

pay bills with it. I stand in awe of those who work a 9-5 and still find time to write. Especially if their 9-5 also involves using words. When I worked as a teacher, a grant writer, a communications director, and many other positions that involved writing, I got next to no novel-writing done. Throughout those years, by the time I got off work I felt like I'd used up all my words for the day. So I recognize what a tremendous privilege it is for me to be able to structure my life in a way that allows me to study and practice the new skills of novel-writing. It's a privilege I hope I never take for granted.
