Annual Electronics Recycling Day Saturday, February 21

The SRCA has again partnered with IMS Electronics Recycling, Inc. located in Decatur to provide for recycling of outdated, broken or unwanted electronic devices and machines (i.e., E-Waste). A complete list of E-Waste items that are either appropriate or unacceptable for recycling are available via the IMS Electronics Recycling web site: http://www.imselectronics. com/electronics-recycling/. Items can be dropped-off for recycling at the Smoke Rise Elementary Charter School parking lot between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. (or until the truck fills) on Saturday February 21, 2015. While most items are accepted for disposal free-of-charge, there is a \$5 fee for plastic CRT monitors, \$10 for CRT televisions, and \$30 for wooden console, rear projection and plasma screen televisions. These are pass-through fees from the provider for the aforementioned items that must be shipped elsewhere for expert disassembly and removal of hazardous metals. IMS Electronics Recycling is one of the few local vendors still accepting wooden console and rear projection televisions for disposal. SRCA hopes to see you on February 21 doing your part to divert E-Waste from disposal as trash and thereby reduce the burden on our county landfill and protect our environment from the toxic metals, retardants and plastics used in the fabrication of these devices. All collected waste is managed responsibly within the U.S.A and no whole electronic waste collected by IMS is exported. Volunteers from Smoke Rise to assist with the collection of e-waste are appreciated. Recycling – it is always the right thing to do!

The SRCA is targeting the week of March 8 for the next annual membership meeting, hoping to use the Fellowship Hall of Smoke Rise Baptist Church, and intending to have the new principal of Smoke Rise Elementary Charter School, Pamela McCloud, as the featured speaker.

Final date and plans will be in the March issue of the *Smoke Signal*.

SRCA Board News by Michael J. Huerkamp, President

The first meeting of the SRCA board was held on January 12, 2015. Key items of business before the board were co-sponsorship obligations toward the Walk to Remember, final arrangements for the meeting to establish relations with regional school superintendent Trenton Arnold, and the new elementary school principal, Pamela McCloud, organization of the February 21, 2015 electronics recycling event, and the launch of the 2015 membership dues campaign.

The board also began preparation for the annual membership meeting which is expected to be in March, for confidential document shredding which is targeted for April (ideally after tax day), and to set the budget and goals for 2015. A recap of the 2014 membership activity showed 723 households electing membership with 13% using PayPal and with 16% electing to support SRCA with donations above the dues amount. Improvements continue at the community garden which at this point has become essentially financially self-sustaining.

The all-volunteer SRCA board remains grateful for the support and confidence of dues-paying residents and looks forward to an eventful 2015.

It's a gift they hope to never use. David Thomas and Michael Hidalgo received a donation of an AED Unit (automated external defibrillator) for the ART Station from a new organization,

Life is Sweet! This gift is a result of the first annual Life is Sweet fundraiser held on September 11, 2014, the one year anniversary of founder, Lynne Dundon's, sudden cardiac arrest. Lynne is one of less than 8% of the victims of



cardiac arrest who can call themselves a survivor. She credits her survival to the fast response of Bill Hardman who saw Lynne collapse and started CPR, and the use of a convenient AED unit by the Stone Mountain Park Police Department. The idea that she had been saved for a reason stayed with her as she returned to work in early December 2013. Celebrating her birthday in early August 2014 with friends, the conversation turned to how lucky she was to be celebrating this birthday. All care of her age seemed to have disappeared but the approaching one year anniversary of her cardiac event was looming ahead of her. To help put a positive focus on the day, friends Marti Pirkle and Jessica McDonald suggested hosting an event to help others have a greater chance of surviving this silent killer.

The idea was born and "Life is Sweet" came to fruition with a successful event held at Café Jaya in Stone Mountain Village. Enough funds were raised to purchase their first AED unit for donation. The organization's goal is to help to provide AED units to non-profits and communities that can't afford them. In conjunction with the Stone Mountain Woman's Club, Life is Sweet is hosting their next event, The Art of the Heart, on Saturday, February 21, at The ART Station from 7:00 p.m. – 10:00 p.m. Fundraising efforts at this wine tasting event will go towards purchasing three AED units for the City of

Sit Back and Enjoy a Winter Garden By Renée Hopf

Last month the *Smoke Signal* ran an article titled "On the Road Again...With a Different Perspective." That was to remind us of how a winter drive through our Georgia mountains can make us aware of so many aspects that are hidden in the summer.

This month I would like to give you "a different perspective on a winter garden."

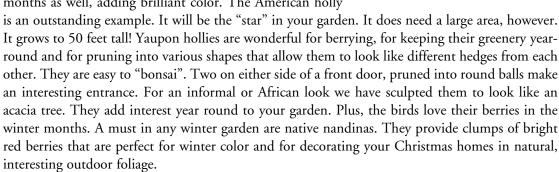
Of course, summertime is when we are excited, aware and busy in our gardens. But, if you think ahead in planning your own garden, or adding a few cool weather plants to an established garden, there are many reasons you can enthusiastically enjoy a winter garden without ever thinking about pulling a weed or getting out your lawn mower!

For instance, if you have learned that there are places in your garden that grass does not want

to live, but moss does, and you have allowed that to happen, you will find that moss becomes verdantly green and abundantly thick in these cool months and makes a beautiful contrast to your wheat-colored Bermuda lawns. The surfaces of all of our garden terraces and the spaces between our railroad tie steps are plush carpets of moss in our winter months.

Other guidelines to beauty in winter gardens are to plant trees that are beautiful while flowering and have bark that is eye-catching when their leaves fall. Excellent examples are the Natchez crape myrtles. Their bark peels, and leaves the trunks with gorgeous shades of intermingled rusty cinnamon, lemon color and deep browns in the winter months. Red twig dogwoods grow 8-10 feet tall and have striking red bark that really catches your attention when their leaves are gone.

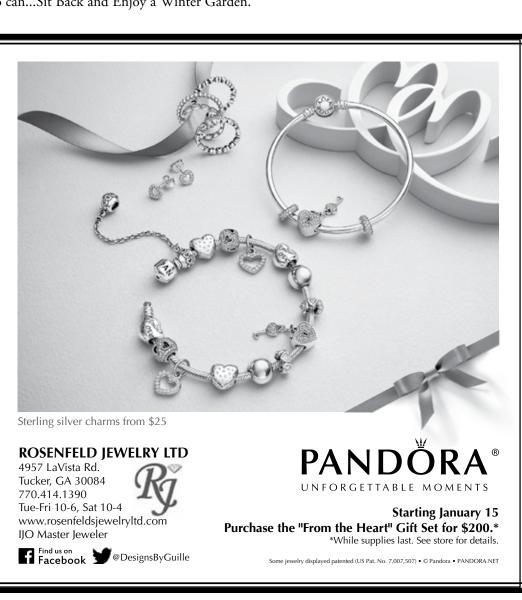
Most berrying trees and bushes perform in the winter months as well, adding brilliant color. The American holly



Some interesting perennial plants that show off in cool weather are: pink, white or red camellias, dainty snow drops that bloom to welcome the onset of winter, daphne that blooms in February and gives off the most inviting scent as you stroll by it. Helleborous (Lenten rose) are great plants for winter. Their leaves are show stoppers in the cold...large and shiny. Then as it begins to warm up, around Lent in the spring, beautiful white to pink flowers begin peeking out from under their leaves.

A few winter annuals are, of course, pansies, snapdragons and kale. In our garden the pansies and snaps really don't perform very well until late winter. They provide the best show in early spring. However, ornamental cabbages and decorative kale will do very well in your winter garden and give some protection to and add color if planted with your pansies and snaps.

Just think, with a little advanced planning and adding certain of these winter hardy plants, you too can...Sit Back and Enjoy a Winter Garden.

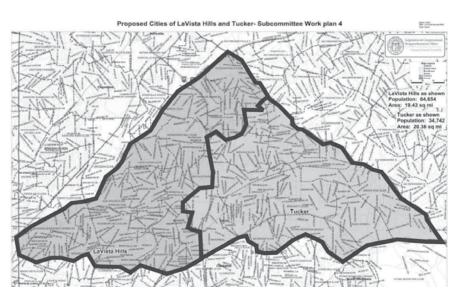

Tucker Update By Pat Soltys

This year promises to be a busy one for the proposed city of Tucker. The legislature is now back in session and will soon have a house bill sponsored by Billy Mitchell of the 88th district formally proposing Tucker Cityhood to the legislature.

It has been a long road to get to this point and the work is not done. In November, the house Governmental Affairs Committee appointed five legislators to create a map resolving the borders between Tucker and Lavista Hills. December 19th, the committee delivered the map. It is a compromise map in which neither of the initiatives got everything they wanted. The Stone Mountain initiative was changed to primarily focus on some commercial properties and no longer includes Smoke Rise.

The road from here is that there will be a lot of community meetings for information and fund raising while this through goes the legisla-During the work in the legislature, there could be some changes to the map but the line



between Tucker and Lavista Hills is pretty much set in stone according to Frank Auman, Tucker 2015 spokesman. One of the areas still in question is the area south of 78 and north of Ponce de Leon which is in the Tucker map.

During the time from now until the vote, there is a lot of work to be done, as the city charter has to be created and will be a part of the bill put to vote. The charter will define the districts and governance of the city as well as many items related to infrastructure. The charter is the basis of city law. During that time, the feasibility study also must be updated so that revenue and cost structures are defined. There will still be public and professional lobbying to make sure that the bill moves forward and is not compromised.

Taxes for services provided to the new city by the county will not change and will continue to be a direct bill. Schools and postal codes are not affected at all.

If the bill passes the legislative process, a public referendum would be set most likely for July in which those on the map will be voting for or against the city and the charter. If all is successful, the city of Tucker could be launched by January 1, 2016.

There is a lot of need for local talent in the process – everything from working on the cityhood campaign through capabilities and skills in working on the new infrastructure, specific services, writing the charter, and more. It would be great to tap the community brain trust. Raising funds is always important as \$40,000 - \$50,000 is the projected need through the referendum and preparation to launch the city. A part of the funds raised will be needed to update the feasibility study and fund the referendum. Get involved! Information can be found on the website http://tucker2015.com/

HEALTH NOTES:

by Cheri Schneider, M.D. Migraine Headaches

Has your life ever been interrupted or put on hold by a headache? One that made you want to skip school or work...or one that would just not go away? Well, you are in good company. Over half of adults worldwide have a headache disorder. Most of these are tension headaches. But, according to the American Headache Society, migraine headache is the most common cause of neurological disability and the seventh highest cause of disability of any type worldwide. Migraines affect one out of every eight Americans.

Migraine headaches can often be chronic, recurrent and severe. While they may start in childhood, migraines often begin or worsen during the teen years. They are rare after the age of fifty. Migraines are often described as pounding or throbbing and can be whole headed, one sided or move from one side of the head to the other. They typically last from four to 72 hours. Sensitivity to light, odors and noise may accompany the pain. Many people also have nausea and vomiting, loss of appetite and fatigue as well.

One fourth of migraine sufferers (migraineurs) have warning symptoms a few days or hours before the headache begins. They may experience jitteriness, fatigue, increased thirst, irritability, confusion or diarrhea. Treating the migraine at this prodromal stage may halt or abort the headache attack

Following the prodrome, approximately 20% of migraineurs will have something called an 'aura'. Most auras have a visual component to them and occur immediately before the headache begins: wavy lines, spots, bright flashes and zigzag lines in the line of vision. At times, auras can be very strange and can be difficult to differentiate from stroke and other neurological problems. MRI or CT scan imaging may be necessary in these situations. Following the actual headache, most people go through a recovery phase where they are tired, fatigued, and have trouble thinking.

If you think you have migraines, keeping a headache diary may help uncover triggers. Some of the more common triggers are: intake of hard cheeses, wine, beer, food preservatives, monosodium glutamate, chocolate and certain fruits. Medications like hormones and certain high blood pressure pills can cause a migraine. Stress, missed meals or sleep, physical overexertion and changing body cycles such as menstrual cycles can also trigger a migraine.

If you have more than one migraine a week, or your headache symptoms are severe, preventative therapy may be used. In this type of treatment, the patient takes daily medication to prevent the headaches from occurring. Various high blood pressure medications, anti-depressants, anti-seizure medicines, and Botox injections have all been used in preventative therapy.

Abortive therapy is aimed at stopping the headache in its tracks once it has begun. Some over- the-counter medications can stop migraines if they are not severe. These medications usually contain aspirin, acetaminophen or ibuprofen and caffeine. An important warning goes with over-the-counter medications. Prolonged or frequent use of these medications for headache can lead to an increase in headaches instead of a decrease.

Severe migraines are treated with Triptans, combination medications or Ergotamines. Many of these drugs can be taken as a shot, by mouth, as a nose spray or as a rectal suppository. Because these medications can have serious side effects, your doctor will guide you in choosing abortive medications to have on hand. Although occasionally used, regular use of drugs with Codeine or Butalbital should be avoided as they can lead to dependence and addiction.

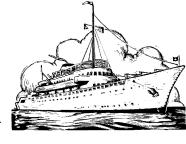

Do You Have 'Text Neck'?

Health Alert: The Dangers of TEXT NECK

What is it about modern communication between people that causes health issues? In the old days, communication was, in general, very healthy. Since the invention of the telephone in 1876, not only did we change the way we communicate, it has recently led to a new phenomenon, and the implication on our health is tragic. Smartphone usage is worldwide, and so is a new condition called "Text Neck". Text Neck is the position in which we hold our head, neck and body while we are using our smartphone for talking, texting, reading emails, watching YouTube videos and movies, and for just about every other thing that can now be done with these devices.

What Exactly Is Text Neck?

Text Neck is a downward-angled head position where the neck is held at a non-upright position for extended periods of time, reaching out in front of the body - think giraffe! This position causes the head to lean forward, and thus puts tremendous mechanical stresses on the body's muscles, ligaments and spinal cord. Everyone is assuming this position these days for long stretches of time while texting, Facebooking, or just glancing at the phone over and over again. Unfortunately, this new posture is incredibly unhealthy. Lying in bed or on a sofa with your head bent on pillows while using the smartphone only exacerbates the problem.

Symptoms

Text Neck often has no symptoms at the beginning. However, when symptoms do arise, it is often an indicator that postural changes have taken place and there are consequences to the body. This body position can have permanent, deleterious effects. Regarding the neck, it causes major mechanical problems: disc compression, loss of curve as well as a forward head position. The effects can be permanent and can lead to degeneration (arthritis), shortening of the ligaments and muscle spasms of the neck and compromised breathing. The Text Neck position has been linked to depression, low self-esteem and disability.

This position can lead to not only pain, but can also stretch the spinal cord as far down as the lower back. Your whole spine works as a unit. If one part is damaged or injured - like with Text Neck - the entire structure suffers. Thus, neck problems can impact your entire spine and therefore your overall health.

Prevention Is Key

Here are some tips on preventing this condition and its damaging effects on your health. Extreme example - don't text. The result might be a serious impact on your Facebook activity, angry family and friends from your lack of responding to their texts, and a whole lot of being in the dark about what's going on in the world. Obviously, if this isn't possible, try calling more often rather than texting and use a headset. In addition, use your voice recognition feature on your smartphone to text or email to save you from craning your neck; I find it to be much quicker than texting! Another practical idea is to simply hold your phone higher, at eye level. In addition, be aware of your overall posture and the strains on it - act to reduce those strains by repositioning.

Treatment

When negative structural changes have already taken place, help is difficult to find to correct the problem. There are very few doctors of any kind, in the world, who have spent the hours in training, who keep up with the latest research in this specialized field, and who have equipped their offices with the proper tools necessary to make permanent structural change. Can I Borrow a Cup of Sugar?

Have you lost touch with your neighbors? It can be hard to establish community ties in our busy lives. While I'm guilty of that to some degree myself, being out-of-touch can make us more vulnerable to break-ins and less connected to important community events and services. Social networks on the web, like Facebook, Pinterest, and Twitter, have shown us the value of connecting online. Now, there's a service that helps neighbors connect with ease. It's called "Nextdoor," and it aims to bring back a sense of community to our neighborhoods. That includes Smoke Rise.

"Nextdoor" is a free, private, social network for neighborhoods to establish virtual neighborhood connections that lead to real-life connections. The network allows members to get to know one another, ask questions and exchange information. Topics on "Nextdoor" are tailored to the interest of members – everything from local events, school activities, and business recommendations (need a good babysitter or some yard work done?) to garage sales, lost pet announcements, and recent crime activity. It's very specific and only accessible to residents of that neighborhood.

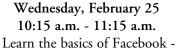
Neighborhoods establish and self-manage their own "Nextdoor" website. Information is only visible to verified members. One advantage when it comes to public safety: DeKalb County police can post important information, such as crime updates, directly to affected communities. But, the police department can't access neighbors' contact information or content. Also, information shared on the "Nextdoor" network is password protected and not found on search engines.

Thousands of neighborhoods across the country are already signed up. In DeKalb, there are already 270 "Nextdoor" neighborhood networks up and running. That's about 30,000 members that are actively engaged with their neighbors, and more members are signing up each day. Each member must verify their address before they can log onto this private neighborhood website. With its added sense of security, residents can talk about everyday things – both big and small. (Point of disclosure: I have signed up for the Smoke Rise network, but I am waiting for the post card verification with my pass code to log in.)

If you're interested in joining an online community that makes it easy to connect with everything that's going on in your neighborhood, be sure to check out the website: www.nextdoor.com. When you enter your address, it will take you to the signup site for the Smoke Rise network.

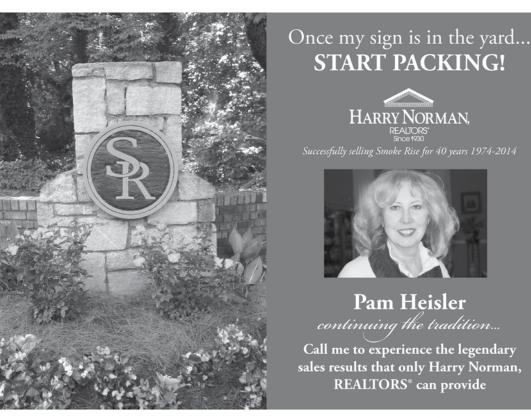

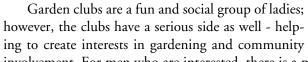

- 10) Don't forget two pairs of sunglasses and sun block (most important).

I am so behind the times...gee willikers. I just heard a phrase a few weeks ago for the first time and finally understand what the term "polar vortex" means since I am writing the column on January 7 and the temperature is fast dropping to sub-atomic freezing levels. And now that I know what "they" are talking about, I just heard this morning that "polar vortex" is one of the most overused terms of the year and it is on the no-no list of words to use...words like cracra, bae, foodie, swag and others like that which I never actually got around to using. Well, I used "swag" but I thought it was part of the drapes. So where have I been this year? How did I miss out completely on using these words that now are totally out of fashion? Bah, I say...it's time to use words we love that never go out of style. I'm talking Southern words like buttermilk and okra. Ha...now I have roped you into believing that I actually had a reason for this column! Oh, dear foodie, you are cra-cra if you think I actually have a swag plan of any kind. I would add "bae" in there but I'm not completely sure what that means. I'm not even sure what any of this means.

If you're cooking at home and being intrepid and using the grill like we do in all seasons, including monsoons, thunderstorms and the dreaded POLAR VORTEX, well, grill some **salmon**. Valentine's Day is soon, and salmon is pink. Lightly oil and season fish and grill quickly - about 3-4 minutes a side. Even if salmon isn't quite done in the center, it will continue to cook as it rests, leaving you with a lovely moist entrée. My favorite rub is a mixture of:

½ cup brown sugar Splenda®, ¹/3 cup paprika, ¹/8 cup salt, 1 teaspoon cumin, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1 Tablespoon chili powder, ½ teaspoon cayenne, (or a bit less if you're scared), ¹/2 teaspoon black pepper, and dashes of cinnamon, cardamom and coriander. Mix well and store covered. Use about ½ teaspoon per side of salmon. Wonderful on pork, flat iron steak or chicken as well. It turns your fingers pink to complete your festive Valentine's décor. And it adds swag.

Serve with roasted new potatoes and asparagus for a wonderful dinner. We have also fallen in love with okra and tomatoes lately, and this dish reheats beautifully. It would also be a good base if you wanted to toss in some shrimp, sausage or leftover chicken and serve it over rice.

Okra and Tomatoes

4 slices bacon, diced

1 small onion diced

1 teaspoon minced garlic (about 2 cloves)

2 cans diced tomatoes

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 Tablespoon chicken base (find in jars at the store)

2 teaspoons sugar (it cuts the acid taste of the tomatoes)

1 (16 ounce) package frozen okra or about 2-3 cups fresh, cleaned and sliced

Cook bacon until just about crisp in a Dutch oven. Add onion and garlic and sauté until tender. Add tomatoes, chicken base, sugar and pepper. Stir well and let simmer for about 15-20 minutes. Add okra and simmer until okra is done, about another 20 minutes. Adjust seasonings. You probably won't need salt, but we like a lot of pepper. This dish is gluten free and really low in carbs as well.

Eleanor's Pistachio-Cranberry Buttermilk Fudge

2 cups sugar

½ cup butter

½ cup buttermilk

3 (4 ounce) bars white chocolate, cut into pieces

1 (7 ounce) jar marshmallow crème

3/4 cup dried cranberries, coarsely chopped

³/₄ cup roasted, salted pistachios, coarsely chopped

Line an 8-9 inch square pan with foil and lightly butter foil. Combine sugar, butter and buttermilk in 3-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring, until mixture comes to a boil (5-7 minutes). Reduce heat to low and cook, stirring occasionally, until candy thermometer reaches 234, about 6-8 minutes. Remove from heat and add in chopped white chocolate and stir until melted. Add marshmallow crème and then add cranberries and nuts. Spread into pan and refrigerate until cool. Lift out of pan using foil and cut into squares. This ages well and keeps a long time, probably because of the buttermilk. Tangy, salty and sweet, it is a lovely candy when you need something white to brighten up the dessert plate.
