### General Meeting 2024

The Kathleen Syme Library is starting to feel like home for our meetings! Our December General Meeting was well attended, with some new faces and people joining virtually.

Our guest speaker was Joel Fitzgerald, one of the two Art of Nursing recipients from 2023. Joel was nominated



for the award for his compassion, patient centred care and positive attitude, and his exceptional care and kindness towards his patients, their relatives and his colleagues.

Joel had studied a double degree in Ballarat, Paramedicine and Nursing. Joel was fortunate to be studying with and then completing his Grad Year at RMH with Momoka Yoshida, our other Art of Nursing recipient, so they kept in regular contact. Joel spoke of the pace of his wards, the importance of good preceptors, the need for people to debrief with, and how having a housemate who was also a Grad was really beneficial. Joel's rotations were in the really busy AMU (Acute Medical Ward) and then surgical wards, and then he accepted a job in the Emergency Department. Joel acknowledges that it is the staff, the 'lifeblood' as he calls them, that are the saviours for Grad Nurses, their ability to teach, "have your back" and help you get through things are the survival essentials for this critical year.



Joel said that regular debriefing sessions early in the Grad Year was great, and he saw a need for this to continue to bond and an outlet for the Grads.

Joel thinks that the beauty of having so many different areas of nursing allows you to find your unique area, where your personality matches. Surviving a frantic Grad year, becoming comfortable in one area then starting another from scratch, is no easy task, but being kind to yourself and having people around you to support you are the keys to survival.

Our profession is in good hands with nurses like Joel coming through our ranks!

A short message from Denise

I am so sorry not to be with you today as you celebrate nursing at the wonderful RMH and the launch of the very talented Sue Sherson's book: One hundred years: one hundred nurses. I look forward to purchasing a copy on my return from Japan when I suspect I will be well and truly ready to put my feet up and enjoy a fascinating read.

It will be no surprise to anyone that knows me how important RMH has been to my career and the many friendships I made during my 16 years as the Exec Director of Nursing. Like many of my era, I commenced nursing at Albury Base Hospital as a very young and naïve 17 year old. Thinking back, I assumed a great deal of responsibility with little education under my belt and not much in the way of support over and above the 6 weeks PTS. In comparison, I am constantly impressed with the level of education graduate nurses enter our profession and the workplace today.

There are so many highlights of my time at RMH, not the least graduating a nurse in her 70s who had not been supported to graduate as she had become pregnant in her last year of training. Despite being promised she could resume her training and graduate after her baby was born which of course included being presented with an RMH badge, she was prevented from returning for her remaining 6 weeks and sent to the Epworth. I was delighted when both the Epworth and RMH agreed to recognise her time at the Epworth and we were able to present her with an original RMH graduation badge. As you can imagine there was not a dry eye throughout the graduation ceremony as this nurse stood surrounded by her family and nursing contemporaries of that year. I will always be grateful to Aileen Bennet for sourcing a badge and for the opportunity to undo some of the sadness caused to this particular nurse who had gone on to great things throughout her career.

I guess my story highlights how special the RMH is to those of you whom have trained and worked at the RMH and those that rely on the great care provided day after day, predominately by nurses. Despite the aging infrastructure, nurses continue to be the glue that holds RMH together and this was never more obvious than throughout the COVID period. What a privilege it was to work alongside them and observe their skills, courage, dedication and compassion. It was tough but enormously rewarding!

Finally, please enjoy the day and the time together reliving friendships and memories of your time training and working at RMH. I am sorry I cannot be with you and will be thinking of you on the 17th. Please give the wonderful Rodney Judson a big hug for me, it has been too long!

## ANZAC Nurses' Memorial Ceremony

It wasn't the usual Sunday before ANZAC Day ceremony, with ANZAC Day falling over the Easter long weekend, the Commemoration Ceremony was held a couple of weeks earlier. Several of our RM GNA Members attended on a warm sunny afternoon. A sombre ceremony, with many representatives from Hospitals and nursing services, paying their respects to the sacrifices and hardship these brave nurses suffered in wartime. I strongly recommend coming to a ceremony, held at the 'living memorial' on St Kilda Rd, immortalising the amazing work of Betty Jeffrey and Vivian Bullwinkel, survivors of the second world war.

## Out and About


### Road Trip 1 - Melbourne to Townsville





### Sister Dora BAYSTON

Dora Bayston was born 25 May 1884 at Prahran the daughter of Walter Smythe Bayston and his wife Mary Ellen King.

She attended Adamstown School.

In the 1909 Electoral Rolls, Dora a Nurse was living with her family in Murrumbeena Rd, Murrumbeena.

In 1912 the family were still living at Murrumbeena Rd, Murrumbeena, Dora is listed as a Nurse and her father as a Patent Agent. Dora is also listed as living at the Homeopathic Hospital in St Kilda Rd [later known as Prince Henry's Hospital] where she nursed from 1909 till 1912.

On 17 June 1915 in Melbourne Dora enlisted with No 1 Australian General Hospital and embarked from Fremantle, Western Australia, on board HMAT A62 *Wandilla* on 25 June 1915.

March 1917 - Staff Nurse Dora Bayston, daughter of

Mr. Walter S. Bayston, of Caulfield, is suffering from an attack of typhoid fever, and is a patient at the 25th Stationary Hospital. Nurse Bayston has been in the 1st Australian General Hospital, attached to the Australian Imperial Force, since the beginning of 1915, first in Egypt and latterly in France.

From 28 September till the 7 December 1919 Dora attended the Royal Sanitary Institute where she attended a Sanitary Course.

Dora returned to Australia 20 May 1920 on board HMAT A32 *Themistocles* and was discharged 12 October 1920.

In 1928 Dora was the Vice-President of the Returned Army Nurses Club.

Dora was the Matron of Marinook Private Hospital when she died on 16 August 1930 and was buried at the Brighton Cemetery in a dirt grave at Church of England B Grave 62.

### Staff Nurse Eileen BEAGLEY

Eileen Beagley was born 19 April 1895 at Carlton, the daughter of Richard Griffith Beagley and his wife Annie O'Connell.

Nurses Examination Successful Candidates. Appended is the list of candidates who passed the examination held in November 1914 under the auspices of the Royal Victorian Trained Nurses' Association: St. Vincent's Hospital. Eileen Beagley.



Eileen was a Nurse at St Vincent's Hospital, when she enlisted 27 April 1917 and embarked from Sydney, New South Wales, on board HMAT A38 Ulysses from Sydney, NSW on 9 May 1917.

*Miss Eileen Beagley, niece of Mr and Mrs C. Beagley, Nelson street, sailed for the front last week as a nurse.*

4 Aug 1917: Served at Croydon War Hospital in London. 31 Jan 1918: Posted to duty to 1st AG Hospital in France

The hospital unit appears to have returned to London just a few days later and served there until the end of the war. Details are not clear but she spent around three weeks in hospital prior to leaving England on 16 March, 1919 on board S S *Czaritja* arriving home on 15 May and discharged 10 October 1919.

**Examination Results.** Following is a list of successful candidates in the Australian Trained Nurses' Association examination: Obstetric Section. Eileen Beagley Reported in The Sydney Morning Herald (NSW: 1842 - 1954) Saturday 19 June 1920.

The Electoral Rolls show that Eileen was a nurse living at 2 Herbert Street in Northcote from 1939 – 1954 and then 1963 till 1977 at 36 Thomas Street in Hampton.

Eileen died at St Kilda on 1 December 1979 and was buried in the family grave at the Brighton Cemetery at Roman Catholic Y Grave 50

#### **Staff Nurse Annie Frances GRIFFIN**

Annie Frances Griffin was born in 1889 at Lara, the daughter of William John Griffin and his wife Julia Ann Firth.



Annie of the Geelong Hospital was listed in the results of examination that were held in November 1914 by the Royal Victorian Trained Nurses Association.

Annie was a Nurse working at the Geelong Hospital when she enlisted on 18 June 1917.

She embarked at Melbourne, Victoria aboard RMS *Somali* on 30 June 1917 arriving in Bombay 30 July 1917 and was posted to Deecan War Hospital in Poona where she became seriously ill with Diphtheria in December 1917. On 15 September 1918 she was transferred to the Station Hospital at Bangalore during which time Annie suffered from Measles in February 1918 and Influenza in August 1918. On 14 February 1919 she transferred to the Freeman Thomas Hospital in Bombay before she was invalided back to Australia on board S S *City of Cairo*.

Annie died 11 June 1922 at the Caulfield Repatriation Hospital from Pulmonary Tuberculosis and was buried in the family grave at the Brighton Cemetery at Church of England ZA 2502.

## Share Your Story

My nursing journey began at the crossroads of the profession. Group 2/85 saw the end of team nursing, pan room duties of the junior nurse, implementation of a career structure, budget cuts causing ward closures and abolition of the iconic apron and hat. My first ward (5West) was the only place where I had the privilege of learning from RCH senior nurses, the art of team nursing. We were also responsible for washing bed units, transferring patients to discharge lounge, running the steam sterilizer, doing pharmacy and blood bank errands and making up Biogram solution (200ml bottle in 20 litres of water)? As a junior PTS, the checking of drugs was prohibited, but I found myself being herded to assist Sr Lim on a drug round. I protested, stating my lack of drug skills, but in the end... you just don't say "no" to Sr Lim. We were at the 3rd bedside when a nurse admin Sister walked in to get the handover for staffing purposes. Sr Lim immediately said to her "You have to give me more staff". (Pointing at me), she then said, "I only have a PTS nurse to do the drug round with". The admin Sister offered to check the drugs, but she was sent packing to review staffing levels.

My second ward was 6 North, I had a real baptism of fire as entry into nursing. The two most "feared" Charge Nurses, by student standards, in my first 2 wards. I think reputation was only that. I personally loved working under these 2 incredible women. I credit them both with great teachings of routine, work ethic, knowledge imparted, and high standards of nursing care. Sr Orr was so compassionate about her patients, and we took bowls of water and clean towel to all on bedrest, before the breakfast trolley came. Sr Orr even looked after a patient herself, who had had post op complications. Just so long as you did your work, you were in uniform, your hair was off your collar and your patient units were tidy, you got Sr Orr's approval.

My 3rd ward was 2West. My first Christmas at the RMH. It was so much fun. The Doctors dressed up as Santa and carried 2 sacks of gifts to visit every patient. One of my patients was an elderly Egyptian man, who had a R) CVA, but he also had a left below knee amputee. This gorgeous man spoke no English and never had visitors. He was so excited to get a visit from Santa, until he opened the gift. His elation turned to tears. He had picked a pair of socks out of the sack!

My stint in the OR, was during the entirety of the 1986, 8-week nurses' strike. I was not a union member at that point, so worked during the strike. We only had 2 "emergency" theatres open, so I saw basically everything. Open heart, neuro, abdominal, skin, orthopaedic, head and neck surgery. I ended up with 22 scrubs (most struggled to get the mandatory 15), including 7 majors. I scrubbed for a laparotomy, also 1.5 hours in the middle of a 6-hour neck dissection op. The RN was too tired to continue and needed a nap. We also saw the Pope drive past the RMH, in his Pope mobile, mid surgery one day. I also learnt that a lot of surgeons

asked for music whilst operating, one neurosurgeon commonly asked for "Rolling Stones". I was also fortunate to witness Dr Victor Chang operate to take a donor heart. I was assisting the anaesthetist for that one. The background history to the young man who lost his life that night, was heartbreaking..

The introduction of keyhole surgery and renal transplantation was around that era. My eyes were wide open, eager to learn and expand my nursing knowledge. Two-day tenure in CSSD finally caught up with me after I sat finals. The CSSD staff couldn't believe they had a third year in their midst. I had been encouraged to put funny notes in swab packets and put more or less than the obligatory 6 swabs in, but I was too much of a goodie 2 shoes. I recall pretending to be a 2nd year nurse when I had just earned 3 stripes. I thought somehow I would get easier patients to look after, but it didn't really work. In their eyes, senior nurses meant senior nurses...2nd or 3rd year. I was allocated the young policeman who had been victim in the Russell St Police bombing. It took nearly all day to do his wound dressings alone. I managed to dodge 6 weeks of night duty in my training. Most had 16 weeks, I had 10! I spent an extra week in 1 N, an extra week in ED, as well as nights in ED, As an RN, my first in charge shift was in my first week. That would never happen these days. Being an RMH student was such a privilege. I loved the experience, the people, and carving out my young adult life there.

I commenced in 184 bright eyed and excited. The 3 years of studying and working full time were tough, however foundations of basic nursing care were drummed into us and remain with me today.

I remember the first Sun afternoon, we had to meet in the "piano room" to learn how to put together our uniform.

We all lived in the nurses quarters (I was on the 9th floor), but I rang home every night for the first 3 weeks begging to come home.

Loads of fun and friends were made.

I went on to be a midwife, medical sales rep, state sales manager, Nurse Unit Manager, DON and in 2009 a Nurse Practitioner. I worked for myself for 13 years as a NP before being employed by a large national aged care provider. I now specialise in aged care and palliative services.

Nursing has taken my around Australia and I have loved every minute of it.

I remember on 4 nth which was a medical ward we had a gentleman in his mid 80's who had Dementia and did not speak a word of English. It was back in the days when Drs wore suits on ward rounds.

This morning the Drs arrived for their rounds. The patient

disappeared into his room and came out of his room dressed in a suit. We did not even know he had one. He followed the doctors around the ward offering his opinion in Italian. At one point one of the Drs turned to him and asked him what he thought.

It took some quick thinking and distraction to prevent him leaving the ward and continuing to follow the Drs on their rounds.

We weren't so lucky a couple of weeks later when he managed to abscond from the ward. We were getting very worried when after 3 hours he was returned by the police after taking a trip to St Kilda. I wonder what he got up to whilst he was gone !?

## Remembering Wendy Harris (Johns) 24/04/1931 - 02/05/2025

Wendy completed her Intermediate Certificate at Griffith High School in 1948. Her working career began at 'Georges' in Collins Street, Melbourne, in the model frock workroom, perhaps reminiscent of 'Ladies in Black'. As too young to commence general nurse training Wendy entered the Ear, Nose and Throat nurse program at the Victorian Eye & Ear hospital. Successfully completing this course & a year older, she commenced General Nurse training at the Royal Melbourne Hospital in late 1949 & completed a staffing year once qualified, following in the footsteps of her sister Yvonne who graduated in 1947.

Wendy made lifelong friends during her time at 'the Melbourne' & is now survived by just 4 of her 1949 compatriots.

After completing their staffing year Wendy and Elaine Duncan, a friend from the same PTS, took up positions as sisters at the Wimmera Base Hospital in Horsham. They drove to Horsham in 'Gert', Wendy's 1926 Rugby, deciding upon Horsham because Wendy's sister Yvonne lived there at the time and the town had a golf course. While they had originally planned to save money to travel abroad Wendy met & married a local wheat farmer and Elaine returned home to Melbourne.

Settling on a farm at Dooen, 10 miles north of Horsham, Wendy had 4 children and became immersed in rural life, caring for her family, enjoying lots of sewing and craft work, moving sheep, at harvest time carting wheat to the Dooen & Jung silos & occasionally further afield to the 'stick shed' at Murtoa.

Volunteering for the Red Cross, Wendy worked in the Blood Bank in Horsham in the mid 1960's. As her children grew older, reflecting the changing role of women in society Wendy returned to work part-time as a nurse in the 70's, initially at Minyip & subsequently at the Murtoa Hospital. While her work financed much of our later school years, which she valued, through work Wendy established friendships with other nurses which continued beyond retirement - concurrent to valued friendships from her time at the Melbourne.
