Casa Loma.

Casa Loma

Casa Loma is a Gothic Revival castle style mansion and garden in midtown Toronto that is now a historic house museum and landmark. It was built for the financier Sir Henry Pellatt (1859-1939). In addition to his financial career Pellatt was also a noted runner, militia officer, and philanthropist. Casa Loma was supposed to be the crowning achievement of Pellatt's career. But amazingly it actually was the start of the frenzied downfall of Sir Henry Pellatt from enormous wealth to poverty. It was the reverse of what typically happens in novels by Charles Dickens where a character like Pip in *Great Expectations* (and in several other Dicken's novels) is born into poverty and then is introduced to a life of wealth under very mysterious circumstances. Pellatt's fall is a cautionary tale of overestimating your position, underestimating your major enemy, and thinking you are invulnerable.

Henry Pellatt was born in Kingston, Ontario, on January 6, 1859. He was the son of Henry Pellatt who was a very successful stockbroker in Toronto. He was educated at Upper Kingston School before joining his father in the stockbroking business. They created a father-son partnership called Pellatt & Pellatt. The younger Pellatt quickly displayed a knack for investing and he quickly began amassing an enormous fortune based on a very diverse series of investments in mortgages, loans, and insurance including the Toronto Electric Light Company of which he eventually became president. He was also a shrewd judge of investing in real estate ventures as well as mining and railroads. During this period, Pellatt garnered a reputation as a man with the Midas touch. At one time he sat on the directorships of twenty-one different

companies.

With his spectacular rise into the ranks of the über-wealthy, Sir Henry & Lady Mary also saw a concomitant rise in their social standing as well as Sir Henry's military standing. They assembled a huge art collection and became very well regarded for their generous philanthropic donations. Pellatt had enlisted as a rifleman in the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada in 1876. Like his rise in the ranks of the wealthy, he had a similar rise in the ranks of the regiment. Promotions had come in rapid order to him: provisional Lieutenant (1879), Lieutenant (1880), Captain (1883), Brevet Major (1893), Major (1895). In 1906 Pellatt became Lieutenant Colonel Commandant of the regiment and a year later he became a Colonel. His spending on the regiment was lavish: he spent huge sums of money on training & uniforms, staged socials, and resisted attempts to introduce temperance in barracks. The height of his spending came in August 1910 when he took the regiment at his own expense to the United Kingdom for military exercises that lasted into October 1910. But the crown jewel in displaying his wealth & enhanced social standing was his construction of the castle in Toronto.

Construction of Casa Loma (meaning house on a hill in Spanish) began in 1911 and the Pellatts moved into it in 1914 but it was still unfinished and remains so today. Pellatt chose his favorite architect, E. J. Lennox, to design it and he was given a bottomless budget to work with. The plan of the castle contains a square north tower above a massive entrance large enough for vehicles to pass through with an entrance into a courtyard, a round western tower of five stories and a dramatic eastern tower as well. Between them are crenellations and a multitude of chimneys. The house has one hundred rooms making it the largest private residence in Canada. It has been called a monument to unrestrained capitalism. But the Pellatts only occupied it for ten years. Sir Henry's rise turned to a precipitous decline & fall largely due to the efforts of Sir Adam Beck.

Pellatt had made a large portion of his fortune through investments in hydroelectricity. He was coasting comfortably along with these interests, also railroad & real estate investments as well. But then he became embroiled in a lengthy dispute about the future of hydroelectricity in Toronto (and in all of Canada) as well with Sir Adam Beck. Beck was a legislator who launched a campaign against the great industrialists of Canada but with a laser focus on Sir Henry Pellatt. Beck wanted to appear as a powerful knight in shining armor but as we shall see he was not really that. His slogan for his campaign was "that hydro power should be as free as air." Beck eventually became Chairman of the Hydro Electric Power Commission, a governmental body. By whipping up anti-rich sentiment (even though Beck was very wealthy in his own right) he was able to successfully appropriate Pellatt's life work & take his electric companies away from him. He also led a populist revolt to raise the taxes on Casa Loma from \$ 600.00 per year to a staggering \$12,000 per year. Pellatt's other forms of creating wealth were also undermined. Casa Loma was foreclosed on, and he & his wife had to move out. They were nearly bankrupt and


had to auction off their art collection as well as their library.

Sir Adam Beck crushed Pellatt in their dispute over the future of hydroelectricity. He was the clear winner. But Beck's authoritarian management style brought him into conflict with the people who had been his allies. His methods were investigated and questioned and found wanting. He died under a cloud of suspicion in 1925. Sir Henry Pellatt outlived him and died in 1939. He was a broken man. He lived in a room in the last few years of his life with his former chauffeur.

John O'Donnell first became a history devotee while in elementary school. He was raised in Brooklyn and frequently went to Prospect Park which has a Revolutionary War monument. He was hooked!
