

# Irish for a Day

Don a bit o'green and slip into the spirit of Saint Patrick's day, whether you are Irish or not. Saint Patrick is the Patron Saint of Ireland and March 17th is a day of commemoration for his role in largely converting Ireland from Paganism to Christianity around the 5th century AD.

His birthplace was either Scotland or Roman England. He was kidnapped, sold into slavery and spent six years in an Irish prison. During this time, he received his calling for serving the church in his dreams. He escaped and studied in a French monastery for 12 years under bishop of Auxerre. With the Pope's blessing, he went back to Ireland and became the Voice of the Irish faithful by spreading Christianity throughout the country. It is said that he used the Irish Shamrock to explain the concept of the Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Many legends follow Saint Patrick. He proclaimed that God's curse drove all the poisonous snakes into the sea where they drowned. The legend of the Leprechauns is about Irish wee people which are said to have a pot of gold hidden deep in the woods. To protect their gold, the Irish fairies gave them mystical powers. The goddess Brighid (Healer) is another well-known Irish legend. To this day, many of Brighid's Holy Water Wells still exist. Her waters were aid to heal all manner of disease. Saint Patrick's Day was mainly a religious holiday which later in history turned into having many secular activities as well.

# **Smoke Rise Community Association Updates**

The first 2015 meeting of the SRCA board was held on January 12. Key items of business before the board were co-sponsorship obligations toward the Walk to Remember, final arrangements for the meeting to establish relations with regional school

superintendent Trenton Arnold and the new Smoke Rise Elementary Charter School principal Pamela McCloud, organization of the February 21 electronics recycling event, and the launch of the 2015 membership dues campaign.



The board also began preparations for confidential document shredding - which is targeted for April (ideally after Tax Day), and to set the budget and goals for 2015. A recap of the 2014 membership activity showed 723 households electing membership with 13% using PayPal and with 16% electing to support SRCA with donations above the dues amount. Improvements continue at the community garden which at this point has become essentially financially self-sustaining. The all-volunteer SRCA board is grateful for the support and confidence of dues-paying residents and looks forward to an eventful 2015.

The SRCA annual membership meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 31, beginning at 7:00 p.m. at the Fellowship Hall of Smoke Rise Baptist Church. Along with reports and updates from the SRCA board of directors, the featured guest will be new elementary school principal, Pamela McCloud.

One hundred percent of dues are used by the all-volunteer SRCA board to promote Smoke Rise and the quality of life in our community. 


#### St. Andrews Presbyterian Church Welcomes New Pastor

#### Planning, Land Use and Zoning Updates

The LaVista Office Park, located behind the IHOP, Po Folks, and Checkers at LaVista Road and Northlake Parkway, will demolish all of the existing offices and redevelop with 200,000 s.f. of retail and restaurants. This development will include a moderate-sized big box anchor and smaller, street front retail stores, including more high-end shops and restaurants.

The two story United Car Sales facility at the intersection of Hugh Howell Road and Lawrenceville Highway (across from Chick-Fil-A) is proposed to redevelop to a 7,000 square foot retail facility with two national sit down dining restaurants (no drive through service) plus an additional retail space. The proposed plan is of a Main Street type design, with the building along the road and large sidewalks and landscaping along Hugh Howell Road.

In other development news, a permit has been issued for the demolition of the former Willie B's restaurant located at 1949 Mountain Industrial Blvd. A McDonald's restaurant will be built on the site. A bakery called CocoCakes by Coco will also be opening in the former Mighty Joe's Espresso location in the Ingle's Shopping Center on Hugh Howell Rd.

## City of Stone Mountain DDA Hosts 2015 Kick-Off Event

The City of Stone Mountain Downtown Development Authority hosted its annual Kick-Off Event in February to review its 2014 accomplishments and announce plans for 2015. More than 70 people attended.

"2014 was a year of many changes. We completed the merger of the DDA, Main Street Stone Mountain and the Stone Mountain Visitors Center. We welcomed our new Executive Director, Mechel McKinley. We celebrated our 175th Anniversary and opened five new businesses in the Village. It was a big year!" said Mary Beth Reed, Chair of the DDA.

During the evening, 2014 Volunteers of the Year, Pam DeLoach and Beth Snead, were announced. They were each presented with certificates and gift baskets.

A major initiative for 2015 is a campaign entitled #VillageStrong. The idea was conceived by Chakira Johnson, DDA Board Member, after the tragic fire at the Westgate Shopping Plaza in the Village in October. "The community was hurt by the destruction that closed six businesses in one swoop. We need a rallying cry. And we needed to focus on the good stuff," said Johnson.

"This is a great place to live and work. We have a beautiful natural resource in our backyard. We have the ability to enjoy the resources of living near a major metropolitan area but still have a hometown feel that you can't get in other places in Atlanta. Stone Mountain Village is a gem and we need to focus on the positive things we gain by living in this community," encouraged McKinley, during the presentation.

2015 will also feature a new Granite Grasshopper Festival, the return of the weekly Farmers Market in the spring, a community-based business grant program, a new City Cemetery tour in partnership with the Stone Mountain Historical Society and the continuation of the Façade Grant program.

"2015 is going to be exciting! We have new initiatives, ongoing initiatives and a lot of enthusiasm for moving Stone Mountain Village forward," said Reed.

The mission of the DDA is to foster an environment that sustains current businesses and encourages future growth and development while enhancing the historic character of the city of Stone Mountain using the Main Street approach.

#### **CID Addressing Road Issues Impacting Local Employers**

Stone Mountain CID focusing on infrastructure corrections to benefit existing and incoming commercial property owners and their clientele

The Stone Mountain Community Improvement District (CID) is at the forefront of addressing infrastructure needs confronting some of the area's largest employers.

The CID is working on multiple fronts to ease commercial vehicle travel throughout the corridor by increasing access to the large number of businesses that specialize in freight.



One effort taking shape this year will be improvements to permit safer tractor-trailer turns at narrow intersections. At the moment, these large turning vehicles can damage curbs, drainage basins and pedestrian lights. Valuable cargo and expensive trucks can also be compromised by the tight spaces.

"Moving freight into and out of the commercial corridor is critical to our economic vitality," said CID President Emory Morsberger. "We are making great strides to effectively tackle these concerns by working closely with our federal, state and county government partners to complete the improvements more quickly."

Additionally, the CID has commissioned a detailed traffic flow study to evaluate new methods for decreasing travel time within the corridor. Currently more than 35,000 vehicles travel on Mountain Industrial Boulevard daily, and one of every seven trips through the CID is completed by a commercial vehicle such as a freight truck.

CID efforts supporting improved travel times will help minimize overall traffic delays while reducing congestion for all area drivers. Morsberger added that the Stone Mountain CID is working with the Gwinnett Village and Lilburn CIDs to support reduced trip times along the full length of the Jimmy Carter Boulevard-Mountain Industrial Boulevard corridor.

"We want our existing and potential commercial property owners as well as other stakeholders to know that they have a strong advocate committed to facilitating these transportation enhancements," Morsberger said. "This year will bring many upgrades to create a more efficient travel experience for our community."



#### Are Immunizations Really Necessary? Vaccine Myths

In February and March of 1986, I had a two-part article published in the Journal of Continuing Education for the Family Physician about the controversies of childhood vaccination. At that time, the big controversy was: Did immunizations cause Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS); and did the Whooping Cough vaccine cause neurologic damage and seizures. These controversies and others were causing a decline in the rate of vaccination of children in the United States. Between 1989 -1991, a measles outbreak struck 55,622 Americans, killing 123.

Today we live in a similar time. The recent new outbreak of measles has resurrected old fears, beliefs and myths about immunizations. Now it is not SIDS – which was clearly disproven – but Autism that is being blamed on immunizations. And, the argument for this is clearly emotional and based on well-publicized propaganda that continues to be circulated in the press and on the Internet by special interest groups. Sadly, the author of the "study" on Autism (it was actually a preliminary study) A.J. Wakefield, falsified information about all 12 subjects in his study. He was charged with professional misconduct and a financial conflict of interest, later losing his license to practice medicine. (It was also reported that he received more than \$600,000 from the lawyers who sued vaccine manufacturers). He continues to speak about autism and vaccinations. After his "findings" were retracted by the journal Lancet, and others, at least three excellent, well-controlled studies have shown that immunizations and their preservatives do NOT cause autism.

Here are several common myths about vaccines:

- 1. Vaccines are 'drugs' you inject into your baby. (I heard this on an interview recently). Immunizations are actually an injection, of a tiny amount of the weakened or killed organism that causes the disease, into the muscle. This causes your body to mount an immune response against the disease. If you are exposed to the disease (say, measles) your body recognizes it as an enemy it has encountered before and will mount an immune response that keeps you from actually getting the disease. Vaccines are not drugs.
- 2. You can 'get' the disease from the vaccine. Live vaccines (flu-mist, measles, chicken pox and in the past, polio) can cause you to 'shed' small amounts of the virus. People with cancer, AIDS, immune diseases, or those who take chronic chemotherapy or steroids can get the disease from those who have just been vaccinated. Children who have received live vaccines should stay away from immuno-compromised people or the very frail elderly. Immuno-compromised individuals should only be vaccinated with live vaccines if approved by their doctor. No immunization is 100% effective. Most fall in the 85-95% range with the exception of the flu shot, which varies depending on how accurately they predict which strains to include in the shot.
- -There are reports of mild cases of measles, mumps or rubella from the vaccine, but these resolve quickly and lead to no serious side effects.
- -The live polio vaccine is no longer given in the U.S., because of the rare instance of polio occurring from the vaccine (1 in 2.5 million doses).
- -The nasal flu-mist can cause sore throat, fever and nasal symptoms, but doesn't cause the true 'flu' in the lower respiratory tract.
- -The 'flu shot' is a killed/inactivated virus and cannot give you the flu.
- 3. Side effects from the vaccine are worse than the disease. Redness, swelling and fever are not considered severe side effects. Serious reactions to certain vaccines CAN occur but are rare and almost always much rarer than that which would naturally occur during an epidemic of the disease. Your doctor will inform you of any potential serious reactions to watch for and report.
- 4. The United States doesn't have the diseases we vaccinate for, so we are safe and should stop vaccinating our children. To some extent it is true that most of the diseases are not usually seen in the U.S. However, due to our mobile society, and the fact that so many people travel internationally, polio, measles and whooping cough and other diseases have entered the U.S. from other countries where there are epidemics. There is currently a whooping cough and measles epidemic in the U.S.
- 5. My child doesn't need to be vaccinated... they will be protected by those around them who are vaccinated. This is partly true. This is called 'herd' immunity. Herd immunity means if the 'herd' is vaccinated, the disease cannot enter the community and affect you. This only works if 95% of the 'herd' is vaccinated. Current statistics in the U.S. vary depending on the immunization, from 89% to 93% (2013 statistics). Unfortunately, we have scattered pockets of unimmunized people! Again, many diseases such as measles, diphtheria (In Russia in 2009) and even polio are still present overseas.
- 6. *I am breastfeeding. My baby gets immunity from me.* It is true that the baby gets some immune globulin from you, but not the type that would protect your baby from any of the childhood diseases.
- 7. We shouldn't give so many shots at once, that's why bad side effects occur. This is a myth. Multiple immunizations can be given without increasing the side effect profile.
- 8. The mercury or preservative Thimersol in vaccines causes brain damage and Autism. This idea went "viral" due to an interview on the Oprah Winfrey Show. This "link" has been disproven. In fact, vaccine manufacturers voluntarily withdrew Thimersol from all but two vaccines.

I could go on, but there is not room. Wikipedia (which I am always careful to second check) has good information with excellent scientific sources on the Thimersol/Autism controversy. The CDC website has many pages of excellent information about vaccines in general. Read up on reputable websites like the CDC, NIH, and WebMD. Once informed, stay up-to-date on your shots, so you can stay healthy!

#### Smoke Rise Moms Connect with Night Out

Many new, young families are moving to this area, and Smoke Rise moms have taken a new approach to connecting with one another. After bumping into one another at the pool or casually seeing others over social media, it became apparent that these moms all wanted to find a way to form real friendships. So, one mom decided it was time to take action and get together!

When the cold weather keeps everyone inside, sometimes it's harder to see your neighbors or meet new faces. Spring comes and everyone goes outside. We go for a walk and find ourselves stopping to chat. But the wintertime... that's when it's harder to meet our neighbors.

So, let the Smoke Signal start spring a little early and introduce you to a few. Let's go down for a walk down Hugh Howell to "The Forest" and meet Winslow and Judy Thomas. They moved to Smoke Rise in 1997, because they needed more space and, as Winslow says, "It is a lovely place to live."

When Winslow and Judy first met, they found they had a lot in common. They both have a love of the theater and have been actively involved in productions since they were children – church choirs, school plays, and professional theater. And, also, amazingly enough, both have a love of

the Celtic culture. Winslow has a rich family history from Ireland and Scotland, and he remembers his grandmother telling him stories in Gaelic when he was but a "wee little boy-o." Judy first fell in love with Irish music, so it was no surprise that she also fell in love with an Irish actor. All he had to do was step behind the microphone, and it was love at first sight.

It makes sense that more than two decades after their first meeting that they would be two of the founders of Atlanta's only Celtic theater. "Other theaters in Atlanta have their niche, but the rich availability of material from the Celtic world was not being served," says Judy. So, along with other Atlanta actors and actresses, they founded Arís Theatre (pronounced "ah-REESH").

Arís! Arís! That's what you would be saying if you attended a theater production at Arís Theatre. Actually, the very name Arís means "encore" or "again!" in Irish (Gaelic). Last year, 2014, was the theater's inaugural season, and not only did they feature three stage productions, they were also a part of other events around Atlanta, such as The Celtic Christmas and Irish Fest Atlanta. Their main productions are held at Georgia Public Broadcasting, whose managers loved the idea as soon as they heard of the initial project.

Last year, Winslow played the part of Byron in the American premier of the one-man show "Trust Byron" (by Georgia Costigan). Winslow said it was an amazing role to play. He most enjoyed "the complete and absolute fearlessness of the outlook of a man who was centuries before his time." Winslow will be touring this one-man show this upcoming year, along with being involved in the 2015 projects.

Although they both have day jobs, this is where Winslow and Judy spend their time, and this is their passion. Winslow says he was first cast in a school play in the 1st grade. "I was a baby elephant," he laughs. "I remember walking around with five other little boys being an elephant. And I have wanted to do nothing else ever since." Judy says theater saved her as a young teen. "I was avoiding school because of a bully. Theater and music helped me to find my place and saved my schoolwork."

If you are interested in their performances, there is an upcoming spring production this month. As a new start-up theater group, they are using this production as a fundraiser. On March 21 - 22, they will be producing four Celtic shorts featuring works from Wales, Ireland, Scotland and England. You can find out more online at aristheatre.org.

Stop by and have a chat with Winslow and Judy sometime. They will have stories to tell that will take you worlds and centuries away. Oh and did I mention they are both wedding officiants, as well? That's in their free time, of course. The Thomases have a long history of not just playing interesting parts, but being interesting people. And it looks like their future will be filled with just as much drama, as well.

### K-9 Memorial Planned in Tucker

Their loyalty has no limits. They serve without question. And, now, DeKalb County is teaming up with the Police Department and Animal Services to erect a proper memorial for our K-9 "officers." The monument, titled "Hero, Partner, Friend," will be located at DeKalb County Police Headquarters at 1960 West Exchange Place, Decatur, 30084.

Plans for the project began after a discussion between a DeKalb K-9 police officer and DeKalb's Animal Services Director, after the passing of the officer's K-9 companion. Officer Mark Taylor and his K-9 partner worked together for a decade. "D-J" died last August.

"After losing him, that's when I decided this memorial needed to come to the forefront of what we're doing here to remember the dogs. It's indescribable. Their importance level to the job that we do is immeasurable. They provide a service that, as humans, we just can't do," said Taylor.

Police officers typically form a strong bond with the K-9 officer. The dog lives with his or her handler 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They truly are a part of the family. They also are a very important part of the policing "family." K-9's are deployed on a daily basis for various tasks including, explosive and narcotic detection, criminal apprehension, and locating missing children and elderly persons. DeKalb's K-9 Memorial will recognize all dogs who have ever served our county.

DeKalb County officials held a press conference in November 2014 to launch a fundraiser to develop the memorial. A cost of \$10,000.00 is estimated for the project. The money will be used to raise a statue. A walkway of engraved pavers with the K-9's name and service years will lead citizens to the monument. Special donors will be identified on top of the granite slab that the dog statue will be mounted upon. Other donors will be recognized in a celebration program in May.

By the beginning of February, 2015, the contributions already reached the halfway mark.

"It really touched my heart how many people have supported this important project. These dogs go to work every day and put their lives on the line alongside their human partners. They deserve to be honored at the end of their watch, like any officer," said Xan Rawls, DeKalb County's Director of Animal Services and fundraising coordinator.

The K-9 monument will be located on the hill where the current police headquarters signage is - overlooking the projected police and firefighter monuments. It's purposefully located behind the other monuments... as dogs always have their officer's back.

The statue and memorial will be dedicated May 15, 2015 as part of the observance of the 100th year of DeKalb County Police Services.



# HODGE PODGE

I have little or no shame, so I am admitting that I eat way too much; for instance, there is no way in the world that a box of granola is going to get away with that lousy half cup serving portion. I usually eat half the box. Followed by four cups of coffee and a couple of extra cups around 10:00, because it really is hard to wake up. That's because I can't go to sleep until I have won at least one game of Vegas Solitaire or Pyramid. Often this takes me until 1:00 in the morning. Then, I have to read or do crosswords until the words actually cross. Then, I wake up again around 3:00 a.m. and read again, in case my body actually thinks it is getting rested. I only get things done around here, because I quit answering the phone and can cook dinner and eat while partially asleep. Then I go to sleep again while watching TV, only managing to stay awake to make sure I get the final Jeopardy question correct. In fact, I'm asleep right now!

Well, I'm tired. But not so much that I won't share a few recipes that are just so comforting for the cold March weather we often have. March sounds like it's going to be cool and spring-like, but normally I hibernate in March, so what do I know?

OK... this is from Ina Garten, and I adapted it a bit. It is absolutely wonderful, if you serve it with roasted carrots. And, it suits a meal of pork or roast beef perfectly.

#### Pureed Parsnips and Pears

- 1 pound of parsnips, peeled and cut into 1 inch chunks
- 2 firm pears, peeled and cut into 1 inch chunks
- 4 Tablespoons butter
- ½ cup sour cream
- 2 extra large eggs
- 3/4 teaspoon grated orange zest

½ teaspoon salt and about ¼ teaspoon pepper

Place parsnips and pears in large saucepan and just cover with water. Bring to a boil, cover and simmer for 20 minutes or until they are tender. Place in fine mesh colander and let drain, undisturbed, until all liquid is gone. Place pears and parsnips in food processor and pulse until mixture is smooth. Add the butter, sour cream, eggs, zest and seasonings and process quickly to combine. Taste for seasonings and add more salt or pepper to taste. Pour into greased 9x12 oval casserole dish. Bake at 350 for 40-45 minutes until golden. You can roast the carrots at the same time if they are on the small side.

This is delicious, but do expect a little of a texture, because pears have a little "grain." We like this with loads of pepper. It also reheats well, as do the carrots.

#### Roasted Carrots

Cut carrots in half crosswise, and then cut in again lengthwise into smallish matchsticks. A pound is good for four people. Place in roasting pan and drizzle with 2-3 Tablespoons melted butter, 2 tablespoons honey and a good squirt of maple syrup. Lightly salt. Roast at 350-400 degrees until glazed and tender, stirring once or twice to make sure they are coated well. If you cut them into coins, it's pretty durn cute to pretend they are coins for St. Pat's Day.

Try this amazing lime pound cake for dessert. It is from an old *Southern Living*, so I guess I have to give them credit for this great recipe. It sure is delicious!

#### Zesty Lime Pound Cake

1 cup butter

½ cup vegetable shortening

3 cups sugar

6 large eggs

3 cups plain flour mixed with 1/8 tsp salt & ½ tsp baking powder

1 cup whole milk

1 teaspoon vanilla

½ cup lime juice

1 teaspoon grated lime zest

Grease and flour a 12-cup tube pan. Preheat oven to 325°. Tote that barge. Lift that bale. Ok, in a large bowl, cream the butter and shortening until fluffy. Gradually add sugar a little at a time (like ½ cup) and beat to blend. Add eggs, one at a time, beating just to combine. Don't overbeat, or the cake will get all puffy and not resemble a pound cake at all. Mix the dry ingredients together and add to butter/egg mixture alternately with the milk, ending with flour mixture. Again, don't over beat it or poofiness happens. Add vanilla, lime juice and zest by hand, and pour into prepared tube pan. Bake 75-80 minutes, until long skewer tests clean. Cool 10 minutes, and invert on wire rack to cool.

Make the glaze right now. I forgot to tell you. Mix 1 cup powdered sugar with 2 Tablespoons lime juice and ½ teaspoon vanilla. Brush over warm cake, letting it drip down the sides. Brush it on the sides as it melts down, and it will seal the cake and give it an overall tang. It keeps well and is wonderful with hot tea for St. Paddy's Day, or any spring celebration.
