The 2025 parade will feature two Ceremonial Redwood Dugout Canoes honoring Elder Native American Veterans. Traditionally, these sleek river dugouts were hand-carved with elk horn. They were used for fishing salmon and sturgeon, the White Deerskin Dance and the Boat Dance along the Klamath and Trinity rivers. Wood-carving master George Wilson created the dugout canoes you see today.




