

Atlanta's favorite, family, storytelling event will again cast its spell of family fun for the 30th year. Presented by ART Station at Georgia's Stone Mountain Park, "A Tour of Southern Ghosts" showcases the best ghost stories from the south.

For 11 nights this fall, some 15,000 visitors will be guided on a lantern-lit tour of yesteryear, vividly brought to life through the grand tradition of Southern storytelling. The tour features fun and spooky ghost stories from the Antebellum South - great fun for young, old, and of course, a perfect family outing. It's



for those who believe, those who don't, and for those who just want to have a good time. During the tour, participants will meet six professional storytellers as they spin tales of Southern ghosts along the lantern-lit paths of the South's most authentic and spookiest plantation.

The tour takes place at Stone Mountain Park's Antebellum Plantation, October 9 - 25. (October 9-11, 15-18, and 22-25) Thursdays & Sundays 7:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m., Fridays & Saturdays 7:00 p.m. - 9:30 p.m. First tour begins at 7:00 p.m. with additional tours every 10 minutes.

Tickets may be purchased nightly at the box office of the Antebellum Plantation, beginning at 6:45 p.m.

professional theatre company, visual arts galleries and an arts education program. More than 50,000 patrons participate in ART Stations programs yearly.

"Taste of Tucker" Promises to be Scrumptious

The sixth annual Taste of Tucker will be held Saturday, Oct. 24, on the community's Main Street, 1:00 p.m. – 6:00 p.m. While live bands provide a full afternoon of great music, some two dozen local restaurants will offer delicious food ranging from American barbecue to Latin and Asian cuisine.

Special attractions include a children's play area, a bazaar of local produce organized by the Tucker Farmers Market, and drink venues coordinated by Keller Williams Realty Atlanta Partners. Restaurant Equipment Services is the major sponsor coordinating food booths

The musical menu over the years has been particularly savory, offering bands that play classic rock, R&B and funk. This year, live music will feature a set by local favorite Moontower, a six-member band from Decatur that blends classic, Southern and experimental Rock'n'Roll with funk, disco and blues.

Sandra Robbins, general manager of Marlow's, whose shrimp and grits won the "Best Entrée" award in 2014, explained that "Taste of Tucker lets us reach more people from the neighborhoods we serve. And, we



love the bragging rights that came with winning last year." "Taste of Tucker is truly a community celebration, drawing people of all ages and backgrounds," said event coordinator Art Wood. "More than 4,000 people attended last year, and we expect that number to grow again this year." The growth of this festival can be measured in part by the par-

ticipation of local sponsors. This year Grecian Gyro will become the first restaurant to reach the Platinum Sponsor level, while Georgia United Credit Union will be the official Stage Sponsor.

Admission is free. Attendees purchase \$1.00 tickets to exchange for food samples, with most entrees costing between three

and seven tickets. Proceeds from the event benefit NETWorks Cooperative Ministry, Old Town Tucker Merchants Association and other local causes.

HALLOWEEN A GHOSTLY **NIGHT LIKE NO OTHER**

By the thin veil of the moonlight, spooky creatures and flying witches spread fright throughout the night. This night is also called All Hallow's Eve "a Christianized feast initially influenced by Celtic harvest festivals."

Halloween dates back about 2,000 years to a festival held around Nov.1 called Samhain (summer's end) in Gaelic. Samhain used to prepare the world for the coming winter. The ancient pagans believed that October 31 was a time of transference when the dead came back to life and caused havoc, such as illness and damage of crops. Bonfires were lit and sacrifices brought to appease the dark forces of the underworld. Mask and costumes were worn to mimic the evil spirits and to mollify them.

Historically speaking, Halloween has evolved in the United States since World War II. "Trick or Treat" was preceded by "Thanksgiving begging." Children would disguise themselves in costumes and go door-to-door asking for food or money. By the 1800s, pranks were common. Today, this practice has mostly vanished. The holiday is a day for fun and creative costuming as well as a time to celebrate communities and the spirit of giving.





"We purposely came up with a colorful, whimsical design to attract attention to our message, which is very important," says Library Director Alison Weissinger. "That message is that the library plays a crucial role in our diverse county by providing free access to information and assistance in developing literate, engaged citizens - citizens that 'Know-It-All.'"

Here are some of the facts the library wants DeKalb residents to know:

- The library circulated close to 1.5 million books, movies, music CDs and other materials during the first seven months of 2015.
- The library provides free access to the Internet at all of its 22 branches.
- With your library card, you can access more than 4,500 eBooks and more than 90 eMagazines for free, 24-hours-a-day.
- The library offers free computer classes, including classes aimed at helping job seekers find employment.
- The library conducted more than 2,700 free programs for children and adults during the first half of 2015 and more than 60,000 people attended them.

Smoke Rise Elementary & STEM

The Smoke Rise Elementary STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) program is embarking on a new journey! The school is still diligently working toward certification, but its STEM studies are going in a whole new direction. Students this year are going to study green engineering and sustainability.

What does this mean? Students are going to act as environmental engineers by studying environmental issues and developing creative, and innovative solutions to these problems. SRE has already started off the year by creating two robotics teams for the First Lego League Competition. The project challenge for these students is to identify a waste management problem in our community and then develop a solution to the problem. The other projects involve students designing energy efficient homes that use insulation materials that are safe for the environment. Students are also studying solar energy by making solar ovens and solar powered vehicles.

SRE can boast about having not one garden, but two! The first garden sits in the front of the school and is used to teach students about the pollination process. The second garden is in the school's courtyard. It is in the middle of a massive cleanup. Once it is finished, the school will have an awesome food garden with composting bins and rain barrels to use in irrigation. These projects are hallmark examples of sustainability.

Smoke Rise is grateful to its community partners that are supporting children in the educational process. Georgia Power, Sedexo, and The Steel Magnolias are just three of the eight partners that are providing outreach lessons and other resources to the school. The STEM coordinator at Smoke Rise is currently in negotiations to obtain a STEM partnership with the Gwinnett Environmental and Heritage Center. The Heritage Center provides students lessons in green architecture and engineering - just to name a few.

SRE is receiving excellent parental support. The parent of a 3rd grader is a computer engineer and has donated three miniature computers called Raspberry Pi. The students will be able to create computer games using a program called "Scratch." Even though SRE has increased support, it is still looking for community commitment. The school needs assistance with its recycling program and gardening project. In addition, please feel free to visit the school during the science fair and science exhibition held in November. SRE is seeking judges and an audience for the students to demonstrate their hard work.

Women of Empowerment Scholarship

More than a dozen years ago, the GFWC Stone Mountain Woman's Club determined there was a need for financial assistance for women who wanted to return to college to further their education. Some may have dropped out of college before completing an undergraduate degree, or others may have desired a graduate degree to help advance in a career. Adult Immunizations You Should Know About

October is the start of the "flu" season in the U.S. As many of you are going to your physician or a walk-in clinic to get your annual influenza shot, I thought I would remind you that there are several other immunizations that you, as an adult, should keep up with as well.

Most of us had the "usual" immunizations during childhood to prevent diseases like tetanus, diphtheria, whooping cough, measles, mumps, rubella and polio. If you did not get them, it is never too late to catch up... especially if you have to travel. Many countries still have active outbreaks of measles, mumps, rubella and whooping cough. So far in 2015, there have been 39 cases of wild virus polio worldwide... mainly in Pakistan and Afghanistan. The Council of Foreign Relations has an interactive map of vaccine preventable outbreaks, if you are interested in locating where the outbreaks are occurring. It is very important to have completed these vaccination series. If you have not done so, go to your doctor and start the "catch up" process now.

In addition to the vaccines many of us adults received during child-hood, several newer shots, which were not available then, are available now. They cover diseases like meningitis, chicken pox and hepatitis A and B. All children should receive these shots. Certain at-risk adults may need these shots as well. Check with your doctor.

So, what immunizations should you be keeping up with today?

- 1) Tetanus. It is important to continue to have a tetanus booster every 10 years. Tetanus is ubiquitous in the soil.... and there is no cure for this horrible disease. Fortunately, if you get a cut or puncture wound that may be contaminated by the soil, you have 72 hours to get to a clinic for the booster shot.
- 2) Pertussis, or "whooping cough." Unfortunately, there has been an outbreak of whooping cough in the United States for a little more than a decade, reaching a peak of 48,277 cases in 2012 (20 deaths). It is mainly a killer of infants and children. Adults should now get the Tdap (acellular pertussis vaccine combined with tetanus and diphtheria) as a one time dose during adulthood. You can then follow up with a regular Tetanus booster every 10 years. This will help protect all age groups!
- 3) Pneumococcal or pneumonia. There are two pneumonia shots: PCV13 and PPSV23. If you have not received either, starting at age 65, you should have the PCV13 shot first, followed in 8 weeks by the PPSV23. If you have already received the PPSV23 shot, wait a year to receive the PCV13 shot.
- 4) Shingles. The Shingles shot is a one-time shot to prevent Herpes Zoster, the same virus that causes Chicken Pox. It is recommended in all adults aged 60 and above. Shingles is a painful, blistering rash that follows a nerve root distribution... usually on your back or abdomen. It can also affect your face. The shot not only protects you from the disease but from post shingles pain syndrome. The protection from the vaccine lasts about five years. Currently, there is no recommendation for a booster.
- 5) Influenza. The flu shot is usually available in the US between mid-September and mid-March. Formulated yearly and based on the influenza viral strains present in the overseas outbreaks during their winter months, the shot takes two weeks to be fully effective. Because the vaccine is not 100% effective and relies on a "best guess" scenario during formulation, some mild cases of flu can occur even if you have been vaccinated.

In addition to these five vaccines: Influenza, Shingles, Pneumoccal Pneumonia shot, Whooping cough and Tetanus, certain subsets of people may need other vaccines. If you are immunocompromised, have Sickle Cell Disease, or in a high-risk exposure group, check with your doctor about what shots you need.


My final word to you: Catch up if you are behind. Stay current if you are fully vaccinated. Have a discussion with your doctor about adult vaccinations, if you have questions. Be informed by websites that are based on quality scientific studies such as www.cdc.gov or webmd.com!

Time to Think Heat


As the temperatures cool, I am reminded it won't be long until we are turning on the heat to warm our homes. This is a good time to care for the technology that keeps our homes comfortable through the winter. These tips will help keep your home's systems in good shape while saving you some money:

- 1. Change your HVAC system filters. They clean the air passing through them by collecting dust in their fibers. As dust collects, it is harder for air to pass through the filters. That makes it harder for the system to deliver heat to your home.
 - So it's a good idea to change them with the changing season as a reminder.
- 2. To see where your energy dollars are going, you can run a complete energy analysis of your home on the Georgia Power Website. If you are a customer, login with your account number and select "Bill



Analyzer" on the left menu bar, and the analysis will use your actual bills. If you are not a customer, select "Save Money & Energy" on the "My Home" tab then select "Energy Check-up." Both are surprisingly accurate, informative, and cover electric and gas costs and savings.

- 3. If you run this analysis for your home and have natural gas, you can see in the results how your fees change from month to month. Be aware that there are two components to your gas bills, a base charge from AGL, which agreed to be purchased by Southern Company, and a commodity charge to the gas retailer you have chosen for the therms of gas you use. The base charges are higher in the winter, when you are using more natural gas.
- 4. Choose your gas retailer and service plan carefully. If you use natural gas for heating and want to lock-in a gas rate for budget-predictably and possibly savings, October is the best month to do that. As you evaluate companies, look at the companies and the fine print in the offers.
 - a. Some companies that retail gas here in Georgia are in-state companies, some are out-of-state, some are investor-owned and work to return their shareholder investment, and others are not-for-profit cooperatives.
 - b. Some gas retailers show a low per-therm price to gain attention then obscure other fees in charges like a monthly service charge. You can see the price charts on the Public Service Commission Website that show Apples-to-Apples price per therm. And here is a chart that is helpful to see how some of the most popular retailers faired in providing low cost to consumers over the past few years. Also be aware, some marketers give low prices to attract new customers, causing customers to want to shop around each year. At least one I know of has Loyalty Pricing where long-term customers get the best pricing.

The Tucker 2015 referendum vote will be on the general election ballot November 3. This vote is a yes or no vote for the City of Tucker. The boundaries are drawn and include all of Smoke Rise.



There are three governing districts in the City of

Tucker charter. Smoke Rise will be District 1 and is the largest both in area and population. Elections for six council people – two from each of the three districts and a mayor will be elected in March 2016 in a non-partisan election. Each district will have a little more than 11,000 people.

Until the vote for the City of Tucker passes, there is no slate of candidates or even the opportunity to "put your hat in the ring." All cityhood actions and candidacy are dependent on the referendum for cityhood passing.

A successful referendum will initiate all cityhood activities. Candidates will be sought shortly after the first of the year with elections on March 1, 2016. The first office holders will be elected to staggered terms and there are term limits in place for all offices. Once elected, the office holders can start work for the city and meet when there is a quorum. The mayor will earn \$20,000 annually and the council people will each earn \$14,000.

The official date cityhood would take effect is July 1, 2016. At that point, Tucker will be responsible for providing Planning and Zoning, Code Enforcement and Parks and Recreation services. Any additional services to be added will be guided by citizen input in accordance with the state mandates. The cost and delivery of these services are currently through DeKalb County and paid for through DeKalb County taxes. Those payments to the county will cease and be fully through the city, so it is not an added tax. DeKalb County will continue to provide all other services. Tucker would grow into other services as demand and feasibility dictate.

There is not a tax increase expected with cityhood. Homeowners should enjoy localized government at no additional cost. Schools, police, fire, sanitation and water services will not change. Zip codes also do not change.

To be eligible to vote, you must be a registered voter by October 5, 2015. If you wish, you may take advantage of the convenience of early voting beginning October 12, 2015. Your vote is your voice. Please make sure that your voice is heard.

at least 30 days before an election to vote in that election). Once you are registered, it is permanent. However, it is necessary that you update your registration if you change your residence or your name. So, all of you registered voters, make sure to exercise your American right to vote on Tuesday November 3, 2015 – or participate in one of the early voting dates.

Voting is extremely important because, no matter who you are or where you live, elections will in some way affect you and the things you believe in. Things like...your job, your neighborhood, your stores, your taxes, your child's education, and your future. History has recorded numerous struggles of many who've fought to participate in this basic building block of democracy. So, make sure your vote counts!

This site is the only place you can get election information about your local representatives (such as DeKalb County's Board of Commissioners and our Board of Education Representatives).

DeKalbVotes.com also includes notices of precinct changes, an election calendar, answers to Frequently Asked Questions, and sample ballots for an upcoming election. Additionally, it posts an "Election Summary Report" on the votes (which provides a recap of the races) and a



"Statement of Vote" document (which provides precinct reports and more details about the percentage of voter turnout in relation to the number of registered voters, etc.).

So, all of you Americans out there, make sure to exercise your right to vote!

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
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
Mountain Mums September MeetingBy Carol Wales

Using store bought flowers, chicken wire, floral foam, tape, straight wire and scissors, Marty crafted three beautiful arrangements in containers she purchased from Home Goods. Some of Marty's helpful advice:



* Immediately place the flowers in a bucket of lukewarm water.

- * Prior to using, soak the floral foam in a bucket or sink, using something to weigh it down. Leave it to soak for 15 minutes after the last bubble appears.
- * Place your container on a Lazy Susan, so you can turn the arrangement easily while designing. It is helpful to work off a high table or counter to save your back. Tape chicken wire over your floral foam. This makes it easier to hold the stems of the flowers in place.



- * Think outside the box. Marty used artichokes and Elaeagnus (Russian Olive) branches in her arrangements, and the results were stunning!
- * Search the "Dutch Old Masters floral paintings" online for inspiration and then to quote Marty, "You don't have to be a pro to make arrangements that make you happy. Let your inner florist bloom." Marty can be reached at marhill411@gmail.com.

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HODGE PODGE

You are probably wondering what disaster I have made for this month's column. After last month's chocolate goo, I thought I might just give up cooking altogether, but Yellow Daisy came along, and I found myself back to baking up a storm. In year's past, I made a cake that some people really loved, and, because it was banana and peanut butter, I named it "Fat Elvis" cake. It was a breeze, because there was a great banana cake mix on the market that I could just embellish and create this marvel. Two years ago the mix disappeared and I felt doomed to never again make this particular cake — that is until I tried a semi homemade banana cake recipe and finally got back into business with this calorie bomb of a cake. I made an experimental one that was great, so I felt confident. Beware of overconfidence!

Somehow I managed to just zip through the first cake; threw it in the freezer and began the second. What could go wrong? Well, first I didn't quite let the cake cool. And then I used too much filling. While icing it, I realized that the top two layers were sliding away from the bottom layer, I panicked and threw it in the freezer in hopes that it would firm up. Well, it continued to slide and managed to slide over on top of a pound of frozen bacon. So I had peanut butter icing firming up on the bacon package and a lopsided cake. Thinking fast, I wrapped the whole shebang in plastic wrap and just molded it together like a cheese ball and threw it back in the freezer. It looked like a patent leather version of Donald Trump's hair. That was some ugly cake.

But when it got cool, even though it had handprints and smudges and gouges in it, it was lovely. If I hadn't been so impatient it would have been fine for the bake sale. The slices were gorgeous...so I'm sharing the recipe. Please don't be afraid. It will work. Just make sure the layers are very cool before you start putting it together. It's a wonderful flavor combination for fall and the entire cake, icing and all, will freeze beautifully.

Infamous Fat Elvis Cake

Make the cake in three layers using 8 inch round pans. Grease and line with waxed paper. Lightly grease again. Preheat oven to 350°.

1 box of yellow cake mix - one that uses oil

1 cup of mushed banana (about 2 medium)

½ cup brown sugar, lightly packed 1 cup water less two tablespoons

2 tablespoons crème de banana liqueur

½ cup vegetable oil, like Wesson

3 large eggs

Cake mix sizes are all over the place. Normally, the ones I use are 15.25 ounces. Ok...combine the bananas with brown sugar. Add water, liqueur, oil and eggs. Blend a bit, and then add the dry cake mix. Use a hand mixer to blend together, and then continue to beat for two minutes until well mixed. Divide equally among the three pans, and bake about 22 minutes at 350°. Cool one minute in pan, and invert on wire racks to get cool. Peel off waxed paper while cakes are still warm.

Ok...you'll need to have these ingredients handy so that you can fill and ice the cake:

2/3 cup chocolate frosting (canned is fine)

1 ½ medium bananas for slicing

1 cup peanut butter

1 stick room temperature butter

2 ½ cups powdered sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

3 tablespoons heavy cream

When cake layers are cool, place one on cake plate. Gently spread about 1/3 cup chocolate frosting on this layer...thin



layer...and leave the outer ½ inch edges of the cake plain so the chocolate doesn't ooze out when you frost it. On top of this thin layer of frosting, place thin slices of banana, not overlapping. No need to fill all the gaps, but make the slices pretty thin or they will weep. Place second layer on top and repeat with chocolate frosting and another layer of thin banana slices. Place third layer on top and just stare at it. It should be plain. Take your impeccably clean hand and gently press layers to make sure they are going to stay there and not migrate. Glare at it to show it who's boss and make frosting. You can put cake in the fridge, if you want to and it will firm it up, making frosting it easier. Or not.

Mix peanut butter and butter with mixer until blended. Add vanilla, powdered sugar and half the cream. Beat it and add remaining cream until it's fluffy and gorgeous. Add more cream if you need it. Frost sides and top of cake thickly with peanut butter frosting and garnish this monument to yumminess with slices of dried banana and peanuts – or chocolate curls. You can freeze it right now, iced and all. Let it sit in the fridge a bit, so it gets settled down. I need to settle down, huh? Time for cake!
