WRAPPING UP ANOTHER YEAR

The REACTA Annual Reunion and Business Meeting was a great event, and I loved feeling the energy from our members. In addition to welcoming new REACTA members, first-time attendees and committee members, we learned that Ernie Ciarrocchi and Frank Burress came all the way from Texas and Wisconsin. Frank Burress and Karen Alexander even came by train! Your REACTA Exec Board along with committee chairs and liaisons put on another great meeting in Paso Robles.

CTA's new Executive Director, **Jeff Good**, was able to break away from the CTA Board Meeting to zoom in and share CTA's ongoing work and initiatives. We also heard from trustees, **Tom Kaiser**, **Wei Pan**, **Kenya Spearman and Jake Anderson** from both the Health and Welfare Benefits Trust and Pension Trust. Thanks to the trustees for the Pension Trust and their wise investments, the plan has exceeded its projected return of 7%; and, barring a major dip in the markets, should remain Green for the coming few years. With regards to the Health and Welfare Benefits Trust, all the trustees shared that Zenith's services have not been acceptable, as shown by their poor evaluation, and they are holding Zenith accountable to improve their services on a fast track. We also heard from CAS representative, **Sara Morell**, who gave an update on issues facing CAS.

Arleigh Kidd gave a powerful presentation about Project 2025 and the Heritage Foundation. He reviewed how Project 2025 would shift the tax burden from the wealthy onto the middle class, its plans to cut Social Security by raising the retirement age for roughly 74% of Americans, from 67 to 69, phase out the Title 1 funding program over the next 10 years, convert the \$13 billion IDEA program to block grants and eliminate the Department of Education. Project 2025 also guts reproductive freedom, eradicates climate change references from absolutely everywhere, and rolls back protections for labor unions and LGBTQ+ programs. I urge you to read Arleigh's PowerPoint presentation that is posted on REACTA's Website and Facebook Page.

At our Business Meeting, we heard reports from the Treasurer, Membership Committee, Political Education Committee (CTA's recommendations on ballot measures), and watched a video from one of our scholarship recipients. We also elected new REACTA officers for 2025-2026. In addition to a second term for myself as President, Merri Furler as Vice President, and Shirley Horn as Secretary, Dick Gale was elected Treasurer and Susan Midori Jones as At Large Director. I want to thank our outgoing officers, Treasurer, Felice Strauss, and At Large Director, Joe Colton, for all they have done to make REACTA successful and an organization that we can be proud of. Your new Executive Board looks forward to working with you and addressing the challenges that may affect retirees in the future. "Without REACTA we would be on our own." Zenith American Solutions representatives **Rob Palinsky,** Director Client Services, and **Lauren Tham,** Manager, Client Services, attended a session in person. Both **Rob** and **Lauren** were forthright and honest about retiree issues since Zenith came on board a year ago. They were in receipt of the recent letter REACTA sent to Zenith and the Trustees, addressed each of those issues and how they were going to improve their delivery of services going forward.

REACTA gave Zenith credit for coming to the annual meeting addressing the mountain of issues from their first year as the Benefit Administrator for the Health Trust. They took responsibility for the problems and announced remedies being implemented

- Representatives are receiving specific training on the CTA plan.
- Zenith has hired a new Vice President to supervise Claims and Customer Care to work directly with CTA's plan.

Zenith announced that Ameritas is a second dental option this year. This should assist dealing with dental offices that do not accept Delta Dental.

It is important to contact Zenith with any life changes such as moving, death, marriage, divorce that affect participants. Waiting until you need to use your insurance may delay processing on your claims.

Zenith is interested in participating in our Zoom meetings to address issues. More information will be provided later this year.

CHOCOLATE CHIP OATMEAL COOKIES Hands-on time: 20 mins. to 30 mins. Baking time: 12 mins. to 15 mins. Total time: 32 mins. to 45 mins.

Ingredients:

1 cup (16 tbsp) unsalted butter, at room temperature

2 cups King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour 1 cup light brown sugar

1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 tablespoon vanilla extract

1 large egg, at room temperature 1 large egg yolk

1 tablespoon vanilla extract 1 teaspoon baking powder

1 cup quick-cooking or old-fashioned oats 1 teaspoon baking soda

3/4 teaspoon salt 3 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips

Beat the butter and sugars, then beat in the egg, egg yolk, and vanilla. Add the remaining ingredients (except the chips), mixing until thoroughly incorporated and scraping the bottom and sides of the bowl. Stir in the chips. Scoop 1 1/2" balls of dough onto lightly greased or parchment-lined baking sheets, leaving about 2" between them.

Bake the cookies in a preheated 325°F oven until they're light golden brown with darker edges, 12 to 15 minutes. Remove them from the oven, and when they're firm enough to handle, transfer them to a rack to cool. Yield: about fifty 2 3/4 to 3 inch cookies. Adapted from Best Bake Sale Cookbook. 

RETIREMENT TRUST REPORT

REACTA ANNUAL MEETING

The California Teachers Association Retirement Trust held its most recent meeting on September 26. This was the third of four meetings held each calendar year.


The Trust is a joint Employer/Employee entity designed to oversee the operation and investments of the Pension Trust and establish rules for eligibility and disbursement of retirement funding covering all current and former employees of the CTA.

At the meeting there was the usual reporting from the three committees that oversee Operations, Investments, and Benefits.



This was augmented in the full meeting of the trustees by the various professionals who lend guidance to trustees and handle the day-to-day operations of the Trust. Our professional group consists of the plan manager, Benesys; Legal Counsel, Hanson Bridget; Investments, RV Kuhn; Actuary Horizon; and the Auditor, Withum, Smith and Brown.

Currently the Trust has investments that total over \$4,000,000,000 which is a little over a 9% return year to date based on August 31 figures. So far this year the plan has exceeded its projected return of 7%.



Based on current and future probabilities the Actuary has determined that the Plan was in the Green Zone for the current year and, barring a major dip in the Markets, should remain Green for the coming few years. Green Zone is defined as having sufficient assets to cover 80% funding. Additional zoning consists of the Yellow Zone which means the plan is endangered and the Red Zone indicting a plan in critical condition.

Based on numbers from Benesys, the Plan Administrator, there are 471 active employees, and 60 inactive employees currently covered by CTA. The number of retirees receiving benefits total 792.

As always, it is important to note that, as with all Pension Plans there are many factors that contribute to the health of the program. Market fluctuations, the economy, and host of other conditions can impact the Plan.

Zone certification is based on the Trust holdings on December 31, 2024 but absent a significant drop in assets in the last quarter, I believe it is safe to say that our plan is in good shape. Please contact me if you have any questions.



CTA HEALTH & WELFARE BENEFITS TRUST

The Trust held a virtual meeting on October 2, 2024.

The Trust Investment Consultant reported on the strong fiscal year-end performance in 2024 of a 12.4% return. Asset balance as of September 30 is \$13.4 million. All investment allocations are in line with their targets and there are no immediate concerns at the present time. There were no actions from the Budget and Investment Committee.

Reported by the Trust Consultant, as of July 31, there are 6.4 months of reserves to pay claims if all income stopped, down from 7.5 months in May. There were some delays from Express Scripts to pay rebates of around \$1 million, but those are expected later in October. The current drivers for extra costs are the high cost individual Medical and Prescription claims, which are those over \$25,000. In the 11 months of Sept. 2023 to July, 2024, the total costs were \$5.3 million for Medical and \$5.3 million for Prescriptions. Any individual claims over \$250,000 are covered by Stop-loss insurance and the Trust is reimbursed for the overage.

The Trust has approved Ameritas as an additional dental coverage. The coverage is the same as Delta, and Information will be included in the open enrollment materials expected to be mailed mid-October. In addition, participants will be receiving the Summary of Benefits and Coverage (SBC) effective 01/01/2025. There are no Plan changes, but there is a change to the 2025 Medicare Part D out-of-pocket maximum of \$2000, down from \$8000 in 2024.

The Trust approved an audit of the Plan to provide a Non-Quantitative Treatment Limitation Analysis to make sure Anthem is treating Mental Health services the same and Medical services, as required by the Dept. of Labor through the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act.

Zenith American Solutions, the Third-Party Administrator, reported that they would be resolving on-going issues in the next 3 months. Open Enrollment and Life Insurance billing should see improvement right away. They also have been updating their computer and phone systems for each of their clients and the CTA Trust is next in line. The goal is that this will streamline the response and solving of questions and concerns.

The Communications Committee is hoping to have a newsletter out this Fall and is still working on a Medicare informational document.



IN THE ROOM WHERE IT HAPPENED

Staff hired after the year 2000 probably knew **Art McLoughlin** as the golf cart driver in charge of logistics at the UCLA Summer Institute. Well, those of you who had the opportunity to know him back in New York, or Overseas in Frankfurt, Germany, or at the Salinas CTA office know that he wore many important and different hats.

After teaching for 7.5 years, **Art** became a New York State Staffer and quickly became a prime organizer of the National Educational Professional Staff Organization, the forerunner of the National Staff Organization.

In the early '70s **Art** got the shoulder tap to work in Frankfurt, Germany as the Executive Director of the Overseas Education Association. Reorganization brought him back to Washington D.C. until California teachers secured collective bargaining rights. He moved to Monterey and worked in the Salinas office for 25 years.

His union work did not interfere with his personal life. He met his wife, **Marilyn**, at a union meeting in Syracuse. She was President of the Student Association of New York State. Dancing and birthday flowers convinced her that Art was the one.

When their daughters became Girl Scouts **Art and Marilyn** became active volunteers. Art is still active today.



Joining REACTA was a natural decision for **Art**. "It was the thing to do," said Art. "The camaraderie and information is essential." He served as the REACTA Social Chair and Treasurer for several years.

When asked to compare REACTA then and now, **Art** said, "I see 3 phases. First phase was an Informational social organization. Second phase was activism. And now the third phase is organizational maturity."

This year **Art** took a river cruise down the Rhine. Excessive rain and river rising forced the cruise down the Danube into a bus alternative.
