We had this survey available at the banquet and are assessing comments and recommendations from those who completed it. Please respond to the survey and get it back to me. CDCTS MEETING MINUTES, JANUARY 14, 2025

Call To Order: The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. Present were Carolyn Ordal, Kacy Schnake, Lynn Holtman, Julie Noe, Diane Carlson, and Sloan Adams. Guests Julie Hall, Jean Sullivan and Amanda Cross were also present.

Approval of the December 2024 Minutes: A motion by Lynn Holtman was made to approve the minutes of the December 2024 meeting and seconded by Diane Carlson, all approved.

Treasurer's Report: The treasurer reported that 2024 income from shows, clinics and the silent auction did not cover all expenses and it was a net loss of \$572 for the year. However, the club is financially stable. A motion to approve the report was made by Sloan Adams and seconded by Lynn Holtman. It was unanimously approved.

Old Business

2025 Membership: How many have renewed? Currently 21 members have renewed; last year we had 41.

Christmas Party: The Christmas Party was December 7 at Rita Dunn's. CDCTS provided a ham and attendees brought side dishes/desserts. We ate well and everyone had fun with the Dirty Santa game. Thank you Rita for hosting again this year!!!

Annual Banquet: Buddy's BBQ Bearden Banquet Hall is reserved for January 25, 2025. We pay for 50 people to attend. Susan Hill is organizing awards. Do we have a speaker? Still searching for a speaker. Silent auction donations are needed. A contest is being held to get more silent auction donations. Carolyn Ordal showed the Silent Auction Bid sheets she created with minimum bids listed. A discussion was held about changing the location of the banquet due to Buddy's requiring we pay for 50 dinners minimum. Carolyn gave attendees info on price of changing location to Calhoun's. She had just talked with the banquet manager who said Buddy's would lower their charge to paying for 40 guests minimum instead of 50. After discussion, staying with Buddy's Banquet Hall was decided.

New Business

Schooling Show Dates: Spring, May 3; Summer, June 21; Fall, September 26, Fall Fun day, October 18 or 25? Need to determine locations and judges. Discussion concerned possible locations and possibly only doing 2 schooling shows. The June show has been the best attended. It was pointed out that Renaissance Farm in Bulls Gap is doing a rated dressage and western dressage show the following weekend. It was also noted that the Blackstones have not renewed their professional membership. More discussion to be held at next meeting, with board members being tasked to talk with possible venues. Discussion was also held about Fall Fun Day—go back to mock hunter pace at River Glen or handle as the FFD 2.0 as done this year.

Clinic Dates: Recommendations for clinicians—several clinicians were recommended, including another Emily Rose Clinic. Nancy Conley, Ariana Sakaris who does dressage as well as liberty and trick training clinics.

Review Roles/Job descriptions of the Board Members/Volunteers: Postponed for further discussion of volunteer jobs.

New Place for Meetings: The former RJ's was thought to be re-opening under new name/management. It had a private dining area that the club used pre-covid. Julie Noe will check it out.

Working Equitation Organization USAWE: Current rules say that in order for us to be an associated club, we have to have a person who is a member of USAWE. No one is currently a member, so the decision was made NOT to rejoin as an associated club. Kacy Schnake made the motion, Lynn Holtman seconded it and all approved.

Future of the Club: Lynn Holtman pointed out an article in the September issue of the UDSF magazine, stated many other clubs were having the same issues, getting members and volunteers. A suggestion was made to only host clinics in 2025 and discussion concerned that clinics were not money makers like shows. They are a service we provide to members to help them with their riding goals and we did well to break even on them. Increased advertising in social media for shows and events, reaching out to local Pony Club and 4-H groups as well as breed clubs was discussed. Another idea was to offer incentives to show entrants, such as if you show in 3 classes in one show, you get a reduced price for 2nd show classes. Carolyn Ordal showed attendees a survey she had prepared to send out to membership and to have on the tables at the banquet. A few changes were made so the survey can be sent out. More discussion to be held next month

Meeting was adjourned at 8:25 p.m.

On Friday, January 24, US Equestrian received word that the rule updates to the Horse Protection Act (HPA) have been <u>delayed</u> until April 2, 2025. These changes were originally scheduled to go into effect on February 1, 2025,

According to a statement put out by the USDA:

On January 24, 2025, USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) will temporarily postpone its final rule to amend the Horse Protection Act (HPA) regulations for 60 days from February 1, 2025, to April 2, 2025. APHIS published the final rule (89 FR 39194-39251) amending the horse protection regulations to provide, among other provisions, that the agency will screen, train, and authorize qualified persons for appointment by the management of any horse show, horse exhibition, or horse sale or auction to detect and diagnose soring at such events for the purposes of enforcing the HPA. With the exception of § 11.19, which went into effect on June 7, 2024, and authorized the training of horse protection inspectors, the remainder of the rule was scheduled to go into effect on February 1, 2025.

APHIS will issue guidance to stakeholders for the upcoming horseshow season in light of the postponement of the new rule.

The HPA is a Federal law that prohibits sored horses from participating in shows, exhibitions, sales, or auctions. The HPA also prohibits the transportation of sored horses to or from any of these events.

During the 2025 US Equestrian Annual Meeting and prior to today's postponement announcement, Senior Director of Equine Protection for The Humane Society of United States (HSUS) Keith Dane provided an update on the Horse Protection Act (HPA) including a helpful overview comparing the changes in the HPA rule requirements.

Dane reviewed several of the main changes to the law, which are focused primarily on the Tennessee Walking Horse and the racking horse breeds, although the HPA itself, applies to all horses in the United States.

What Show Managers and Exhibitors need to know about new Horse Protection Act regulations

New regulations passed by Congress are going to mean big changes for organizers of all horse shows, events and exhibitions across the United States.

Congress enacted the Horse Protection Act (HPA) to end the cruel and inhumane practice of soring horses, a practice that has long been prevalent in the Tennessee Walking Horse and Gaited Horse Shows. Soring is defined as:

- (A) An irritating or blistering agent has been applied, internally or externally, by a person to any limb of a horse,
- (B) Any burn, cut, or laceration has been inflicted by a person on any limb of a horse.
- (C) Any tack, nail, screw, or chemical agent has been injected by a person into or used by a person on any limb of a horse, or
- (D) Any other substance or device has been used by a person on any limb of a horse or a person has engaged in a practice involving a horse, and, as a result of such application, infliction, injection, use, or practice, such horse suffers, or can reasonably be expected to suffer, physical pain or distress, inflammation, or lameness when walking, trotting, or otherwise moving, except that such term does not include such an application, infliction, injection, use, or practice in connection with the therapeutic treatment of a horse by or under the supervision of a person licensed to practice veterinary medicine in the State in which such treatment was given.

The Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) through their parent agency the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has amended horse protection regulations. The new regulations go into effect on February 1, 2025. This new law pertains to ANY competition or public exhibition in the United States (exception: rodeo, parades, speed events). This will affect ALL competitions and exhibitions, even non-recognized club events, 4-H events, schooling shows, etc. There is no exception based on number of entries.

It should be noted that an HPA violation would be a violation of existing WPCSA rules regarding welfare of the horse.

What this means for Show Managers:

Access to Records

The law refers to event Organizers as "Management": any person who organizes, exercises control over, or administers or who is responsible for organizing, directing, or administering. Managers must provide representatives from the APHIS and Horse Protection Inspectors (HPI) unlimited access to any records required to be kept or otherwise maintained by regulation. This includes:

- Allowing APHIS representatives and HPIs to examine and make copies of such records pertaining to any horse during business hours or other mutually agreed upon time
- Providing a room, table, or other facilities necessary to properly examine and copy such records

Reporting

As a horse event manager, you must report certain information at specific intervals before and after each event:

At Least 30 Days Before the Event

Under §11.14 of the HPA regulations, you must submit to the APHIS Administrator the following information:

- Event date(s), name, street address, and zip code
- Event manager's name, address, phone number, and email address (if one is available)
- A copy of the official program, if one has been prepared
- Anticipated or known number of entries
- Whether you have requested an APHIS representative, chosen and appointed an HPI (from a list of USDA-trained inspections), or will not use an inspector to conduct inspections.

At Least 15 Days Before the Event

 You must notify the APHIS Administrator of any changes to the information previously provided.

The management of any horse show or horse exhibition shall disqualify any horse from being shown or exhibited (1) which is sore or (2) if the management has been notified by a person appointed in accordance with regulations under subsection (c) or by the Secretary (Secretary of Ag, if inspectors are on the grounds) that the horse is sore."

After The Event

You must submit information to the APHIS Administrator concerning each horse prohibited by management from being shown or exhibited because it was found to be sore or otherwise in violation of the HPA or its regulations. This includes:

- Name of owner/driver and any applicable horse registration name and number
- Competitor number and class number
- Reason for the action

It is important to note that Horse Show/Event/Exhibition Managers are liable for any HPA violations found at their event if they choose not to hire an inspector or if they fail to disqualify an animal with an HPA violation. Event Managers are also financially liable for failure to report as outlined above.

According to published data, there are on average 50 inspections per year at horse shows, and were nearly all at Walking Horse and Gaited Horse Shows. You may never see an inspector at your events, but the law still pertains to ALL shows and exhibitions.

WPCSA Sanctioned Shows <u>must</u> understand what this means for them—this law is for ALL horse shows in the US, there is no exemption even for 4-H or schooling shows.

It is our understanding that the United States Equestrian Federation has petitioned for a sixty-day delay to the start date of this program. We will keep you apprised of any new information as we receive it.


