Storybook Village Preschool is a Reggio-inspired preschool located in the Montgomery Village neighborhood, 4295 Montgomery Drive, Santa Rosa, CA, 95405.

Storybook opened and operated infant, toddler, and preschool programs in 2019 in Santa Rosa and relocated to the Montgomery Campus in 2024. Storybook's new location will care for preschool-age children two to five years old while working on designing the toddler room, which will be licensed at a later date.

Storybook Village Preschool is a play-based, friendship-driven program as a <u>Teaching Pyramid Mentor Site</u> <u>for CA</u> that embraces a "pedagogy of relationships" within a community that believes in children's rights to grow and learn in a way focused on learning processes. When children feel important while learning the friendship skills and behaviors to be part of a learning community, they are prepared for school and life, as they have learned how to solve problems and negotiate conflicts peacefully, express themselves while managing their feelings, and make friends through skills that will help them have lifelong healthy relationships.

Our learning experiences occur indoors and outdoors, as the learning environment is known as "the third teacher," and children thrive in nature. Our outdoor learning environment is used every day, as all weather is celebrated, giving them an uninterrupted time in childhood to explore and create through play. The play yards have teacher-designed proposals to invite new materials, challenges, and friendship experiences. We have small and large loose parts, farm tables to create, and a Cozy Cove to take space and enjoy a book, promoting self-regulation since the outdoor time can be overstimulating for young children.

The children and teachers share experiences together, as learning is best done as part of the process. There is enthusiasm for the little and big things found in nature, from observing the butterflies and the plants that attract them and learning about the lizards who live in the yard to the dry creek and the endless opportunities to make water move from the waterwheel. Joyful curiosity is the spirit we need to have when trying to get closer to learning experiences, and sharing these experiences with families makes learning-rich. We encourage and welcome family visitors, unplanned to planned family participation while growing a garden or becoming the guests of a child-hosted luncheon, as each family's presence contributes to our learning community. It takes a village!

PRESCHOOL DAILY SCHEDULE

"Every child needs one person who is crazy about them!" – Urie Bronfenbrenner

7:30 - 8:30 am Early Care Hour 8:30 am Morning Arrival & Play Freely

Grown-ups drop off their child in the Great Room. Uninterrupted and structured play (self-managed and hands-on activities, with teachers engaging small groups in the atelier). 9:45 am clean-up bell.

10:00 am Morning Gathering

10:15 am Morning Snack

10:30 am Outdoor Play

12:00 pm Lunch Begins

Children transition to handwashing in groups, and help prepare for their mealtime.

12:30 pm Story time and Part-Day Dismissal

Special Notes

Our preschool classroom schedule is fluid and elastic. Our values are embedded in relation to time; projects and conversations are permitted to unfold in their own time. We give our children ample time and space to make connections on their own time. There are things our preschoolers do each day and can anticipate, such as morning gathering, snack, projects, outdoors, lunch, rest, snack, and pick-up. The classroom documentation will share all of the wonderful learning happening.

Drop Off & Pick Up

This is a pleasant, informal time of the day when preschoolers are dropped off by 9:00 am in the classroom.

When you arrive with your child, please stop and complete your child's morning health check with a teacher. You're welcome to play with your child before departing for the day; however, please be respectful of our routines and mindful of the children's learning experiences and needs.

Families must arrive at least five minutes before their child's scheduled pick-up time, depending on the child's contracted day. If your child is absent, please message us using the school app or call the school.



Friendship Curriculum

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL SKILLS TO LEARN

Children need time and space to learn a new skill and practice to build fluency in the skill. This practice happens through play, and play happens in preschool. Instruction is more effective when it is embedded in the meaningful activities and contexts that occur throughout a child's day (Katz & McClellan 1997).

It is important for children to master these skills while in preschool, before venturing to TK or Kindergarten:

- Following rules, routines, and directions
- Using the bathroom independently
- Identifying feelings in oneself and others
- Controlling anger and impulses
- Problem-solving
- Suggesting play themes and activities to peers
- Sharing toys and other materials
- Taking turns
- Helping adults and peers
- Transitions successfully

- Giving compliments
- Understanding how and when to apologize



- Expressing empathy with others' feelings
- Recognizing that anger can interfere with problem-solving
- Learning how to recognize anger in oneself and others
- · Learning how to calm down
- Understanding appropriate ways to express anger
- Taking responsibility for their belongings
- Dressing themselves independently

Through a Reggio Emilia approach, our friendship curriculum implements a systematic teaching approach that allows children to acquire and use new skills efficiently, over time, and in various situations. When young children do not know how to identify emotions, handle disappointment and anger, or develop relationships with peers, we teach!

REGGIO-INSPIRED EMERGENT LITERACY

Learning Experiences Through the Zoo-phonics
Multisensory Language Arts Program

Play-based learning to promote a love for literacy!

What children learn does not follow as an automatic result from what is taught, rather, it is in large part due to the children's own doing, as a consequence of their activities and our resources.

—Loris Malaguzzi, The Hundred Languages of Children









The Zoo-phonics Multisensory Language Arts Program in a Reggio-inspired early childhood program.

The Hundred Languages is the belief that there are "multiple ways of seeing and multiple ways of being." The Hundred Languages of Children is a learning process, and through play, we learn all the ways children represent and convey ideas and emotions, as well as the multiple ways in which they comprehend the world.

Children usually come to the toddler program with limited speech and the preschool program with limited alphabet knowledge, which is appropriate. However, the *Zoo-phonics Multisensory Language Arts Program* will support the learning process naturally and playfully through our Zoo-phonics experiences! Most likely, the children will learn the body movements (the signals) first, the animal names second, and the sounds last. However, because they are SEEING, SAYING, HEARING, and MOVING, the articulation of speech sounds will be stimulated, and you will see quick progress!

- We promote emergent literacy by introducing the lowercase shapes and sounds of the alphabet through the animal pictures and body signals in large and small group experiences.
- We read aloud stories to the children. Through our small and large group experiences, children develop basic concepts of print, such as directionality, one-to-one correspondence of sounds to words, and relating speech to reading.
- We provide literacy-rich experiences through our environment with intentional materials to enhance children's exposure to and concepts about print.
- Our classroom stuffed animal, Bubba Bear, goes home weekly with a child to support our home-school connections and share literacy learning adventures through family engagement!
- Through play and provocations, we create meaningful class-made books with the children. The books become more child-led as we grow with the children in our mixedage classroom.
- Mark-making is the beginning stage of mastering writing skills!

The single most important activity for building these understandings and skills essential for reading success appears to be reading aloud to children (Wells 1985; Bus, Van Ijzendoorn, & Pellegrini 1995).

Storybook operates on a year-round basis. Our school follows the local school district's holiday closures, including an early closure at 12:30 p.m. on the second Wednesday of each month for professional learning (PL). Tuition rates do not change, and payment is expected regardless of closures.

Monthly Tuition and Enrollment Fees

The hours and daily routines allow us to honor our values of providing quality care and education while caring for each child. We focus on the needs of the collaborative community while honoring children's learning processes. Children are enrolled in a part—or full-day schedule. We provide morning and afternoon snacks daily.

Storybook is a year-round preschool program. Tuition is based on an annual budgeted amount and divided into 12 equal monthly payments. It is due even if the school closes for any reason. No tuition reductions will be made for absences due to family vacations, illness, etc. Our school follows the local school district closures for holidays, including early closure at 12:30 pm on the second Wednesday of each month for professional learning, and closed the following three weeks: winter, spring, and summer. Tuition may change with a 30-day notice.

Enrollment Fees

Type	Cost
Enrollment Application Fee	\$100
The one-time fee is non-refundable; the \$50 non-refundable waiting list application fee is applied to the Enrollment Application fee.	
Registration Fee	\$100
It is non-refundable and due at the time of pre-enrollment and annually thereafter. This fee guarantees continuous enrollment.	
Tuition Deposit	\$ 500

A one-time, non-refundable fee is due at the time of enrollment. Upon receiving a 30-day notice of withdrawal, the deposit will be applied toward last month's tuition.







Timetables and Monthly Rates

Storybook is a full-year-round preschool program (September - August). Tuition is collected before the first of each month via ACH auto-pay. There are additional fees for late pick-ups, including late and returned payments. The Family Handbook has further information.

Our program's practices are based on the program's philosophy and beliefs, and we recognize there are many wonderful ways to foster a loving community of young learners. Our practices and policies promote a safe, nurturing, creative environment designed for exploration and learning, which enables a safe place of high expectations that engages and challenges the minds and bodies of all its children and prepares them for success in school and life.

Communicating with your child's teachers regularly and participating, whenever possible, in the classroom and recommended at-home activities can strengthen bonds and provide opportunities to exchange information and discover shared practices. Storybook Village Preschool's PLANFOREMERGENCIES & DISASTERS

Families, you won't want to miss this important information! Help us keep your child safe!

DRILLS & EMERGENCY KITS

Disasters come in many forms and can occur at any time. Storybook Village Preschool has emergency plans and policies for disasters caused by natural events such as severe weather, earthquakes, and fires, including wildfires and smoke, as well as a human-caused event such as an active shooter or a hazardous material incident. Families must plan for school closures and rapid communication during emergencies or disasters. We meet at our relocation site for emergency drills.

Each child has a "Ready-to-Go" Kit with 72-hour emergency supplies. Families are encouraged to share family photos for children to have family books and to create customized comfort notes to cope during an emergency.

CHILDEMERGENCY INFORMATION

It's crucial to have child care emergency forms that give us access to all the correct information to help children get through an emergency effectively and notify parents or guardians. Here are the five things we include on our child care emergency forms:

- 1. Child & Family Information
- 2. Child Medical History
- 3. Emergency Contact Information
- 4. Family Physician & Insurance
- 5. Parent Acknowledgment & Consent

Families must update the Child Emergency Information form for changes in names and/or phone numbers if needed.



PLANNING TOGETHER!

COMMUNICATION DURING A CRISIS

Not all channels of communication may be available in an emergency. To help families stay informed, we have set up the ability to send emergency updates more than one way. We will send a mass text and email through the Procare app and then use social media sites to connect with our online preschool community.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS FOR FAMILIES

An emergency or disaster will likely disrupt our normal business operations. Planning ahead will allow Storybook Village Preschool to provide child care services as soon as possible after a disaster occurs.

- 1. Receive a copy of our school's Emergency Disaster Plan. (LIC 610)
- 2. Hold onto a wallet card with important information to help reunite with your child in the case of relocation.
 - 3. Review and update your child's emergency information.
- 4. Create a comfort note with a family picture for your child to help them cope in an emergency.
- 5. Check out community resources provided by the school to create a disaster plan at home and help your child and family thrive after a disaster strikes.
- 6. Learn how to communicate with our program before, during, and after a disaster.

There are policies when it is too unsafe to operate, and we will notify parents or guardians to pick up their children.

Lockdown: We will keep everyone inside because of a potentially violent situation. The school's door s and front gate will be disabled, so the family codes will not work. SRPD must confirm the neighborhood is safe for parents to pick up before we open the door for anyone.

Evacuation & Relocation Sites: We are familiar with what is around us if we can't re-enter our center. We have a backup location to go to and walk there safely with safety walking ropes. We have developed a process for reunifying the children with their



Guidelines for Wildfire Smoke

When a wildfire occurs nearby, deciding to close or evacuate the school is straightforward. However, as we have seen over the past several years, wildfire smoke can settle within our community when a wildfire is hundreds of miles away and impacts children's and teachers' health and school operations. We aim to keep the children and teaching staff healthy and safe while partnering with the families and community.

Below are our school's guidelines to share how SVP makes decisions from the data collected by the state when addressing whether the school closes, remains open, or modifies school events:

AIR QUALITY INDEX LEVELS OF HEALTH CONCERN (WITH NUMERICAL VALUE):

- GOOD (0 to 50): No Restrictions;
- MODERATE (51 to 100):
 - No restrictions for preschool children;
 - Infants and toddlers will stay indoors;
- UNHEALTHY FOR SENSITIVE GROUPS (101 to 150): All children will stay indoors;
- UNHEALTHY (151 TO 200): All children will stay indoors;
- VERY UNHEALTHY (201 AND HIGHER): SCHOOL CLOSED

These guidelines are based on the United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) and the Centers for Disease Control's Air Quality and Outdoor Activity Guidance for Schools and Wildfire Smoke: A Guide for Public Health Officials. The guidelines assist in the California schools' decision-making process.


Storybook Village Preschool will monitor local air quality conditions using air quality tracking tools recommended by the county or state. The school will have portable HEPA filters in the classrooms, sized correctly for each area. The teachers will ensure doors and windows are closed, which limits natural ventilation.

Storybook teachers will monitor the air quality index (AQI) using EPA's AQI monitoring tools at Fire.AirNow.gov, which aggregates data from Purpleair.com and Airnow.gov.

If your child is ill or sent home for any illness symptoms, he or she must stay home until he or she is symptomree and has been symptom-free for 24 hours without medication (the entire following school day).

When Your Child is Sick:



Outside every day in all seasons

When children are outdoors, they are protected against cold. To protect against cold, we ensure that children wear clothing that is dry and layered for warmth. There's a saying that goes something like, "there's no such thing as bad weather, just bad weather attire," so please dress your child accordingly.

Children will not get sick by being outdoors during the fall or winter seasons. The fresh air and outdoor classroom will strengthen and support their growth and development.

 Change of clothing: Each child is required to have two complete changes of clothing appropriate for the current weather at all times in his or her cubby. If a child is in diapers, pull-ups, or potty training, five sets of clothes are needed.



Dressing for Cold Weather

We are collecting extra rain boots and cold-weather clothes, so if you have spares, we would love them so we can share them with families who could use them or have appropriate backup clothing for the colder seasons.

- Children should wear layers of loose-fitting, lightweight clothing.
 Outer garments, such as coats, should be tightly woven and be at least water repellent when rain is present.
- Children should wear a hat/beanie, coat, and gloves/mittens kept snug at the wrist.
- There should be no hood strings or neck strings.
- Shoes: Waterproof shoes are required on rainy and cold days; for safety reasons. Please dress your child in shoes without laces as they often come untied and pose a trip hazard. Please remember closed shoes are required year round; flip flops and sandals are not appropriate for our preschool setting.
