 - Create a winning environment; winning as people, as students, as a program.

Coaching Staff Approach

What We Want to See

- Student-athletes playing competitive baseball with peers from the Octorara community, improving through that process, and competent for JV level baseball.
 - Prioritize HS Baseball in season and in the summer.
 - Encourage students to play other sports.
 - Encourage those who don't to take advantage of offseason opportunities.

Challenges

- Giving everyone the time and attention in the various feeder programs.
- Cautious about actions with everyone.

Announcements

1. Student-Athlete Interest Meeting (Offseason is VOLUNTARY)

- Information was given to both MS and HS, but we only have enough room and resources to prioritize HS at this time.
- Packet of Information given; sent lesson resources, clinic information previously
- Why off-season workouts?
 - Safety and injury minimization, creation of healthy habits for life.
- Compilation of experience and working with Athletic Trainers, coaches and players at collegiate level in various programs.
- <u>September-November</u>
 - Speed/Agility
 - Workouts on their own with program provided Mr. Durante Tues and Thurs from 2:45-4:00pm HS Gym
 - Beginner and advanced levels, stretching/yoga off-day activities.
 - Long toss program beginning in November
- December-February
 - Team weightlifting
 - JH Gym baseball sessions starting Saturday, December 2nd.
 - I have information on nutrition and supplements, but that was not included in the packet of information.

Announcements Continued...

- 1. MS Baseball is funded for 2024 and resources are purchased for the season.
 - We will continue to do so each year because that's what a school should do for their community, and what is outlined for a school to do for a district program as per Board Policy 915.
- 2. Baseball in this community will run as it has since I've been here this season.





Our Current State

- 1. MS Baseball
- 2. Club Level Travel
- 3. Organizational Travel
- 4. Little League
- 5. Some combination of the above.

What I've Learned

Little League

- Consistent numbers from lowest ages through 50/70.
- 14 and up fluctuates; sometime there is a Junior team, sometimes a Senior, rarely both, and sometimes no teams at all.
- 14 years old and up sometimes start late and have trouble filling out • teams.
- Can be played in conjunction with MS Baseball and some travel.
- MS Baseball
 - Access to everyone in JH school building and home school students within district limits.
 - Fluctuates based on student-athlete participation.

 - Must be in 7th and 8th grade (usually ages 13-14).
 Can be played in conjunction with LL (50/70 or 14 level depending on age) and some travel teams depending on the organization.

What I've Learned

- Travel
 - Club level
 - Comprised only or mostly Octorara student-athletes.
 - Some of these teams are able to play in conjunction with LL and MS and some are not.
 - These teams are run by a collection of individuals/parents of student athletes.
 - Organizations
 - Some players have elected to play with travel organizations scattered across Lancaster and Chester counties → Elite, Keystone Bombers, WC Dragons, All-Star, and several others in PA and even MD.
 - These teams are comprised of some Octorara student-athletes as well as other student-athletes from communities outside of Octorara.

Little League

Pros

- League is growing and robust from lowest age through 50/70 (age 13).
- Inclusive; no cuts.
- Kids playing with their local community members.
- Can be played in conjunction with other outlets.
- All-Stars/Postseason.

Info to Consider

- Junior division and up (14 years old and up) has inconsistencies.
 - Not enough participation or games played depending on start time.
 - Kids not always leveled appropriately because of possibly playing up.
- Competition inconsistent.

MS Baseball Pros Info to Consider

- Meets the needs for some in the community.
 - Proximity.
 - School transportation.
- Can be played in conjunction with other outlets.
- Kids playing on 60-90 field.
- School running things makes it
 easier financially.

- Turnover in coaches.
- Not having two teams consistently; numbers fluctuating.
- 7th graders having to play up if teams have to combine (not leveled properly)
- Possible cuts depending on numbers.
- Not enough games played.
- Some games not being rescheduled.*
- No postseason.
- ChesMont League can decide to not renew Octorara for MS Baseball since the HS program is no longer in that league.*

Club Level Travel (Lancaster Youth)

Pros

- Octorara kids playing together.
- Competitive baseball.
- Leveling of players into sections.
- Opponents are other communities we will play in HS.
- 18+ games; games are rescheduled.
- Postseason opportunities.

Info to Consider

- Not inclusive in its current form.
- Not run by an association.
- Not able to play in conjunction with other outlets or LCYBL games are forfeit.
- Field dimensions.
- Proximity and transportation issues for away games due to times of games.

Organizational Travel

Pros

- Players improve due to resources of these organizations.
- Competitive*
- Can be done in conjunction with other outlets, including HS Baseball and HS Summer Baseball.
- Recruitment.

Info to Consider

- Players not playing with community members.
- Not always competitive (varies by tournament, etc.)*
- Less utilization of HS coaches for recruitment.
- Price.

What's the Pathway Forward?



Option 1: Keep Thing the Same

- Baseball continues to remain a household decision in the most literal sense.
 - \circ MS
 - Little League
 - Club Travel (such as Lancaster Youth)
 - Organizational Travel
 - $\circ~$ Combination of the above.

Option 2: Little League Pathway

- MS Baseball is handled by Little League at their 14 year old level.
- We recommend that kids move into LL at 14 and continue there after their 50/70 year.
- LL runs it as they normally would.
 - Board Policy 915 outlines that Booster Clubs can only be involved with district programs.
 - Booster organizations must conduct their activities in a manner that is consistent with the district's policies and administrative guidelines... in compliance with Title IX as observed both as a separate organization and as combined with district programs and initiatives; with PIAA rules and regulations...

Option 2: Little League Pathway

- Upsides
 - More control for community.
 - Direct pipeline from LL into HS, which is already in place at LL, but we can make it even more linear and perhaps bring in more kids to that level.
 - More access for female athletes and no red tape if they want to play baseball.
 - No cuts.
- Considerations
 - Coaching would be on a volunteer basis and if volunteers aren't available.
 - Handling numbers depending on kids coming through.
 - HS and this organization are separate, but perhaps could work together on fundraisers to support both.

Option 3: Lancaster Youth Baseball League Pathway

- None of these teams are run by their school. They all run by a private league/organization, so an association would need to be created.
 - Board Policy 915 outlines that Booster Clubs can only be involved with district sponsored programs.

Option 3: Lancaster Youth Baseball League Pathway

• Upsides

- Grants more control for the community as it relates to baseball rather than the school.
- More access for female players compared to MS Baseball.
- Tryouts
 - JV and Varsity Baseball coaches would be in charge of tryouts.
 - Outside agency could be contracted to do tryouts so it is fair and unbiased.
 - Created Board would be in charge of hiring coaches.
- Control not in the hands of an outside party or entity.

• Considerations

- Separate organization and Board would need to be created.
- HS and this organization are separate, but perhaps could work together on fundraisers to support both.
- Kids could not play LL at Junior level, only rostered on LCYBL team.

Possible Lancaster Youth Team Formats

- No cuts Players are leveled similar to HS.
- Format 1:
 - Get all 13 and 14 years olds together, have an outside agency come in, hold a tryout, and level teams.
 - Prioritize 14 in Lancaster Youth and select appropriate level for that season.
 - Higher level 13 years olds could also play on a Lancaster Youth team.
 - Kids still developing encouraged to play 50/70 or we create a Section 3 team in Lancaster Youth.
- Format 2
 - 13 year olds play 50/70 and LL handles tryouts, etc. for that age.
 - Only 14 year olds try out and are leveled for one or more Lancaster Youth teams.

Baseball Boosters

Board Policy 915 and Moving Forward

Board Policy 915

The bylaws/constitution of the organization must satisfy the following requirements:

- 1. The bylaws must be approved by a majority of the group it represents.
- 2. An annual budget must be approved by the <u>governing</u> body.
- 3. Two (2) signatures are required on all accounts for disbursement of funds.
- 4. Statement indicating that coaches and/or district advisors shall not handle funds of the booster club. A coach's/advisor's role in the functioning of the booster club is solely in an advisory capacity.

We are now a Non-profit (501c) which is allowed by Board Policy 915 - "Groups should consider filing with the Commission on Charitable Organizations, Department of State, as a charitable nonprofit organization, and they shall follow any IRS State Reporting requirements."

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Board Policy 915

- 1. A process is in place for members to vote upon how funds will be used.
- 2. The criteria for membership and voting rights in the organization.
- 3. The mechanism by which an internal audit is conducted annually. (Note: This may be assigned through bylaws to an audit committee of the membership.)
 - Annual budget from July 1 June 30; including organization's name and date submitted to be submitted one (1) month prior to the start of the organization's season.
 - Annual Treasurer's Report or external audit no later than ninety (90) days following the conclusion of the season, or June 30 if a year-round activity, and forwarded to the Board upon request.
- A description of how assets will be disbursed in the event the organization is disbanded. Equipment or funds shall become the property of the district in the event a booster club chooses to disband.

Next Steps

*Expect Booster Meeting in Oct./Nov.

*Expect 2024 vote of officers before end of year.

- 1. Bylaws need to be amended in certain areas and voted on by members.
 - a. Change voting eligibility standards to make access to voting more feasible.
 - b. Membership wording addressed.
 - i. As per Board policy 915 "organization comprised of parents/guardians or community members who choose to support an extra or co-curricular activity."
 - c. Statement regarding the role of coaches in a Booster Club.
 - d. Process in place for for members to vote on how funds will be used when the dollar amount is above a certain amount. (\$1000)
- 2. Provide AD the following:
 - a. Amended/Updated Bylaws
 - b. Updated officer information (names, addresses, phone numbers, email addresses).

Next Steps

- Reorganize and re-vote (we re-vote every year anyway as per Bylaws)
- 2. Board Positions:
 - a. President
 - b. VP
 - c. Treasurer
 - d. Secretary
 - e. Operations Coordinator
 - i. Helps execute fundraising events and work on sponsorships.
 - ii. Liaisons with MS Baseball in whatever format chosen.
 - f. Bylaws, Section 5.2 VP and Operations Coordinator added.
 - g. Bylaws, Article VI add what VP and Operations Coordinator do.

Community Responsibility


- More people attending Booster meetings so that your voice is represented.

What Each Role Entails in our Booster Club



President

- In charge of scheduling and running Board meetings.
- Works with the HS Administration on behalf of the program.
- Planning team picnic, Senior Night, banquet (and all that's included).
- In charge of getting volunteers and establishing committees for any events as necessary.



- Supporting the President in any roles that they he/she needs help with.
- Filling the role of the President if necessary.
- Handle inquiries from parent(s)/guardian(s) as it relates to Board operations.
