TARGETING DISPARITY AT ITS ROOTS

<u>The City's initiatives</u> address the root causes of Covid-19 and address health and well-being impacts on Black, indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) communities by:

- Providing culturally sensitive COVID-19 messages to BIPOC communities
- Connecting with BIPOC communities through schools, local faith groups, housing properties, business, rental and income assistance programs
- Encouraging volunteering at a local food bank that helps low-income individuals and families regardless of citizenship status
- Supporting the work of the City's Racial Equity Coordinator to prioritize integrating race and equity principles into all City operations, projects, and services

RECOVERY BUILT ON EQUITY

The City launched the <u>Boston Resiliency Fund</u>, raising \$32.4 million dollars and supporting 247 non-profits and over 225,000 Boston families by:

- Providing 645,0000 prepared meals and distributed 478,000 by partnering with the food bank, hiring 55 unemployed workers for food distribution and 20 local minority-owned restaurants to cook meals
- Providing 1000 families with a one-month supply of diapers and formula
- Funding 18 community health centers for Covid-19 testing, and 21 with expanded telehealth services Distributing \$1.1 million to families that did not qualify for federal coronoavirus relief
- Distributing 7,200 gift cards for families to use at local grocerey stores
- Purchasing 8,000 chromebooks for students to support remote learning

Other City initiatives:

- Creating a -19 Health Equities Task Force and declaring racism a public health crisis
- <u>Providing free confidential Covid testing</u> for disproportionately impacted neighborhoods (including walk-up options, no registration required);
- Established a \$6 million rental relief and small business fund (Reopen Boston Fund)
- Eased small business licensing restrictions to help small businesses and created the Boston Tax Help Coalition to help low-income residents eligible to receive federal stimulus checks

RAPID RESPONSE TEAM

- Launched a <u>Racial Equity Rapid Response Team</u> (RERRT) to address needs in black and Latinx neighborhoods including jobs, health care, and food
- Distributed 750,000 free masks in disproportionately impacted neighborhoods
- Created a <u>Covid-19 Recovery Task Force</u>
- Passed an <u>anti-retaliation ordinance</u> to prohibit employers from punishing employee for obeying Covid-related government orders
- Establishing testing facilities in each targeted area
- Partnering with the Greater Chicago Food Repository on <u>food distribution sites</u> to feed
 1,000 families per week for six weeks
- <u>Partnering with three dozen</u> Chicago health care organizations to combat systemic racism in healthcare, distribute PPE in disproportionately affected neighborhoods, and improve access to care
- Education and outreach, including <u>virtual town hall meetings</u> hosted by trusted community partners
- Chicago Transit Authority <u>shifting larger buses</u> into predominantly black areas to aid in social distancing to and from work

CITY OF MILWAUKEE, MN

RACISM AS PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS

- Quickly identified racial disparities in testing, infection, and death using county data
- Doubled testing in the most vulnerable communities
- Developed culturally relevant messaging to reach diverse communities
- Declared <u>racism a public health crisis</u>—becoming the first city in the country to do so
- Used police powers to <u>adopt/ enforce public health</u> <u>ordinances</u> (e.g., masks, isolation orders, etc.)
- Provided 300,000 free masks to residents
- Collaborated with community partners like federally qualified health centers to reach Latinx communities

INCLUSIVE TESTING STRATEGIES

- Increased testing in disproportionately impacted neighborhoods, with the <u>Mayor visibly promoting free</u>, confidential testing that did not affect immigration status
- To reach disproportionately impacted populations, census workers within the City of <u>Oakland also ask residents</u> if they want coronavirus testing
- Established a <u>Covid-19 Racial Disparities Task Force</u>. Examples of recommendations included:
 - Developing a Covid vulnerability index to inform equitable decisions;
 - Proactively collecting demographic data to inform equity strategies;
 - Proactive health check-ins for high-risk populations



CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, PA

PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS

- Established a <u>Philadelphia Worker Relief Fund</u> utilizing a publicprivate partnership (the Mayor's Fund) to raise \$3 million
- Provided emergency cash assistance to families and workers who did not receive any COVID-19 assistance (federal or state)
- Partnered with 14 community-based organizations to distribute funds and one-time \$800 gift cards
- Provided funding support for <u>Black Doctors Covid-19 Consortium</u>
 <u>to test more than 10,000 residents</u> free of charge and <u>offer walk-up testing</u> at community-events hosted by local community members to promote trust

ROCHESTER CITY + MONROE COUNTY

CITY AND COUNTY WORK TOGETHER

- Both municipalities <u>partnered with health and medical facilities on initiatives</u> to reduce racial and ethnic disparities related to COVID-19
- Two new respiratory health clinics, including a mobile site Monroe
- <u>County partnered with Foodlink</u> to distribute emergency food supply boxes throughout the county at no-touch drive-through sites
- City of Rochester collaborated with United Way to distribute over 2,000 laptops to students in Grade 5 and under to support virtual learning and close the digital divide
- Mailed masks to every household in the city
- "Protect your Circle" multi-media (in 10 languages) and public art campaign





SAN ANTONIO, TX

EQUITY FRAMEWORK FOR DECISIONS

- The City's Office of Equity developed a <u>Covid-19 Equity</u>
 Framework and <u>Rapid Response Tool</u> to ensure all decisions
 made by the City examine how Latinx and BIPOC communities
 would be affected
- Identified testing disparities in underserved neighborhoods and housing challenges using the equity matrix
- Concentrated outreach efforts in the census tracts that needed it most by partnering with the metropolitan health district
- Provided \$75 million for the <u>Covid-19 Worforce Recovery Program</u> to create a city-funded training program for unemployed San Antonians, from CARES funding and the city's general fund
- Free pop up testing sites that rotate around different parts of the city every week
- Passed a \$191 million <u>"Recovery and Resiliency Plan"</u> using federal and city dollars to provide job training, rent assistance, small business grants

CITY OF SAN FRANCISCO, CA

PARTNERING WITH LATINX ORGANIZATIONS

- Permanent and pop-up testing sites placed in 20K or less lowincome communities, disproportionately impacted neighborhoods, and several apartment complexes
- Approved \$28.5 million for Latino communities to combat Covid-19, including funds for testing, housing subsidies and eviction prevention, food access, family support, and small business/workforce assistance
- Partnered with the Latino Parity and Equity Coalition to focus resources on the community, as Latinos comprised 50% of Covid-19 cases
- <u>Provided subsidies</u> for workers unable to collect unemployment or sick leave and hotel rooms for affected residents living in close quarters with family members



CITY OF SAN JOSE, CA

STRATEGIC TAX BREAKS

- <u>Tax break</u> for 6,000 small businesses (e.g., nail salons, etc)
- Adopted a city-wide <u>anti-displacement strategy</u> to prevent residential displacement of low-income San Jose residents
- Created a <u>Racial Equity Task Force</u> to study various impacts of Covid-19 on low income communities of color in Santa Clara County, with recommendations including expanded rent relief, expanded reporting on the county's dashboard, and enhanced testing
- Established an Office of Racial Equity with a \$300,000 budget
- Provided 11,000 students with hotspots to support distance learning
- Through CARES Act funds, allocated <u>\$1.5 million for loans</u> and grants to home-based and small childcare providers
- <u>San Jose Viva Al Fresco</u> funding and ordinance for outdoor programs to assist small businesses
