



Listener's Guide To WDAM Radio's History of Del Shannon [And Friends!]

WDAM Radio, America's greatest imaginary station, proudly presents the greatest broadcast in telecommunications history of music by and/or involving the late and legendary Del Shannon! He was an artist who influenced the careers of the Beatles, Rolling Stones, Monkees, Elvis Presley, Brian Hyland, Elton John, The Electric Light Orchestra, Dave Edmunds, Bruce Springsteen, and many others.

This is the only collection on this planet that contains every hit version ever of Del Shannon's immortal, "Runaway," as well as some of his other ultra-rare re-recordings of this song. You'll also enjoy the original hit versions of songs Del Shannon "covered." Also, here for you to hear – and nowhere else in "broadcasting land"...are songs he produced, wrote, and/or arranged for other artists – plus the original hit versions, if any, of those songs, too! We've additionally included an Elton John classic based on one of Del Shannon's more obscure hits. And there's more – enjoyable and/or rare Del Shannon album cuts and 45 rpm singles, including his final release, finished in the studio and issued in 1991, one year after he died.

Needless to say, many of these recordings retain the pops, clicks, and surface noise inherent in vinyl; our audio elves did the best they could to correct them, but that's rock 'n roll!

The WDAM Radio music archivists have also added interesting trivia about the tunes on the attached information pages for this 4-CD broadcast, including Del Shannon's hit recordings of Beatles (he had the first U.S. hit recording of a Beatles song) and Rolling Stones (he had a hit with a song they never charted) material as well as the hit version of a Monkees tune that appeared on their second album. And since Del Shannon was just as popular, if not more so, in the United Kingdom, we have also included top *Billboard* hit music chart positions and years in parenthesis after each selection for both the U.S. and the U.K.!
