The following Board members were absent: Alece Ellis. There was a quorum. The following CDCTS members were in attendance: Caylee Baggett, Janice Butt, Julie Noe, Rita Dunn, Melissa Morehead, Ariel Blackstone, and Maria Blackstone. Visitors: None.

III. Approval Of Minutes From Last Meeting

Minutes from December 11, 2018 were sent electronically via newsletter to all members for their review. A motion to accept the minutes as read was submitted by Carolyn Ordal and seconded by Rita Dunn. Carried.

IV. Committee Reports

Eventing Committee. Ashley presented her vision for a clinic on showing details for new riders, intended for both junior and adult riders. A list of topics will be geared to attending our schooling shows and includes how to prepare for tests, what to do when you and your horse arrive, when to check in with show secretary, when to get to each ring prior to riding your test, equipment and attire and etiquette while on the show grounds. Discussion ensued regarding the need for sharing this type of info with local 4H groups as many young riders could use the information and are interested in learning. It was decided to contact the UT Extension agent for a list of individuals who are organizing 4H in each county as a start point and reach out to local groups to start coordination. Entries:

All entries MUST include a copy of a current negative Coggins. The CDCTS/Penrose Farm release form must be filled out, signed and dated by rider and/or parent or guardian if rider is younger than 18 years old. Stallions are permitted to show at Penrose Farm.

Payment in full must accompany the entry form. If payment has not been received by closing date of Saturday April 27, 2019, the entry will be void. **Payment by PayPal is also accepted. If you choose to use PayPal, make sure you add \$2.00 to your total fee and scan or print a copy of your payment receipt and send it with your completed and signed show entry form so that the Show Secretary can confirm your payment.**

Refunds:

No cash refunds after closing date. Show credit will be given with a veterinarian's or a doctor's certificate/letter. RETURNED CHECKS for NSF will incur a \$40.00 fee and a void entry.

Ribbons will be awarded in all classes of placements 1st through 6th place

Arena:

All Dressage Tests will be ridden in the Covered outdoor arena. Footing is sand and GGT. Warm up area will be in an outdoor sand ring and will be marked.

Dressage tests Intro, A, B, C and CT dressage tests "Green As Grass," "Elementary Novice," and Preliminary Test A will be ridden in a 20 m x 40 m arena. All other dressage tests, including the following CT tests—Preliminary Test B and Intermediate A and B—will be ridden in a 20 m x 60 m arena.

Jumping will be in a fenced-in outdoor arena. Footing is sand.

Attire:

Appropriate informal schooling attire is required. ASTM-SEI approved helmets and appropriate footwear is required and must be worn at all times when mounted.

Parking:

Cars may be parked separately from trailers, depending on numbers. Trailers will be parked in a signed area. Volunteers will be on hand to assist with parking. Please follow the guidance of the volunteers, park only in designated areas.

Ride Times:

Official ride times will be posted on the CDCTS website and FaceBook page on Thursday May 2, 2019 after 6 p.m.

Day Stalls:

May be available. Owners of those horses using day stalls must show proof of a flu shot within the last three (3) months, current vaccinations and negative coggins. For availability and cost please contact Erika Adams via text at 865-384-5680 or email adams.erika@gmail.com

Concessions: Will be on the premises

Dogs: No dogs allowed. No exceptions

CDCTS SCHOOLING SHOWS: General Rules and Etiquette

General Rules

- All shows are run under the general rules of USEF, unless otherwise specified.
- Approved protective headgear and footwear with appropriate heels must be worn whenever mounted.
- All schooling shows offer current: USDF Introductory Levels, USEF Training through Fourth Level, FEI levels, Rider tests, USEA Eventing tests, Pas de Deux and Musical Freestyles (all levels).
- It is expected that riders take pride in their turnout. Coats are encouraged, but not required. Plain white riding shirts or polo-style shirts with dark breeches are also appropriate. T-shirts or tank tops are not permitted. Note: during hot weather, riders are encouraged to show without coats in the interest of their health.
- Please go to the following websites to ensure that your attire and equipment is aligned with your discipline:

- Braiding the mane is encouraged, but not required.
- The following equipment is forbidden at a dressage show: martingales of any kind; bearing, side or running reins; seat covers; and any form of blinkers.
 - The following equipment is permitted in warm-up areas: running martingales, bandages, boots and side reins.
 - All equipment, including whips, bits and spurs must comply with USEF rules.
 - Ear nets are permitted; fly masks are not allowed.
- No bareback riding is allowed.
- A rider should not be judged by anyone who has instructed him/her within the last 30 days (exception: attending clinics). If you arrive at the show and find that your instructor has been substituted for the judge, notify the show manager and ask to ride hors concours, or don't ride and receive a full credit for your entry fees.
- If you are riding a musical freestyle, please bring your own music and boom box.
- Check your score before you leave the show grounds. Any scoring errors must be reported and corrected before you leave the show grounds. After that time, no corrections can be made.
- Please note that classes do not always go in order of lowest to highest. Classes at shows may be scheduled in any order throughout the day.
- Classes may be split or combined, depending on the number and distribution of entries.
- If you intend to bring a horse that is not competing onto the show grounds, this decision must be cleared with the show manager prior to the show date, and will be at his/her discretion. If permitted by the manager, you must bring a current negative Coggins test to the show grounds and present it to the manager upon your arrival, before you unload your horse and also pay the non-competition fee. Please see the entry form for details.

CDCTS SCHOOLING SHOWS - continued

Show Etiquette

- Be considerate of other riders in the warm-up area. Pass left-shoulder to left-shoulder and yield to those who are moving at faster gaits.
- Arrive outside the ring approximately one minute before your ride time, having already warmed up your horse. You will have 45 seconds to enter the ring once the judge has rung the bell.
- If your ride is not next, please do not congregate with your horse around the arena entrance.
- Lunging is prohibited in the warm-up area; check with the show manager or warm-up ring steward about where lunging is permitted on the show grounds.
- Be courteous to the judge and show volunteers.
- Should you need to excuse yourself from the ring during your test for any reason, be sure to ask for the judge's permission prior to exiting the ring.
- Leave your trailer site clean; pick up all trash and manure and dispose of it or take it with you.
- Obey all rules of the facility where the show is held. (For example: where to park, no smoking, no dogs, etc)



Taken directly from the WDAA Train The Trainer Graduate Clinic documents, May, 2015, Prior, Oklahoma

"Western Dressage integrates the historically validated principles of dressage with the best of western stock horse tradition. It is a systematic and progressive system of training for the western horse and rider, in traditional stock tack with the purpose of enjoying a safe, pleasurable, versatile and useful working horse.

- **The hallmarks of the Western Dressage Horse are:**
 - Usefulness
 - Rideability
 - Willingness
 - **SAFETY**
 - Pure Gaits
 - Lightness
 - Calmness

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The “Every Day” Mechanical Advantage


Those whom are familiar with the use of Mechanics for horses with Laminitis can surely appreciate its value in that scenario. What about the average horse a Farrier sees every day who does not suffer from Laminitis? What about the horse with some variation of a “normal” foot that is not currently lame? Is there a reason to apply a mechanical package to this horse? To use the familiar saying, “If it’s not broken, why fix it?” Well, I implore you to consider what that “normal” foot really looks like.

Upon closer examination of the “normal” foot, might one not find subtleties of distortion, uneven loading, changes in wall thickness, inadequate sole or heel mass? Perhaps even conformations that predispose the foot to pathology such as long pasterns, broken hoof-pastern axis, rotational deviations of the leg, varus or valgus deviations of the leg, arthritis or injury-induced loading and breakover deviations. Given any one of these attributes, would not a single Farrier address them in a proactive way as to prevent or delay onset of degeneration or pathology? If the answer is no, why is it no? Try and explain to the owner why one would recognize such things but choose not to address them. Perhaps we don’t know how best to address them.

Let’s consider the not so “normal” foot; those with heels that run forward, crushed heels, negative palmar/plantar angles, thins walls, stretched white line, club feet, thin soles, etc. Those “normal” feet with already present pathology such as navicular/caudal heel pain, deep digital flexor/impar injuries, collateral ligament damage, ring bone, pedal osteitis, recurrent abscessation, quarter cracks, toe cracks, white line disease, etc. I think every Farrier would address these conditions proactively in one way or another.


Recognition of the Tendon Theory and alteration of the forces it describes is Mechanics. The application of Mechanics places the foot in a mechanically advantageous position as to reduce the forces that would otherwise lead to its deterioration. The Tendon Theory upon which Mechanics rely was proposed and developed by Dr. Ric Redden, a Veterinarian-Farrier of Versailles, KY. Through years of studying the foot with radiographs, venograms, and podiatry together with trial and error, the Tendon Theory was developed.

The foundation of his theory is centered on addressing two main structural systems of the foot: support components and suspension components. The support components are the hoof capsule, sole, bars, frog, and digital cushion. Suspension components are mainly the deep digital flexor tendon and the lamellae connecting hoof capsule to coffin bone. These two systems are simplistically represented in the image below. The support system is shown in green as coils and shock absorbers. The suspension system is shown in yellow as small springs (laminae between the hoof wall and coffin bone), large spring (deep digital flexor tendon), and pulleys (navicular apparatus). The red arrows show the directional forces at play around the various structures.




I've always understood the support system. That is where most farriers and veterinarians focus their attention. Shoes, pads, sole packing, etc. are all designed with support in mind. What I now realize is without addressing the suspension, we are missing the mark by a mile. The two systems are closely linked. Addressing only one of them will yield less than maximal results.

If we look at the two systems separately in the simplistic drawings below starting with suspension, the two main players are the deep digital flexor tendon (ddft) and the lamellar attachment between hoof wall and coffin bone. The ddft (orange line) is anchored at the elbow, runs down the leg to insert on the bottom/ventral surface of the coffin bone, and exerts a rotational force on the coffin bone via the pulley action of the navicular bone. In a healthy foot this force is equally antagonized by the strong Velcro-like lamellar tissue (purple arrows) that hold the hoof wall to the coffin bone. Therefore, the coffin bone, and thus the digit, is "suspended" within the hoof capsule by these two very robust structures. This can also be illustrated by picturing a hammock; one end anchored by the lamellar tissue, the other end by the deep flexor tendon. A large portion of the horse's weight is directed down into this "hammock." The remainder of the horse's weight is distributed through the support structures.



If we now examine the support system, the main players are the hoof capsule, sole, frog, digital cushion and the phalanges (long and short pastern bones and the coffin bone). The weight of the horse is directed down through the skeleton into the foot and is represented by the green arrows pointed down through the middle of the phalanges. In a healthy foot, this force is equally opposed by the ground pushing up (as shown by the shorter green arrows pointing up from the bottom of the foot) via the hoof capsule, sole, frog and digital cushion, against the bottom of the coffin bone.



The support and suspension systems work together to keep the relationship between the bone and the hoof capsule stable throughout all sort of mechanical stresses placed upon the foot during the horse's performance. In a "normal" appearing foot, meaning one that is not upright or clubby, nor does it have low underslung or crushed heels, these two systems are in perfect harmony. However, if one system is

overwhelming or insufficient, the foot takes on either an upright or clubbed appearance (too much suspension), or a low angled underslung or crushed heel with minimal digital cushion (not enough suspension). Genetics can predetermine this arrangement, but environment, nutrition, injury and disease also affect it.

So, how do Mechanics benefit the average horse? Through years of study, Dr. Redden discovered the manipulation of the forces described in the Tendon Theory affected most every subtle and non-subtle distortion, abnormality, and disease process listed at the beginning of this article. Therefore, using Mechanics one could improve the quality of a hoof, and the longevity of the horse. What's more, the observed improvement by the Farrier and the perceived improvement by the horse far surpassed what more traditional AFA (American Farrier's Association) type approaches would produce. The caveat being that Mechanics were used properly.

Use of Mechanics should be by a Farrier and/or Veterinarian who understands the Tendon Theory well and its application in various scenarios. The degree of mechanical manipulation depends on the severity of disease, distortion or lameness, as well as the demands upon the horse. Nay Sayers may say the Mechanical approach can't be used for horses performing at speed, or jumping, or traveling over rough terrain. I would argue improper use of Mechanics should not be used for horses performing at speed, jumping, or traveling over rough terrain. Proper use of Mechanics can be used in nearly every situation. Proper use of Mechanics often requires the assistance of radiographs to accurately assess the foot and its needs. Therefore, the Veterinarian and Farrier must cooperate on a common path toward a common goal. Without radiographs, Mechanics can easily become improper and lead to untoward results. It is my opinion this very scenario is what turns some people off the use of Mechanics; they weren't given the radiographic assistance they should have, and the result of their attempt at Mechanics was disappointing.

So, I ask the question again. How can Mechanics benefit the average horse a Farrier sees every day? Unless the average horse a Farrier sees has perfect feet, great conformation, no metabolic issues, lives in the best of environments, is a pasture pet, has the best nutrition, no injuries, and no vices, Mechanics can be of use to every horse.




