

AND THE BEAT GOES ON....

The REACTA Executive Board met with the new CTA Executive Director, **Jeff Good**, at our Zoom Board Meeting in May. **Jeff** was able to spend time with us sharing his background and his vision for CTA. Although he has been on the job for only two months, he has hit the ground running. For those of you who have worked with **Jeff**, this should not come as a surprise. Following former Executive Directors, he believes in building power at the local chapter level while building high level membership campaigns to bring about change. First and foremost, CTA is addressing the current budget crisis in the State. There also is a potential proposition, Taxpayer Protection and Governmental Accountability Act, targeted for the November ballot and sponsored by the Business Round Table. Such an initiative would have major negative implications for education funding and will require a full-blown campaign. We shared that REACTA has years of experience and an interest in working with CTA on this and other measures that could have an impact for CTA funding and retiree issues.

REACTA has also continued to field issues with Zenith American Solutions. We cannot represent retirees directly with Zenith; however, we can be a squeaky wheel. It is therefore important that we continue to have a positive working relationship with the Trusts and CTA. Most recently we have been addressing the rollout of the quarterly Medicare Part B reimbursement. Many of you were notified that you had not submitted the one-time Affidavit. and/or a copy of your red, white, and blue Medicare card, when, in fact, some of you repeatedly submitted the documentation. We are hopeful that this has been rectified. REACTA will receive a new list from Zenith at the end of May specifying who has not yet submitted the documentation. Please note that although reimbursement will be retroactive to January 1, 2024, future monthly benefit reimbursements, paid quarterly, will be delayed until such time that the Affidavit and accompanying documentation has been submitted.

For those retirees who continued self-paying life insurance when you retired, it is my understanding that in this next billing invoice, Zenith will be standardizing the quarterly billing cycle. Life insurance premiums have been billed quarterly; however, it has been based on the date of retirement rather than a calendar year cycle. There will be a notation explaining this adjustment in the next billing statement. Billing statements should then be standardized for February, May, August, and November of every year. RETIREMENT TRUST REPORT

The Retirement Trust met in Burlingame on March 26. This meeting is generally where the Trustees hear from the Actuary and Administrators about the performance of the prior year and the Zone status of the trust for the coming year.

As with most retirement plans the Trust is reliant on the performance data of December 31 for all reports to the federal government as to the health of the plan. Overall, the investments of the Trust accounts settled at a positive 10.47% for the year 2023. This is almost three and a half percent over the plans anticipated return of 7%. Based on this return, the Plan will once again be certified in the GREEN ZONE for last year and the coming years assuming our rates of return are not adversely affected by market conditions. The long-term prognosis of the Plan is green for many years in the future.

Along with the reports from the Actuary, the normal business of the Trust included hearing reports from Investment Advisors, Auditors, Trust Attorneys, and the Administrator of the plan.

I believe based on the reports and future calculations REACTA members do not have to be concerned regarding the viability of the CTA Retirement Trust.

Another topic that came up after the meeting was the scheduling of a new preretirement workshop on May 14th for active employees who are considering retirement within the next couple of years.

CTA HEALTH & WELFARE BENEFITS TRUST

The most recent trust meeting was held April 11, 2024, via Zoom.

The Investment Consultant reported on the Asset Allocation Review. The goal is to have constructive conversations about spending expectations in the future, the potential need or capital preservation, and to optimize target allocations. He also provided Asset Manager profiles and the Investment Policy Review.

The Trust Consultant presented the Preliminary Renewal Projections for the benefits vendors (not Trust professionals, such as Zenith). The final approval for renewals will be voted on at the next meeting.

As of the 12-month reporting period ending 1/31/2024, the Trust had \$18.3M is assets which would cover 7.5 months of projected claims and expenses if all sources of income were eliminated.

Several Trust committees have met with the Zenith representatives to address ongoing issues. At those meetings, Zenith representatives felt that they have made progress by holding internal meetings 2-3 times per week, having more people trained and assigned to Customer Care, and more resources allocated to the Trust account, with a focus on enrollment and eligibility.

The next H&W Benefits Trust meeting will be held at CTA headquarters on June 14, 2024.

The so-called "Taxpayer Protection and Governmental Accountability Act" proposition...

could devastate schools, public safety and the government in California if passed in November. The deceptive proposition was placed on the ballot by the California Business Roundtable. State and local officials have raised alarm at how those provisions could affect

government's ability to raise taxes to provide services, particularly during crises such as natural disasters, economic downturns, or a pandemic.

The proposition would re-label most government fees as taxes and would require a 2/3rds vote to raise taxes and would nullify all fees and taxes raised after 2022. The measure would also impact local school parcel taxes. Currently, if a school board places a parcel tax on the ballot it must pass at 2/3rds vote. But if a community group places a parcel tax on the ballot it only needs 50% to pass, this would change to 2/3rds.

The proposition is so broad and vague that it could create unintended consequences for a broad range of services including trash collection and other vital services. The state has argued that this proposition is a revision to the State Constitution and not an amendment. A proposition can amend but cannot revise. Only the state legislator can make Constitutional revisions. Because of this, the California Supreme Court recently heard arguments and will rule by early June on whether to remove this harmful proposition. Make no mistake, if this proposition does make the ballot, and passes, it will present an existential threat to the California Teachers Association and therefore a direct threat to REACTA members. Once we know if it makes the ballot, we can develop a plan for REACTA to respond to this ill-conceived proposition.

TREASURER'S REPORT

All our committee members and liaisons have been hard at work, mostly by zoom and conference calls. This has saved REACTA a lot of expenses and enables us to survive on \$5.00 or less per month dues from all our members. Our current expenses have been about \$1200, mainly on supplies and travel to a trust meeting. We have collected over \$9300 in income. Our total revenue in our operating, scholarship and emergency funds equals almost \$72,500.

The less than 50 members who still pay dues by check have all paid their 2024 dues. This is less than half the number we had 6 years ago. We are also at an all-time high in membership of 432 members. We will easily make our membership dues projection for our budget. Keep encouraging those that haven't joined to consider membership.

Our largest expense is our Annual Meeting. I have signed the contract for our meeting in Paso Robles on October 8-10. We are hoping to fill the room to capacity at 95 people this year. The information is now available, and we encourage people to sign up early. Rooms must be reserved by September 7 to get our negotiated rate. The rooms are held with a credit card and reservations can be cancelled up to 3:00 on October 7th without a penalty.

We had already filed our Form 5500, Schedule C with BeneSys and have now submitted our IRS form 990-N e-Postcard prior to the May 15, 2024, IRS deadline.

The Fiscal Oversight Committee will be meeting soon to review last year's fiscal information and decide if any new policies are to be recommended to the Board.
