MEMORIAL DAY: A SOLEMN DAY OF REMEMBRANCE By Barbara Bruschi

While nature is resurging and its incredible beauty is surrounding us, a grateful nation remembers its fallen heroes on the last Monday of May, Memorial Day. For over a century, Memorial Day, as we know it now, has been observed on May 30, the day General Logan designated as Decoration Day in 1868. At first, only soldiers that served in the Civil War were remembered. Now, Memorial Day honors veterans of World War I, World War II, The Vietnam War, The Korean War and the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Congress passed the Uniform Monday holiday act for Memorial Day in 1968 and it went into effect in 1971.

At Arlington National Cemetery, soldiers place flags in front of 360,000 gravestones to remember their comrades that died defending our country – a promise that those who made the ultimiate sacrifice

for their country will never be forgotten.

On this day many American visit the graves of their loved ones. A national moment of remembrance takes place at 3 p.m. ET. The flag of the United States of America is flown at half-staff from dawn to noon. Another custom from the Civil War era is to wear a red poppy on Memorial Day, symbolizing the blood that was shed "In Flanders Field" after the publication of the war

time poem by Lt. Colonel John McCrae while serving on the front lines.

Many towns and cities host parades, honoring the military and veterans. Picnics, family gatherings, and sporting events are held over the extended holiday weekend. Many families decorate graves and others visit Memorials.

All wars leave devastation and endless heartache. This Memorial Day our thoughts will be with the Ukrainians that are valiant-



ly fighting for their liberty and right to exist as an independent nation.

On May 30th we salute the bravery of our military service members, who protecting our freedom to pursue our destiny in peace.



techtalk by Susan Gilbert Locking in your Natural Gas Price Pays!

...that is, at the right time of the year. You may remember the warnings to do that late last summer and early fall. Experts predicted the prices were going to rise significantly.

Recent wholesale natural gas prices are hitting record highs. In April, they topped \$8 per million BTUs. That is a wholesale price equivalent of \$0.80 per therm. You must go all the way back to 2008 to see prices this high.

To get a feel for how this affects people's budgets, if you were paying a winter gas bill of \$200 last year when wholesales prices were \$2.5 per million BTUs, if you were not on a locked-in rate, you might be looking at a bill 3.2 times that, or \$640!

Once you enter your home profile, which takes less than a minute if you know your home's characteristics, you click Submit and within seconds have the results. Recommendations are presented in order of highest dollar saving amounts. You can also see where your annual energy dollars are going and see a monthly bar chart broken down by your home's end uses, like Heating, Cooling, Refrigeration, Water Heating, etc.

So, take control of your monthly energy bills by remembering to lock in a low gas price in October and by learning how you can lower your bills by making some changes in your home or lifestyle. Now is a great time to change your filters and have your HVAC system serviced for the cooling season.

HEALTH NOTES:

I was listening to the radio the other day and heard the host asking listeners to send in examples of archaic English. The example he gave was 'dungarees'. Well, that got me to thinking about the many medical terms that were used and understood by the general public that are no longer used today. I thought it would be fun to come up with a 'list' and define the terms. Maybe you can think of terms yourself.

The first example is from my medical school days. The local senior center residents 'volunteered' to be our guinea pigs as we learned to interview patients and do a careful physical exam. The first patient came in and I introduced myself as "student doctor." I asked her why she had come. She replied "Doctor, I've got a kernel in my grines." Not knowing what a 'kernel' was or 'grines', I plowed into my questions. Eventually, I determined that she had a lymph node she could feel ('kernel') in her groin area ("grines'). This was my first introduction to the challenges in communication I would eventually have as a doctor.

In this modern age, we all hear medical jargon everywhere we turn. The pandemic (see what I mean?) has made this worse. Thanks to advertising, medical breaking news stories and of course, Google, we speak of things not even taught when I was in medical school. Who would have thought we would understand or be discussing casually monoclonal antibodies, RNA, DNA sequencing, Cloning, insulin resistance and 'incidence' of disease in the community?

Well, if you are wondering what it means to hear that Aunt Clarice died of Dropsy and her husband had Apoplexy, read on! Here is a short list of terms that were well known in the 1940s and earlier but are a puzzle today. So, if you are having a major depressive bout, don't let your melancholia get to you. It could just the be change of life! Or piles, lumbago, the shakes, consumption or...

Dropsy: swelling or sometimes for congestive heart failure Consumption: Tuberculosis

The Clap: gonorrhea

Dowager's hump: a somewhat offensive reference to an old woman (dowager) who is bent over with a hump in her back Apoplexy: stroke. More commonly used for hemorrhage of the brain causing a stroke

Blood poisoning: septicemia, sepsis. Severe infection that has entered the blood stream

Frigid: usually referring to a woman with low sex drive

Lumbago: back pain

Quincy: tonsillitis

Change of Life: menopause or at times, entry into puberty Croup: hoarse upper respiratory illness with cough

Lockjaw: tetanus Piles: Hemorrhoids Infantile paralysis: Polio

Lying in: time before and just after childbirth

Hysteritis: inflammation of the uterus...hence the still used term 'hysterectomy' for removal of the uterus. Don't get me started on this one.

Coryza: runny nose from a cold

Crabs: pubic lice, often sexually spread, but can be spread by crowded unsanitary conditions

Melancholia: depression

Retarded: a mental or cognitive delay

The shakes: Parkinson's Disease

Gravel: kidney stones

Lunatic: one with a mental illness such as schizophrenia

Simpleton or Cretin (banned from use in deference to the Isle of Crete). Interestingly, 'cretinism' was found to be mental deficiency due to congenital lack of thyroid hormone. This is why every newborn is checked for thyroid deficiency at birth.

May 24 General Primary Election



The 2022 General Primary is May 24. All registered voters in DeKalb County are eligible to vote in this election.

May 13: Last day to submit a request for an absentee application

May 24: Election Day (If voting by mail, completed absentee ballot must be turned in to DeKalb VRE by 7:00 p.m.)

Registered voters have choices on how to vote in the upcoming General Primary Election. You can wait for election day (May 24) and vote at your assigned precinct, you can opt for in-person advanced voting, or you can vote via absentee ballot.

Early voting (in-person advanced voting) begins May 2 and ends May 20. Check online at DeKalbVotes.com, to see details on locations, dates, and times. A close location for us Smoke Risers is the Tucker-Reid H. Cofer Library at 5234 Lavista Road, Tucker, GA 30084. There is also a drop box at this library where you can return an absentee ballot (if you opted for that method of voting and didn't want to use traditional mail to send the ballot back to the DeKalb Voter Registration & Elections office).

You can complete an absentee ballot application online at DeKalbVotes.com - under the "Request Absentee Ballot" tab. A voter signature is required on this application! You must use a pen. No electronic signatures are allowed. Be sure to read through the entire application carefully. You are now required to provide either your Georgia Driver's License number, a Georgia ID Card number, or a photocopy of another approved form of ID. (If you do not have an acceptable ID, you can get one free of charge from DeKalb's VRE office or the Department of Driver Services.) Once filled out, absentee ballot applications can be returned in person or by mail to DeKalb Voter Registration & Elections at 4380 Memorial Drive, Suite 300, Decatur, GA 30032, via fax at (404) 298-4038 or via email at absenteeballot@dekalbcountyga.gov.

After you return your completed absentee ballot application, be sure to look out for your election ballot. DeKalb's VRE must receive your completed ballot by 7:00 p.m. on election day. To meet that deadline, it's a good idea to mail your ballot back at least a week before election day – or use a Drop Box to return your election ballot. Note: Only roommates, immediate family members, or caregivers can return absentee ballots that do not belong to them.

If you request an absentee ballot – but change your mind and want to vote in person – you can do that! Bring your absentee ballot with you to your polling location on election day, or if you decide to vote in-person advanced voting, bring it to the early voting place - and you may vote in-person instead.

You can check the status of your application or your ballot at the Georgia "My Voter Page" online at: www.mvp.sos.ga.gov/MVP/mvp.do. If you have not received your ballot 10 days after it was issued, or if your ballot has not been accepted 10 days after you returned it, contact DeKalb's VRE office at (404) 298-4020 or voterreg@dekalbcountyga. gov.

May is Garden for Wildlife Month! by Linda Karr

Have a deck or balcony garden or an acre or two? Either way you can create a sustainable garden for wildlife. The four primary components of a wildlife habitat include food, water, cover, and places to raise young. Support the birds and the bees, the butterflies and all the other backyard wildlife.

Opportunities in the garden for May:

- Plant beans, squash, corn, okra, tomatoes, cucumbers, eggplant, peppers, peas, corn, carrots, leeks, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes, pumpkins, melon, herbs, perennials and annuals and more! Do a second planting of beans, squash and corn 2-3 weeks after the first planting. Mulch to help retain moisture and keep down the weeds.
- Cage your tomatoes and peppers. Trellising your beans, peas, and cucumbers saves space for more plants.
- Plant annuals for bursts of colors. Fertilize your annuals and perennials.
- Pinch off the tips of asters, bee balm, Shasta daisies, and chrysanthemums to control their height, promote branching and flowering.
- Fertilize water garden plants.
- Transplant hellebore seedlings now.
- Are whiteflies swarming around your gardenias? Spray with insecticidal soap now.
- Put a hollowed-out cantaloupe or grapefruit half to lure slugs away from your hosta and other ornamentals.
- Make sure you plant herbs. Don't have space for an herb garden? Intersperse them in your vegetable and flower gardens.
- Water early in the morning. Make sure your sprinkler system is set appropriately.
- Mulch if you haven't already. This will help your plants get through the hot summer.
- Have your irises become too crowded? Once they have finished blooming it is time to divide and transplant them.

We so enjoy watching the birds in our garden. We love the different views we have whether it's from the screen porch up in the trees or down at ground level. In the evening dinner is accompanied with a symphony of nature's sounds.

Is your hummingbird nectar disappearing and you haven't seen hummingbirds? Sugar water thieves could include squirrels, other birds, and butterflies.

Although most migrants fly at night, you are probably seeing some of the migratory birds flying through. May is a peak time for spring migration. Cornell Lab's BirdCast project covers which species will arrive in your region over the next week. And their migration maps can let you know which nights will see the biggest flights.

It's the time of year where you may find baby birds (or other animal babies) on the ground. Remember, for the most part, it's best to leave them where they are. Their parents will typically take care of them. Birds who do not have feathers yet should be put back in the nest, if possible. If not, make a nest out of a small container and put it in the tree. If a baby is injured or has been abandoned, call a wildlife rescue group such as AWARE Wildlife Center (678-418-1111).

The Atlanta Audubon Society has a helpful chart: I Found a Baby Bird at

www.atlantaaudubon.org/injured-orphaned-birds.

If you're unable to locate a wildlife rescue center or rehabilitator, contact a local animal shelter, zoo, humane society, animal control department, nature center, state wildlife agency, or veterinarian for advice. Do not try to take care of a wild animal yourself. Caring for wildlife is a round-the-clock job and requires special training to do properly."







Mother's Day Brunch

Whether Mom's Day is celebrated by sleeping in a few extra hours or waking up to an early morning breakfast that she did not have to cook, you will add to her blessings and favorite memories with some well-planned but easy recipes that won't require a lot of cooking experience to impress her. The Quick Quiche is one of my most requested recipes. Do not let the name "Quiche" deter you! It is hearty, spicy and cheesy! Let the kids help... They love to break eggs!

Quick Quiche

1 cup sour cream

1 cup of your favorite salsa from a jar

6 eggs, beaten

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese.

1/2 tsp salt.

Spray glass baking dish with Pam spray. Spread salsa over bottom of dish. Beat eggs with sour cream., add salt. Add ½ cup of shredded cheese. Carefully spoon egg mixture over salsa. Sprinkle remaining cheese over top. Bake 350° until set. Serve with extra salsa on the side.

Cream Cheese Danish Fresh from The Oven

How can it get easier than opening a can of crescent rolls? These take approximately 15 minutes to put together, 30-45 minutes to bake. They need to cool about 20 minutes before adding the glaze. The kids will love popping the cans and unrolling the dough.

2 cans refrigerated crescent rolls

2 (8 oz each) packages cream cheese

1 cup sugar

1 tsp Vanilla Extract

1 whole egg

1 egg white

Preheat oven to 350° and grease 13x9 inch baking pan. Open one can and spread out the rolls in one layer of baking pan. Pinch edges together. Beat cream cheese, sugar, vanilla, and whole egg together until smooth. Spread the mixture over the crescent rolls evenly and then lay the second pack of rolls on top of the cheese mixture (as close together as possible). Brush top rolls with egg white. Bake for 35-40 minutes until top is brown. Spread with glaze after cooling for 20 minutes.

Glaze:

½ cup powdered sugar

2 Tablespoons milk

½ tsp. vanilla extract.

Mix until smooth and spread over top of rolls. If desired, serve with fruit preserves or fresh fruit.

Fresh Fruit Mimosa Cocktail

This is a wonderful time of year to take advantage of all the beautiful fresh fruit that is available, and this cocktail is a delicious complement to the meal. Using your deepest crystal bowl, cut up Mom's favorite berries, fresh pineapple, ripe pears, green and red grapes, and fresh melon. Fruit can be pre-cut and refrigerated the night before. Just before serving, add two cups favorite cold champagne (pink, if available). Garnish with springs of fresh mint or lemon wedge. For non-alcoholic version, use sparkling cider. Add fresh flowers to the base of the bowl for a lovely Spring centerpiece.
