

One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA) Key Changes for Business

The following is taking from Yeo & Yeo CPAs & Advisors' Blog President Trump Signs One Big Beautiful Bill Act Into Law, July 8, 2026 (full Blog can be read **here**)

Key changes affecting businesses

- Makes permanent and expands the 20% qualified business income (QBI) deduction for owners of pass-through entities (such as partnerships, limited liability companies and S corporations) and sole proprietorships
- Makes permanent 100% bonus depreciation for the cost of qualified new and used assets, for property acquired after January 19, 2025
- Creates a 100% deduction for the cost of "qualified production property" for qualified property placed into service after July 4, 2025, and before 2031
- Increases the Sec. 179 expensing limit to \$2.5 million and the expensing phaseout threshold to \$4 million for 2025, with annual inflation adjustments going forward
- Increases the cap on the business interest deduction by excluding depreciation, amortization and depletion from the calculation of "adjusted taxable income"
- Permanently allows the immediate deduction of domestic research and experimentation expenses (retroactive to 2022 for eligible small businesses)
- Makes permanent the excess business loss limit
- Prohibits the IRS from issuing refunds for certain Employee Retention Tax Credit claims that were filed after January 31, 2024
- Eliminates clean energy tax incentives, including the qualified commercial clean vehicle credit, the alternative fuel vehicle refueling property credit and the Sec. 179D deduction for energy-efficient commercial buildings
- Permanently renews and enhances the Qualified Opportunity Zone program
- Permanently extends the New Markets Tax Credit
- Permanently increases the maximum employer-provided child care credit to \$500,000 (\$600,000 for small businesses), with annual inflation adjustments
- Makes permanent and modifies the employer credit for paid family and medical leave
- Makes permanent the exclusion for employer payments of student loans, with annual inflation adjustments to the maximum exclusion beginning in 2027
- Makes permanent the foreign-derived intangible income (FDII) and global intangible low-taxed income (GILTI) deductions and the minimum base erosion and anti-abuse tax (BEAT)
- Expands the qualified small business stock gain exclusion for stock issued after the date of enactment

Rehmann provided the following article on the OBBBA. President Trump Signs "One Big Beautiful Bill" into Law, July 8, 2025 (full article can be read **here**)

We take the following from this article to highlight for our members.

Clean Energy Policy: The OBBBA significantly reverses the prior administration's efforts to incentivize clean energy investments. Many clean energy tax breaks passed under the last administration are phased out or eliminated. Specifically, the \$7,500 consumer tax credit for electric vehicles (EVs) is eliminated for purchases made after September 30, 2025.

Spending Cuts: The package curtails spending on certain safety-net programs:

- Medicaid: The OBBB imposes cuts to Medicaid, reducing spending on the program by an estimated \$1 trillion over the next decade, according to the Congressional Budget Office. These cuts include restraints on federal funding matches for state programs and new work requirements for able-bodied recipients.
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP): The OBBB expands work requirements for SNAP (food stamps) recipients, which is expected to decrease the number of individuals qualified for benefits.

Other Provisions:

- Debt Limit: A \$5 trillion increase in the U.S. debt limit within the package eliminates the risk of a payment default that the Treasury had forecast for mid-August.
- Immigration and Military Spending: The OBBB provides new resources for immigration enforcement and military spending.
- Direct File: The OBBB funds a study on a private/public partnership to expand Free File, the IRS's free tax-filing system.
- Excise Tax on College Endowments: The OBBB implements a larger excise tax on the investment income of endowments of private universities and colleges.
- Trump Accounts: The OBBB adopts the framework for new tax-advantaged savings accounts for children (aka "Trump accounts").
- International Tax Rules: The package includes various changes to international tax rules, including adjustments to foreign tax credits, foreign-derived intangible income (FDII), and global intangible low-taxed income (GILTI).

SBA Shares Economic Injury Disaster Loans for Drought Information

Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) – Working capital loans to help small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture, and most private, non-profit organizations of all sizes meet their ordinary and necessary financial obligations that cannot be met as a direct result of the disaster. These loans are intended to assist through the disaster recovery period.

Five Potential Ballot Measures

We're just settling into summer of '25, but already the seeds are being sown for the November '26 election.

Michigan voters will definitely encounter statewide ballot measures. One measure automatically hits the ballot every 16 years, and 2026 is the year. This measure will ask voters if they'd like to hold a constitutional convention, which would essentially open the door to making changes—ranging from just a few adjustments to a complete overhaul—in Michigan's constitution. As risky as that may sound, if approved by the voters, the process is actually lengthy and requires further voter input. Bridge Michigan lays it all out in their June 6, 2025 article.

In many cases, though, measures end up on ballots as a result of a group organizing and then collecting enough valid petition signatures to warrant its inclusion on the ballot. Before the signatures can be gathered, however, the petition language must first be approved by Michigan's Board of State Canvassers. Already this year, that body has met and approved the petition language for Protect Voters' Rights, which is advocating for a constitutional amendment requiring proof of US citizenship to vote in public elections.

However, the Board of State Canvassers already has three other requests for reviewing petition language. If the language is approved and enough valid petition signatures collected, those ballot measures will center on:

A referendum to essentially nullify the paid sick leave and minimum wage laws signed on February 20, 2025, and revert back to the court-ordered laws that were set to take effect February 21, 2025. If and as soon as the committee locks in the referendum by collecting enough valid petition signatures, the laws signed on February 20th would be suspended until the November 2026 election takes place. This would cause widespread disruption and inefficiencies for all employers but especially for small businesses. Voters to Stop Pay Cuts is the committee backing this proposal.

A constitutional amendment to impose a "surcharge" of 5% tax against the income of someone earning \$500,000 annually, or \$1,000,000 as a married couple. Backers of this strategy, Invest in MI Kids, are aiming to generate at least \$1 billion more annually as revenue for public schools.

A constitutional amendment to rebuild Michigan's system of voting by moving to a "ranked choice" method. At the moment, only Alaska and Maine have statewide ranked voting, although a handful of local municipalities—including Washington D.C. in November 2025—adopted this process. Rank MI Vote is putting the ballot initiative forward.

The Board of State Canvassers has set the deadlines for approving or rejecting the language for all three within the next month. And, beyond these three, we are hearing rumblings of groups aiming to put forward measures to eliminate property tax and institute a statewide program of paid family leave.

The road until the November 2026 ballot is all buttoned up is long, indeed. We will continue to keep you apprised of the measures you'll see on your ballot.

So, What Else Will Michigan Vote on in 2026?

Next November's election will be rather unusual, due to both an open US Senate seat and an open gubernatorial seat appearing on the ballot. US Senator Gary Peters will conclude his service at the end of 2026, and Governor Gretchen Whitmer will "term out" at the end of 2026, as well.

So, who's already tossed their hat into the ring? Again, there's plenty of runway leading up to the final printing of ballots, but we've already got a pretty good idea who is running for these key seats. As of June 23rd, here's a list of the candidates from the three major

political parties.

Carbon Capture Legislation Introduced

The Senate Energy and Environment Committee heard testimony on Senate Bills 394, 395 and 396, recently re-introduced legislation on carbon capture and storage technology (CCUS).

MMA supports and is leading the way in establishing a state-level regulatory structure for the use of carbon capture and storage in Michigan to advance the decarbonization of our industrial base. This regulatory structure will provide a clearer path to deployment of CCUS projects in Michigan.

State-level CCUS regulatory structure will provide certainty to investors planning large scale investment in carbon capture and storage technology that will protect and create jobs in Michigan's current industrial base and create more economic development to improve our state's economy.
