Jacob Blesses Ephraim and Manasseh

Scripture: Genesis 48:8-20
Jacob intentionally blesses Joseph's younger son, Ephraim, over Manasseh, showing God's sovereignty in choosing whom He favors (48:19-20).

Jacob's Prophecies for His Sons

Scripture: Genesis 49
Jacob's final words to his 12 sons include messianic hints (e.g., Judah's scepter, 49:10) and foreshadow Israel's tribal destinies.

Joseph Reassures His Brothers & His Death

Scripture: Genesis 50:15-26
After Jacob's death, Joseph forgives his brothers, declaring: "You meant evil against me, but God meant it for good" (50:20)—a cornerstone of trusting God's providence. Joseph dies in Egypt but makes Israel swear to carry his bones back to Canaan, foreshadowing the Exodus (Exodus 13:19).

Israel Oppressed in Egypt

Scripture: Exodus 1:8-14
A new Pharaoh enslaves Israel, but God multiplies them, fulfilling His promise to Abraham (1:7).

Moses' Birth and Calling

Scripture: Exodus 2-4
Moses is saved by Pharaoh's daughter (2:10) and later called by God at the burning bush (3:1-10). Key Scripture: "I AM WHO I AM" (3:14)—God's eternal name and covenant faithfulness.

The Plagues

Scripture: Exodus 7-12
God confronts Pharaoh's pride and Egypt's gods through plagues, culminating in the Passover (12:1-13). Key Scripture: "The blood will be a sign for you... and when I see the blood, I will pass over you" (12:13)—a foreshadowing of Christ's sacrifice.

The Exodus & Red Sea Crossing

Scripture: Exodus 12–14
God delivers Israel from slavery, parting the Red Sea (14:21–22).
Key Scripture: “The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still” (14:14).

Manna, Water, and Victory

Scripture: Exodus 16–17
God provides manna (16:4), water from a rock (17:6), and victory over Amalek (17:8–16). **Key Lesson:** Dependence on God in trials (e.g., “Is the Lord among us or not?” 17:7)

Jethro’s Wisdom

Scripture: Exodus 18:13–26
Moses’ father-in-law advises him to delegate leadership, modeling humility and wise stewardship.

Faith in the Face of Oppression

Why do you think Shiphrah and Puah chose to fear God rather than obey Pharaoh? What does this teach us about courage, integrity, and trusting God's sovereignty in unjust systems? How can we apply this today?

Moses' Reluctance and God's Sufficiency

Moses questioned his ability and worthiness to lead. How does God respond to his doubts? What does this reveal about God's character and His call on our lives? How do you relate to Moses' hesitation in your walk with God?

The Passover Lamb and Redemption

The Passover lamb's blood saved Israel from death. How does this foreshadow Christ's sacrifice? What does it mean for believers today to "apply the blood" of Jesus to their lives?

Trusting God in Impossible Circumstances

Moses tells the people, "The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." When have you faced a "Red Sea moment" where you had to trust God's deliverance over your own strength? How can we cultivate this kind of faith?

God's Provision in the Wilderness

God provided manna daily to teach Israel dependence on Him. What does this reveal about His faithfulness? How can we practice daily reliance on God in a world that prioritizes self-sufficiency?

The Purpose of Suffering

Why do you think God allowed Israel to endure centuries of slavery before delivering them? How does this narrative shape your understanding of suffering, timing, and God's long-term purposes?
