Section 1: Introduction

The foundation of this system is consistency. Students, who begin when in elementary school, are guided through a structured roadmap that aligns with EIKEN® levels and developmental milestones. The first few years focus on phonics, listening, basic vocabulary and sentence structure. As students grow, the curriculum expands to include grammar, reading comprehension, writing, and academic discussion. By the time they reach high school, students are reading academic articles, writing persuasive essays, and engaging in debates - all in English.

Section 3: Key Components of Success

Success in language learning is rarely accidental. It's the result of deliberate choices, consistent effort, and a supportive environment. At King Eikaiwa, students who reach EIKEN® Pre-1 before graduating high school typically share a few key traits - and they benefit from a system designed to nurture those traits over time. This section explores the core components that contribute to long-term success and how King Eikaiwa integrates them into every aspect of its program.

1. Early Start

One of the most powerful predictors of success is when a student begins learning English early. At King Eikaiwa, many of our top-performing students started in elementary school - some as early as age four or five or younger. This early exposure allows them to develop a natural ear for English, internalize pronunciation patterns, and build vocabulary gradually over time.

Unlike junior high school programs that introduce English abruptly and often focus on grammar memorization, King Eikaiwa's early learners begin with phonics, songs, games, and simple conversations. They learn to associate English with fun, curiosity, and confidence - not stress or fear. This foundation makes it easier to transition into more complex language tasks later.

2. Consistency Over Time

Consistency is the backbone of the King Eikaiwa system. Students attend at least 48 weekly lessons year-round, with optional seasonal intensives during school vacations. This regular exposure ensures that English remains part of their routine - not just a subject they study occasionally.

Language acquisition is cumulative. Vocabulary builds on vocabulary. Grammar builds on grammar. Reading fluency builds on decoding skills. When students attend consistently, they avoid the "start-stop" pattern that plagues many learners. They don't forget what they learned last month. They build on it.

King Eikaiwa tracks attendance and progress carefully. Students who miss lessons are encouraged to make them up. School managers communicate with parents to ensure continuity. This culture of consistency helps students stay on track and reach milestones like EIKEN® 3, 2, and eventually Pre-1.

3. Curriculum Alignment with EIKEN®

Every lesson at King Eikaiwa is designed with EIKEN® standards in mind. From vocabulary lists to reading passages to writing prompts, the curriculum mirrors the structure and expectations of the EIKEN® test. But it goes beyond test prepit builds the skills that the test is designed to measure.

For example, students preparing for EIKEN® Pre-2 and above engage in academic reading using either National Geographic® articles, Oxford® texts, and Pearson® workbooks. They learn to identify main ideas, infer meaning, and analyze arguments. Writing tasks include opinion essays, summaries, and formal letters - all aligned with EIKEN® writing rubrics.

Listening practice includes authentic audio from real-world interviews, Duolingo® and teacher-recorded dialogues. Speaking practice is modeled after Toastmasters, with students giving short speeches, participating in debates, and responding to interview-style questions. This alignment ensures that students are not just "studying for a test" - they're developing the actual skills the test is meant to assess.

4. Student Motivation and Goal Setting

Section 4: Native Pronunciation, Rhythm, and Natural Speech Training

Clear pronunciation is essential for real-world communication, yet many learners in Japan struggle with strong accents that make their English difficult for native speakers to understand. This often happens when students are taught by non-native instructors who themselves speak English with a Japanese accent. Imagine learning Japanese from someone who never lived in Japan - the result would sound robotic, unnatural, and hard to follow. The same is true for English.


At King Eikaiwa, students learn directly from native speakers, ensuring they hear and practice authentic pronunciation, rhythm, and flow from day one. This exposure helps students avoid the flat, syllable-by-syllable delivery that's common in Japanese-taught English, and instead develop natural intonation and confident speech. We don't want our students to sound like robots - we want them to sound like fluent, expressive communicators.

Phonics and Pronunciation Mastery

Japanese learners face unique challenges in English pronunciation due to differences in phonetic systems. To address this, phonics instruction is embedded into every level of King Eikaiwa's curriculum. One of the most distinctive features of our program - especially with native teachers - is its strong emphasis on phonics and pronunciation. Students learn to distinguish and produce difficult sounds such as:

- L/R (e.g., light vs. right)
- V/B (e.g., vote vs. boat)
- th/th (voiced and unvoiced, e.g., this vs. think)
- sh/ch (e.g., sheep vs. cheap)
- s/z (e.g., sip vs. zip)
- f/h (e.g., fan vs. hand)
- r/l blends (e.g., grow vs. glow)

These sounds are introduced early and reinforced throughout the program. Students practice them in isolation, in words, and in full sentences using repetition, visual aids, tongue placement diagrams, and interactive games. Teachers provide individual feedback and use audio recordings to track progress. Activities include games, dialogues, reading aloud, and speech exercises modeled after Toastmasters®. This not only improves pronunciation but also builds confidence in speaking—an essential skill for EIKEN® interviews and real-world communication.



Rhythm, Stress, and Intonation

English has a natural beat, with stressed and unstressed syllables that create a musical pattern. Japanese learners often speak English with equal stress on every syllable, which sounds unnatural and robotic. We teach students to:

- Emphasize key syllables and reduce others
- Use rising and falling intonation for questions, emotions, and emphasis
- Avoid monotone delivery

This helps students sound more expressive and easier to understand.

Linking and Connected Speech

Native speakers rarely pause between words. Instead, they blend sounds together smoothly. We teach students how to link words naturally:

- Vowel to vowel: "Go out" becomes "Go-wout", "I am" becomes "I-yam"
- Consonant to vowel: "Pick it up" becomes "Pi-kit-up", "Turn off" becomes "Tur-noff"

We also teach intrusion, where soft sounds like /w/, /y/, or /r/ are inserted between words to maintain flow:

- "I agree" → "I-yagree"
- "Go out" → "Go-wout"

Elision and Reduction

In fast, natural speech, native speakers often drop or reduce sounds:

- "Want to" → "wanna"
- "Going to" → "gonna"
- "Did you" → "didja"
- "Next day" → "nexday"

These reductions are essential for understanding native speakers and sounding natural in return.



Thought Groups and Pausing

We also train students to break speech into "thought groups" - short, meaningful chunks - and pause at natural points. This improves clarity and makes speech easier to follow, especially in presentations and interviews.

This comprehensive approach not only improves speaking scores on EIKEN®, but also builds real-world communication skills. Students who speak clearly and naturally are more confident, more engaged, and more successful - both in the classroom and beyond.

Demotivation and Plateaus

One of the most common challenges is demotivation. This can happen at any stage - whether a student is just starting out or preparing for EIKEN® Pre-1. Sometimes progress feels slow. Sometimes students compare themselves to others. Sometimes life gets busy, and English feels like a burden.

Plateaus are especially common around intermediate levels like EIKEN® 3 and Pre-2. Students may feel like they're studying hard but not improving. This is a natural part of language acquisition. The early stages show rapid progress, but higher levels require deeper skills - academic reading, structured writing, nuanced listening - which take time to develop.

At King Eikaiwa, we help students understand that plateaus are temporary. Teachers explain the science behind language learning and reassure students that progress is still happening, even if it's not immediately visible. We use goal-setting tools, progress charts, and motivational strategies to help students stay focused.

Lack of Visible Progress

For example, moving from EIKEN® 2 to Pre-1 involves mastering academic reading, writing essays, and handling complex listening tasks. These skills take time to develop, and students may not see immediate results.

To address this, King Eikaiwa uses diagnostic tools and performance tracking. Students receive regular feedback on their reading speed, writing structure, vocabulary growth, and speaking fluency. Teachers show students how far they've come and what specific areas to focus on next.


