford pear, Tree-of Heaven and Princess Tree, Mimosa, Monkeygrass, Scarlet Firethorn, Chocolate vine and Sawtooth Oak. ## HODGE PODGE

Hello pumpkin fans. It's that time of year and I have whined almost a year to get a recipe for pumpkin pie that is sure to be one of your favorites. It is my all time favorite, and, truth be told, I'm not that nuts about pumpkin. I would take sweet potato pie over pumpkin every time — and pecan pie beats them both. However, this one is a combo that set me on a downward spiral of pure sugar ecstasy. Really. The only thing I would suggest is that you read through the directions before you start so you have things ready to go. And because this pie is a many splendored thing, I'll put in an easy pumpkin cake recipe for those of you who already hate me.

Ok... This is the best pie ever. I'm also giving suggestions so you can make it gluten free.

#### Toffee Pecan Pumpkin Pie

Crust: 1 ½ cups plain flour, 2 Tablespoons light brown sugar, ¼ teaspoon salt and 6 Tablespoons cold butter, cut into cubes

#### Filling:

1 ½ cups pecans, toasted

1/2 cup dates, snipped into smallish bites...like 6 pieces per date... (Don't use the diced, sugared ones that come in a package. Too sweet.)

4 Tablespoons butter, cut into small pieces

15 ounce can pure pumpkin - not the pie mix

34 cup dark corn syrup

½ cup light brown sugar

1 Tablespoon vanilla

1 Tablespoon flour or 1 ½ teaspoons cornstarch for gluten free

½ teaspoon cinnamon

1/3 cup heavy cream

2 large eggs

Ok – first make the crust. Alternately, you could use a good refrigerated kind, or if you use a gluten-free mix, add in the sugar and salt and continue as directed. Pulse the flour, sugar and salt in your food processor. Add half the butter and pulse to combine. Then add the other half of the butter and pulse it to make crumbs. Add ¼ cup ice water and pulse a few more times until it just holds together. Turn dough out onto plastic wrap, form it into a ball and refrigerate an hour.

While the dough is cooling, this is a good time to toast those pecans you think I forgot about. 350° for about 8 minutes. Set those aside. Keep oven at 350° for baking the pie. And have a cookie sheet ready to heat up in the oven for later.

You still have most of that hour left, so take those dates and put the pieces in a bowl. Cover with ½ cup boiling water and let sit 5 minutes. Dump the dates with the liquid in your food processor and pulse until smooth. Add the pumpkin, corn syrup, brown sugar, vanilla, flour (or cornstarch) and cinnamon. Pulse smooth. Add heavy cream and eggs and just combine them. By now, your hour is up so you can start on the crust. Put a cookie sheet in oven to heat up on middle rack while you work.

Roll dough into a 12-inch circle and ease into a 9-inch pie plate; flute and trim to look gorgeous. Refrigerate 15 minutes. During this time, play with dough scraps to make horrible little shapes no one will eat.

Ready? Sprinkle the cooled down crust with 3/4 cup of those toasted pecans and pour the filling, still in the food processor, over all. Put pie on that hot baking sheet and bake about 1 hour til edges are set but center jiggles a bit. Cool.

#### Toffee Sauce to Gild the Lily:

4 tablespoons butter, ¼ cup brown sugar, 2 Tablespoons dark corn syrup, 2 Tablespoons heavy cream and a dash of salt.

Bring all ingredients to a boil in a medium saucepan, stirring. Reduce to medium low and simmer until dark and thick, about 8-12 minutes. Don't overcook or you'll have hard candy. Let it cool 3 minutes and pour the warm sauce over your lovely cooled pie and sprinkle with remaining ½ cups of toasted pecans.

Let sit at least an hour before serving. It is just luscious, not overly sweet and it has a depth of flavor that is wonderful. You really don't even need a crust for this one!

#### Easy Pumpkin Cake

One box spice cake mix, 1 can plain pumpkin (15 ounces) and 2 eggs

Mix well as directed on package and pour into a greased 9x13 pan. Bake according to directions on box. This cake is a bit heavy, a little like a pumpkin brownie. Make incredible sauce if you want it to be really amazing. Or make cream cheese icing. Incredible Sauce: 1 cup sugar, 1 stick butter, 1 Tablespoon corn syrup, ½ teaspoon baking soda, ½ cup buttermilk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Bring to a boil in medium saucepan, stirring constantly. Stir and cook for 3 more minutes. et aside. Poke holes all over the cake and slowly add all the warm sauce until it absorbs into a buttery pan of pumpkin heaven. Keep ice cream at the ready!
