

GENERAL MEETING AND ELECTIONS SUNDAY JANUARY 10, 2021 MEETING AT 2 PM

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, this past year has been unprecedented in terms of the toll it has taken on families, businesses, jobs, social life and more. Thanks to the hard work and diligence of our officers and trustees, as well as the DC staff and volunteers, the Deutscher Club has endured and continues as refuge and our home away from home.

Detailed voting and ballot submission instructions for our final list of candidates for office in 2021 were published in our December Newsletter. As stated, the current officers and two trustees are running unopposed.

In order to minimize the risks of Covid-19 exposure to our Deutscher Club members, the Nominating Committee sent paper ballot forms and instructions to all members who receive their Newsletters by regular mail and e-mailed ballots and instructions to members who receive their Newsletters by e-mail.

Members have three (3) options to vote:

Mail-in Voting*: Ballots must be received by end of business on Saturday, January 9, 2021

Contactless/Drop-off Voting*: Ballots can be deposited in a drop box in the Club's foyer between 12:00 and 5:00 PM on Sunday, January 10, 2021. Ballots must be sealed in an envelope accompanied by your current/valid Membership Card.

In-person Voting: Members can vote in person after the Annual General Meeting which begins at 2:00 PM, Sunday, January 10, 2021. Voting will end at 5:00 PM. (be sure to have your current/valid membership card and ballot with you)

(*Current/Valid Membership card must be included when mailing or dropping off your ballot)

Since all members will be receiving ballots in advance by either e-mail or regular mail, there is no need to request an absentee ballot this year.

FOR YOUR SAFETY

With the reopening comes some restrictions and procedures. They are as follows:



Food and beverage establishments must:

- Limit the number of patrons in indoor areas to 25 percent of the food or beverage establishment's indoor capacity, excluding the food or beverage establishment's employees;
- Limit seating to a maximum of eight (8) customers per table (unless they are from a family from the same household) and arrange seating to achieve a minimum distance of six feet (6 ft) between parties;
- Require customers to only consume food or beverages while seated;
- Require patrons to wear face coverings while inside the indoor premises of the food or beverage establishment, except when eating or drinking at their table;
- For food or beverage establishments with table service, require that customers be seated in order to place orders;
- For food or beverage establishments with table service, require that wait staff bring food or beverages to seated customers
- Keep doors and windows open where possible and utilize fans to improve ventilation.
- Members sign in when entering the dining/ bar area in order for tracking if necessary.
 At this time there will be no seating at the bar.
 When there is no waitress on duty you may

REISEZIEL BERLIN

empelhof, Tegel, Schönefeld, BER. Sind Ihnen diese Namen bekannt? Für Leute, die öfters nach Deutschland fliegen, sind bestimmt Tempelhof, Tegel und auch Schönefeld vertraute Namen der Berliner Flughäfen. Aber erst seit dem 30. Oktober 2020 ist BER das Kennzeichen des fertig gewordenen Flughafen Berlins. Sein offizieller Name lautet Berlin Brandenburg Flughafen Willy Brandt (ehemaliger West Berlin Bürgermeister) und liegt in Schönefeld, wo er ursprünglich 2012 eröffnet werden sollte. Aber sein Entwicklungsgang geht viel weiter zurück, denn der Bau war von vielerlei Prozessen, technischen Problemen, Feuersicherheitseinrichtungen, Streiks und Demonstrationen usw. Heimgesucht. Die Baukosten beliefen sich auf insgesamt

6,5 Milliarden; eine große Einweihungsfeier wurde nicht geplant. Obwohl der Bau des Flughafens viele Endtermine verpasst hat, steht er jetzt bereit für die kommenden Reisegäste auch mit der Bundesbahn, die Züge, S-Bahnen und Regionalbahnen unter dem Flughafen anbietet. Leider hat der umlaufende Virus den Fortschritt der Reise Quote, auch in Berlin, sehr behindert. Das große, offene Gelände Berlins hat eine interessante Geschichte, die mit der Jungfernheide, dem Jagdgebiet der Preußischen Königen beginnt. 1713 baute Kaiser Friedrich Wilhelm den Lust- und-

Gemüsegarten seiner Frau in ein Parade Feld für die Preußischen Truppen um. Das Gelände diente später (1914) als Luftschiffhafen zur Ausbildung der "Feldluftschiffer Truppen". Nach dem Ende des 1. Weltkriegs durfte das Deutsche Reich (Versailler Vertrag) keine Luftstreitkräfte haben und so stellte Tegel den Bau der Luftschiffe ein. 1930 eröffnete Rudolf Nebel den Raketenschießplatz, wo später Wernher von Braun mit Raketen beteiligt war. 1934 begannen die Nationalsozialisten Pläne für einen Großflughafen im Tempelhof Gelände. Aber der Platz wurde für Massenversammlungen, zuerst gegen, später aber für Hitler, mit bis zu einer Million Menschen gebraucht. Während des 2. Weltkriegs diente das Feld als Truppenübungsplatz für die Luftwaffe. Nach dem Krieg füllten Bombenkrater und Munitionsreste das Feld, doch während der sowjetischen Blockade West Berlins, benutzten die Alliierten den, von den Nazis gebauten Platz, als Landung Piste für die Luftbrücke. (Das wäre nicht möglich gewesen, hätte Kaiser Wilhelm sein Regiment der Langen Kerlen nicht inmitten der Stadt zur Schau vorgeführt.) Ein Jahr lang versorgten die Besatzungstruppen, während der Sowjet Blockade, ganz West Berlin mit allen Notwendigkeiten. Die existierenden Flughäfen Berlins konnten den wachsenden Nachkriegs Verkehr nicht mehr bewältigen. Mehr Platz wurde benötigt und die westlichen Besatzungsmächte errichteten in 90 Tagen einen neuen Flugplatz, Tegel, zuerst zur Unterstützung der Berliner Luftbrücke und dann als Hauptflughafen Berlins. Erst im August 2020 begann der Abbau der drei völlig überlasteten Flughäfen: Tegel (schloss nach 72 Jahren), Tempelhof und der ehemalige Schönefeld. Das Markenzeichen des neuen Tegels war das Hexagon, wo die Gates um ein Sechseck angeordnet, Tegel den modernsten Flughafen der Welt machten. empelhof, Tegel, Schönefeld, BER. Do you know these names? For people who often fly to Germany, Tempelhof, Tegel and Schönefeld are familiar names of Berlin airports. But it is only since October 30, 2020 that BER has become the new name of Berlin's completed airport. Its official name is Berlin Brandenburg Airport Willy Brandt (former West Berlin mayor) and is located in Schönefeld, where it was originally scheduled to open in 2012. Even though the construction missed many deadlines, the airport is now ready for the new travel plans. But its development goes much further back, because its construction has been plagued by many processes, technical problems, especially fire safety facilities, strikes and demonstrations, etc.

The construction costs reached in total 6.5

billion euros; a big dedication celebration was not planned. Although the construction of the airport missed many deadlines, it is now ready for future travelers also arriving by Federal Rail, rapid transit or Regional Trains under this airport. Unfortunately, the spreading virus has greatly hindered the progress of the travel quota in Berlin as well. The large, open area of Berlin has an interesting history, which begins with the Jungfernheide, the hunting ground of the Prussian kings. In 1713, Emperor Friedrich Wilhelm I converted his wife's pleasure and

vegetable garden into a parade field for the Prussian troops. The site later served as an airship port for the training of "field airship troops". After the end of the First World War, the German Reich (Treaty of Versailles) was not allowed to have an air force, and so Tegel stopped building the airships. In 1930 Rudolf Nebel opened the rocket firing range, where Wernher von Braun was later involved with rockets. In 1934, the Nazis began plans for a major airport in the Tempelhof site. But the field was used for mass gatherings, first against, but later for Hitler with up to a million people. During World War II, the field served as a military training ground for the Luftwaffe (air force). After the war, bomb craters and ammunition remnants filled the field, but during the Soviet blockade of West Berlin, the Allies used the space, built by the Nazis, as a landing runway for the airlift. (That would not have been possible if Emperor Wilhelm had not shown off his regiment of Long Fellows in the middle of the city!) For a year, during the Soviet blockade, the occupying forces, provided the entire West Berlin population with all the necessities. Soon the existing airports in Berlin became unable to cope with the growing postwar traffic. More space was needed, and the Western Allies built a new airfield, Tegel, in 90 days, first to support the Berlin Airlift and then as Berlin's main airport. Then in August 2020 the dismantling of the three totally overloaded existing airports started: Tegel (closed after 72 years), Tempelhof and the former Schönefeld. Tegel's trademark was the hexagon, where the gates were arranged around a hexagon, which made Tegel the most modern airport in the world. Soon, that airport also burst at the seams with nearly 24 million passengers. After the fall of the Berlin Wall (1989), Berlin was again the capital of Germany and now needed a major airport, which unfortunately took fourteen years to complete, today's BER. On your next trip to Berlin, think of the history of the airport with amazement and wonderment!!!




Friedrich Froebel – Kindergarten

Triedrich Froebel was born in 1782 in Oberweissbach, Thuringia. His mother died when he was one year old, and he was raised in harsh conditions by his father and stepmother. As a young boy, he spent most of his time in the gardens exploring the outdoors. This early connection to the outside led to a lifelong love of nature. At school, Froebel studied plants, mathematics, and languages. He apprenticed as a forester, tried different jobs, and finally took a longterm teaching appointment at a progressive model school in Frankfurt. Frobel found his life work. Realizing the need for more education, he entered the University of Gottingen,



but was interrupted by military service in the Napoleonic Wars. During the war, he met H. Langenthal and W. Middendorff, who shared his educational beliefs, and committed to starting a school in Griesheim, and later Keilhau. The schools flourished. In 1826, Froebel wrote and published Menschenerziehung (The Education of Man), a detailed account of principles and methods used at his school. He was soon invited to Switzerland to train elementary teachers, and to head a new orphan asylum at Burgdorf. Upon his return to Keilhau, Froebel opened an infant school which he named Kindergarten, or "Garden of Children". He also started a publishing firm for educational materials, including a nursery songbook which was translated into many languages. Following Frobel's death in 1852, the kindergarten movement of childhood play, music, games, stories, crafts, and nature directed at improving physical and motor skills, spread throughout Europe and the United States. Frobel's Kindergarten became the standard education for children from four to six years of age and remains one of the most important educational experiences in everyone's life.
