


If 2020, the craziest year of our lifetime, has taught us anything it has revealed to us how important it is for us to vote on election day.

ARTIST PROFILE: Rick Hodge

The journey of Cameron Wade and Rick Hodge began decades ago with the formation of a New York band called the Long Island Funk Exchange or L.I. F.E. Wade was an energetic front man, inspired by James Brown and Sly Stone and Hodge was a Jimi Hendrix and George Clinton inspired prodigy, whose live rhythm licks and lilting solos electrified audiences. The unique feature of the band was that they wrote and performed original songs that both Wade and Hodge were a significant part of. As time passed, the band members went their separate ways and both Wade and Hodge moved to Atlanta, Georgia, where they kept performing music locally while raising families on opposite sides of the city. Their paths never crossed.

One day, while preparing for a show, Wade's drummer gave him the number of a guitar player who was needed to replace a last-minute "drop-out." After discussing the particulars of the gig, Hodge remarked, "Cameron Wade? Aren't you from New York? Didn't you have a band called L.I.F.E?" After a perplexed Wade responded "yes" to his questions, Hodge asked excitedly, "Don't you know who you're talking to? This is your guitar player!"



Following that successful gig, the duo began writing songs and have just completed a second album of r&b, pop and funk tunes entitled "Freedom Of Expression." Many say their music has not lost any of the passion that they exhibited when they first stepped onto New York stages decades earlier.

"Overload" is a song that Hodge and Wade have had a lot of fun with, first as a single, then an album version, then an extended version for their 2nd album and now a remixed shorter single of the extended vesrion is set for release. Hodge was asked how the music for "Overload" came about. "I had James Brown in my blood that day," Hodge said laughing. "I started with a strraight beat, which wasn't so much a James Brown beat, but when I whipped out my guitar and started doing a rhythm part, I said wait a minute, that's got a James Brown feet to it! -- and from there everything fell into place." When

Wade first heard the music, his message to Hodge was: "Christmas in July!" Wade's lyrics talk about the dangers of overworking without taking a break. The last two mixes combine the original song with a groove the co-writers use when performing the song live. "Overload (Thee Remix") is set for mid-July release.
