


Domestic Violence Program Overview

What is Domestic Violence/ Intimate Partner Violence?

A pattern of coercive behaviors designed to establish power and control over an intimate partner or family member through fear and intimidation.



What is Domestic Violence/ Intimate Partner Violence?

Relationships are defined in a broader context under the Illinois Domestic Violence Act

- Two people who are currently dating or have dated in the past
- Two people who are engaged/married or have been in the past
- Two people who have or allegedly having a child in common (even if they are not intimate partners)

- Two people who share a home or other common dwelling (roommates)
- A persons with a disability or a person who is elderly and their personal assistants/caregivers

Goals:

1. **Direct Services:** Empower survivors, assist them in regaining control of their lives and ultimately move toward healing

2. **Outreach:** Collaborate with community partners to increase prevention, awareness, and access to services for survivors of domestic violence in the community





1. Direct Services

Domestic Violence Counseling

- One on one counseling
 - Psychoeducation on dynamics of DV
 - Safety Planning
- Mental health services (therapy)

Case Management and Advocacy

 Referral and linkages to Catholic Charities and external programs including Legal, Food, Health Care, Shelters, and Housing

Crisis Support

- Advocacy and support identifying shelter
- Consultation
- Safety planning
- Transportation to safety

- Anyone 14yrs+ who has or is experiencing DV
 - *Victim Services
- Services in Spanish and English
- Free of charge services

2. Outreach/Trainings

We provide free trainings to community partners, including:

- Social Service Organizations
- Child Welfare Organizations
- Community Groups
- Parishes

Training Topics Include:

- DV 101:Definition and Dynamic of DV
 - Review types of abuse, power & control, cycle of violence
 - How to screen patients utilizing Futures Without Violence's CUES method
- DV 202: How to best support survivors
 - Safety planning, types of interventions, resources in the community
- Healthy relationships workshops

- Virtual or in person

Intake professionals can provide safety planning and resources and other domestic violence referrals if needed.

How to get connected

1. Call Program intake number: **(312) 655-7106** 8:30 am – 4:30 pm Monday-Friday

2. Client will complete intake with worker. *Intake professionals are trained to help support any callers who are in crisis (Safety plans, Assistance identifying and getting to shelter)

3. A clinician will contact client within a few days to start supportive services and case plan

 - Can call this number to find out if there is shelter space for a client
 - Hotline staff does a bed count for all DV shelters in Illinois twice a day around 8 am and 4 pm
 - After calling the hotline will give you/client the number to a shelter that has space so the client can call and do an intake
