Insights on Human Trafficking Documentary

During the pandemic in 2019, SI of Grosse Pointe & SI of Greater Macomb Human Trafficking committees got together and decided to use the only venue we had at our disposal, Zoom. The two Human Trafficking committees agreed to collaboratively create six videos with community leaders and experts discussing the ever-present issues of human trafficking. The interviews were shown to club members during January in observance of National Slavery and Human Trafficking Awareness Month. Both clubs have these interviews posted on their websites: www.grosspointesoroptimist.org & www.si-greatermacomb.org/ In 2020 the collaborative Human Trafficking Committee members unanimously voted to create a documentary by gathering the most relevant points from the six video interviews we had created in 2019. With a generous donation and funding from both SI clubs, we created a 28-minute documentary entitled *Insights on Human Trafficking*. 

Be not dismayed, for I am thy God. I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness."

Her deep and abiding faith is the core of Ruby's life and it led her to evolve from cocoon to butterfly, which she sees as a thing of beauty. This beauty opened her life to becoming a minister in the Assembly of God Church and led her to being involved in small business development, retreats for young women, premarital counselling and a variety of other activities reaching out to women and girls, especially to those who are disadvantaged.

Ruby is also the mother of two daughters, Tamika, a real estate broker in St. Louis, and Charita, who works for Milwaukee County Child Protective Services, aiding neglected and abused children. "She is the children's guardian angel," Ruby said.

She also has five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Ruby was born and raised in Gary, Ind., where she received what she termed "the divine assignment" to care for her parents and, as the eldest, to care for her seven brothers and sisters as well.

She came to Milwaukee in 1972. Here she graduated from Alverno College in 1988 in professional communications and in 1999 she earned a masters degree in education and ministry at Cardinal Stritch College.

After 27 years working for the telephone company through its many name changes she took early retirement in 2000 to pursue her desire to directly help women. She founded the non-profit Business Educational

SI of Milwaukee

Consortium Inc. (BECI), specializing in startup women- and minority-owned small business workshops and supplier diversity training. She works to provide opportunities to the disadvantaged.

In spring of 2022 she plans to host an awards banquet on behalf of Business Educational Consortium, Inc., for minority- and womenowned small businesses called Operation Butterfly—The Unsung Entrepreneur. Her favorite inspirational quote is "Business, Marriage and storytelling are like butterflies, they turn into beautiful things when you least expect." Ruby enjoys teaching children Bible stories through story-telling, much in the mode of Jesus, whom she called the master story-teller.

When Ruby learned about SI Milwaukee through Monica Phillip, both members of the Milwaukee Northshore Rotary Club, she decided to join Soroptimist "because I like positive people," she said. "And I try to stay connected. I like to know what's going on." Ruby is a life-long learner, and, she said, she tries always to remain drama-free.

When she can find some spare time, Ruby enjoys reading, with the Bible being her No. 1 choice, but also including romance and adventure novels. She watches action movies on Netflix and adores theater outings to see comedies and the musicals such as "Hamilton" and "Black Nativity."

But most of all Ruby feels that in this life "Love is my mission."

SI of Chicago



DIBI Sisters by Chance Takes Field Trip to ISU

As a culminating activity for a four-session adapted *Dream It Be It* (DIBI) program cosponsored with Western Avenue Community Center (WACC), Bloomington-Normal Soroptimists arranged a field trip to Illinois State University. The trip started at ISU's Career Services Center where the girls had their picture taken by the sign *Your Future Starts Here*. Naming themselves *Sisters by Chance* this group of girls met with Pamela Cooper, Director of Career Services who engaged them in a discussion about preparing for college and what they could do to begin that process. This was followed by a tour of the ISU campus by Assistant Professor of Accounting, Lacey Bordewick. Becky Mentzer, an accompanying Soroptimist noted ". . . it was like you could see these girls realizing they could be on a college campus themselves one day."

Under the leadership of WACC staff, Terri Cannon, Soroptimists conducted a 4 session *DIBI* program with middle-school girls at Western Avenue CC. The sessions included developing Dream Boards, journaling their dreams, and meeting with career professionals . . . concluding with the field trip. One of the activities was for the girls to "rap about your life and your dreams of who you want to be". One Soroptimist noted "when we asked these *Sisters by Chance* to write and perform their raps they brought tears to your eyes with how honest and powerful they could be."

Another work day is planned in January. Each year we also adopt a family for Christmas. This year's family is well cared for--lots of toys, gift cards, and essentials are on the way, thanks to generous members and our shopping Santa, Denise Wartgow.

We also participated recently in a new event for us: Festival of Trees/Christmas in the Village, brought to our attention by Terri Jacobson. Our town has a historical village, featuring the Galloway House, a church, a school, a hairdresser, an apothecary, and more. Our chairs Dez Grin and Dawn Nelson are hard at work with their subcommittees. They will be adding some features like an online portion of the silent auction as well as drive-through to-go chocolate sample boxes for those who are still needing to steer clear of large gatherings. They're also doing a limited number of landmark ornaments exclusive to the event. On Friday evening clubs celebrated our first 100 years by telling our stories. Part of our story is that District IV Director Abby Bouton is the granddaughter of the fabulous Juanita Bouton who never missed a meeting in 20 years, always arrived early and left late to set up and take down the flags in our meeting room. Juanita also furnished chicken and made noodles and festooned the cafeteria tables with her prize-winning dahlias when we served great food in the JVS Cafeteria at our Antique Shows in the 70s and 80s. Juanita's spirit and creativity live on in Abby and we are delighted to claim our relationship to her. We can do this if individual members contribute. Other possibilities include individual one-time extraordinary gifts, and asking for donations beyond our clubs. Remember that the money we donate comes back to our clubs in the form of awards and club grants.


