BRADS participated in the Annual RCGC Fall Plant Sale on September, 17, 2022. 2022 Award Winners from the American Hemerocallis Society Julie Covington

Some of you may already be aware of the 2022 Awards winners, which are announced each year in late October. This topic has been of interest to me for many years, going back to those early years of daylily collecting when I'd buy based upon the awards list, to the years serving as Awards Chair for AHS, to now, still a member of the Awards Committee and serving as a garden judge since 2000. Garden judges are the people who vote on the awards each year, so I still am interested in seeing whether any that I voted for won!

This year, voting for the Stout Medal, the top cultivar award, was especially tough as two of my absolute favorite garden plants were on the ballot, 'Isabelle Rose' and 'Mean Green.' Isabelle Rose (LaPrise '09) prevailed, and it is truly an exceptionally beautiful garden plant. Registration data lists it as "pale yellow diamond dusted with green throat." Here it bleaches out to a creamy off white. It's a dormant diploid, registered at 59" with 7" UF cascade blooms. It has beautiful branching and budding and should be widely available. Look for this one if you're after a beautiful dependable garden plant!

These three listed below won the Award of Merit in 2022. All do well here.

1. **Hat's Off to Sue** (T. Herrington '08) Sev Dip 25" 4" beautiful small flower Red with pink edge

2. Sebastian on Steroids (S. Elliott '12)
Sev Dip 35" 7" Peach pink double UF
3. Back to Black (Cochenour '08)
Sev UF 28" 4" near black can be color changer. This is a mid-season bloomer and absolutely lovely. It can start as a smoky brown on cool mornings and change to deep black with

heat. Highly recommend!

These are Honorable Mention winners in 2022, the first step in AHS's awards pyramid. I was thrilled to see a number of small and miniatures get deserved recognition this year. All listed do well in this climate.

1. **Dietmar's Wisdom** (D. Elliott '16) miniature – highly recommend Darth Ciduous (S. Elliott '17) small flower – vivid coloring
Little Peanut (E. Winniford '85) oldie but gorgeous miniature
Little Ricky (Cochenour '13) small UF – highly recommend
Tim's Poetry (Netherton '13) wonderful miniature
great plant habits
Elfin Blues (G. Stamile '16) recent club plant! Miniature
Harper Lee (Netherton '14) small flower, drop dead gorgeous
Tender is the Night (D. Elliott '14) beautiful UF, vivid colors

Specialty Awards are given to the top daylilies in classifications according to form, size, or bloom season. These winners grow here and all do well. Wayne and Coral's Love by Mary Netherton won the Donn Fischer Award for best miniature, and Dietmar's Wisdom (mentioned above) also won the Annie T. Giles Award for best small flower. Ghost Ranger was named best spider for 2022, Opa Klaus, best double; Darth Ciduous, best early season bloom; and One Eye Willie, best eyed cultivar. We are open to suggestions about what could be added to our website and encourage members to reach out to Meg with ideas.


Macaroni and Cheese

8 ounces Pasta* 2 cups Grated Extra Sharp Cheddar (8 Oz Pkg.)** ¹/4 cup Butter ¹/4 cup Flour 2 cups Milk 1 teaspoon Salt 1/8 teaspoon Pepper

Preheat: 375°F

- 1. Cook pasta and drain.
- 2. Grate cheese using medium blade in food processor.
- 3. Melt butter, whisk in flour, whisk in milk, and add salt and pepper. Cook, whisking, until thickened.
- 4. Dump in the pasta and the cheese. Mix thoroughly with a spatula.
- 5. "Pam" a 2 quart casserole and scoop the mixture into it. ***
- 6. Bake 20 minutes, or until the top is golden and the whole thing is bubbly.



* As a rule, I use corkscrews, rather than boring elbows. However, sometimes I see some really cute pasta in seasonal shapes, and those make a pretty casserole. Just be sure to weigh it to get half a pound of pasta.

** I use Cabot Extra Sharp Vermont cheese. No orange dye. I grate it in my food processor. These days I seem to find it only at WalMart, but sometimes you see the really big blocks of it at other stores.

*** Dane and I like spicy food, so I often shake cayenne on the top if it's just for us. If I am taking mac and cheese to a potluck, I sprinkle on some paprika. Adds nothing to the casserole, to be sure, but it's pretty.

October 8, 2022 BRADS Meeting Minutes

President Pro-Tem Julie Covington convened the meeting 12:52 and welcomed all members, as well as our speaker Melodye Campbell. The minutes of the July 9, 2022 meeting were approved as read.

Reports:

The Treasurer's report, which had been emailed and mailed to the membership earlier, required no adjustments. Kyle asked that members please submit their receipts for reimbursement, as needed.

Vice Presidents Nancy B. Jones and JoAnne Astin said they appreciated all the compliments and kind emails about our auction last month. They asked that members be thinking about what they would like for next year, and let them know as soon as possible because the lists from growers will be coming out this fall. They also noted that Elnora had brought in her P4M plants and they will be auctioned at a later date.

Shirley Jarusek, Chair of Plant Sales, said she had heard from Tracy Tuttle of RCGC, and that they would like suggestions for how to improve the next sales. It was noted that people seem to be unaware that fall is an excellent time to plant perennials, so perhaps pre-sales would help promote that idea. Shirley said that she took home all the daylilies that were donated for that sale and has, thanks to donations of pots from Mike's Country Store, she has potted them and will have them for our next sale. It was determined it would be a good idea to have a way to acknowledge that gift at the sale.

Barb Putney, Co-Editor of the Newsletter, reminded members that the next deadline will be at the end of October, and they plan to have the newsletter out the first week of November. Julie requested that Meg submit information about our new website. Pictures, stories, recipes, articles – all are welcome.

New Business:

Julie verified that the nominating committee consisted of Lynne Victorine, Shirley Jarusek and Meg Swecker. She reminded us that we need a president to serve in an unexpired term of one year. The committee will present the slate in November, with voting in December so that the new president can begin in January.

The display garden is a concern that needs resolution. The executive board had three motions they wished to present:

1. The Executive Board moves that BRADS form a small committee to bring recommendations to the club about the future of the club bed at the January 2023 meeting; specifically, to recommend whether to continue with name tags, recommendations about which plants to sell, what to remove, and ideas about how to reduce the garden to manageable size.

Following discussion, the motion passed unanimously and President Covington appointed Shirley Jarusek and Nancy Jones as co-chairs.

2. The Executive Board moved that BRADS offer Shirley Jarusek the Stout Medal collection currently housed at RCGC in our club garden with all winners from 1950- early 2000s, to add to the historic Display Garden at Richfield in Salem, which she curates. We request that these plants be moved by November 1, 2022.

During discussion it was noted that this could be an unreasonable deadline, so the motion was amended to reflect a change in date from November 1, 2022 to June 1, 2023. The motion to amend was approved unanimously, and the amended motion was then approved unanimously.

3. The Executive Board moved that BRADS, with regret, NOT continue to maintain the John Euchler Garden as an AHS Display Garden to 2023. Following discussion, which centered upon the current condition of the garden and the hopes that a renewal would enable the club to re-apply when the garden met the standards of an AHS Display Garden, the motion was approved unanimously.

Julie listed the remaining programs for 2022, which are Rich Howard on November 12th, and a Christmas event on December 10th.

We were again reminded to mail hard copies of minutes, treasurer's reports and newsletters to Elnora and Ray Stubbs, as well as Doris Peters. The business meeting was adjourned at 1:23 and members were treated to an excellent program on mini- and small daylilies by Melodye Campbell.
