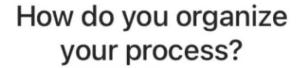
Well, where's my phone?

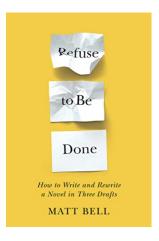
In order to write the book you want to write, in the end you have to become the person you need to become to write that book.

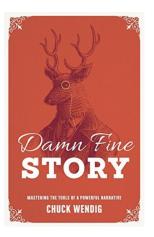

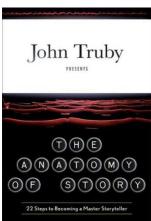

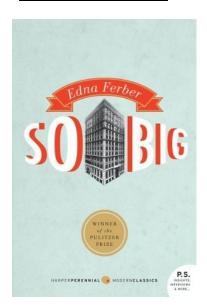
### For any other aspiring authors out there...

Last year I read around 30 books on the craft of writing, ranging from the somewhat formulaic *How To Write a Novel Using the Snowflake Method* and *Save The Cat! Writes a Novel* to the more literary *Consider This* by Chuck Palahniuk and John Gardner's *The Art of Fiction*. By far the best of the bunch, which I highly recommend to anyone interested in novel writing, are Matt Bell's *Refuse To Be Done*, ChuckWendig's *Damn Fine Story*, and John Truby's *The Anatomy Of Story*. These three have helped me immensely!

So Big is an older book I'm really enjoying. It won the Pulitzer back in 1925, when it was also a bestseller, and it takes place in and around Chicago. The author, Edna Ferber, is more well known for her novels that became movies (Cimarron) and musicals (Showboat).
