06	Grass Roots	"Where Were You When I Needed You"	#28-U.S. + #12-Canada & #13-South Africa/1966	Original line-up. This is the 1966 hit, a studio recording made before there was actually a touring Grass Roots band. It was purportedly first recorded with co-writer/producer P.F. Sloan as lead vocal and then second with Bill Fulton on lead. But there is a difference of opinion on which one was on the hit single. Some people swear up-and-down that it's Fulton (and that the Sloan version was an demo) while others aver that it is Sloan on the hit.

The common CD/download reissue, as well radio, satellite, and streaming playlist version was actually the third recording of this song – a 1967 remix with Rob Grill singing lead,

08	Grass Roots	"Only When You're Lonely"	#96-U.S. + #86-Canada/1966	Second line-up.
09	Grass Roots	"Let's Live For Today"	#8- U.S. + #3-Canada, #83-Australia & #1-South Africa/1967	Third line-up: Bob Grill (lead singer), Warren Entner, Creed Bratton, & Rick Coonce – an act originally called the 13th Floor – recruited to replace the Bedouins, who quit.
09A	Rokes	"Piangi Con Me"	-/1966	The Rokes, a British band working out of Italy, first recorded the melody to <i>Let's Live For Today</i> as <i>Piangi Con Me</i> .
09B	Skope	"Be Mine Again"	-/1966	Dutch band.

09D	Drifters	"I Count The Tears"	#17-Rock & #6-R&B – U.S. + #28-U.K./1960	The Grass Roots, Rokes, and Skope versions all seem to have copied the chorus of this recording.

11	Grass Roots	"Wake Up, Wake Up"	#68-U.S.+ #18-Canada/1967	Third line-up.

13	Grass Roots	"Feelings"	–/1968	The first A-side of a Grass Roots single that was written by members of the group rather than Jeff Barri and/or P.F. Sloan. They sang it in the movie, <i>With Six You Get Eggroll</i>
14	Grass Roots	"Midnight Confessions"	#6-U.S. + #4-Canada, #18-Australia & #9-South Africa/1968	Third line-up.
14A	Ever-Green Blues	"Midnight Confessions"	–/1967	Third line-up.
15	Grass Roots	"Bella Linda"	#28-U.S. + #1-Canada & #35-Australia/1968	Third line-up. Some pressings mis-labeled as <i>Della Linda</i> .
15A	Lucio Battisti	"Balla Linda"	#17-Italy/1968	Composer.
16	Grass Roots	"Lovin' Things"	#49-U.S. + #24-Canada & #78-Australia/1969	Third line-up.
16A	Artie Schroeck	"Lovin' Things"	–/1967	Co-composer. B-side of this original 45RPM release.
16B	Marmalade	"Lovin' Things"	#6-U.K./1968	The Grass Roots version closely imitates this prior Marmalade hit version.
17	Grass Roots	"The River Is Wide"	#31-U.S. + #4-Canada/1969	Third line-up.
17A	Forum	"The River Is Wide"	#45/1967	Original hit version on the Mira label. A different version on the Penthouse label was first released in 1966.
18	Grass Roots	"I'd Wait A Million Years"	#15-U.S. + #12-Canada/1969	Third line-up.
19	Grass Roots	"Heaven Knows"	#24-U.S. + #5-Canada & #67-Australia/1969	Third line-up.
20	Grass Roots	"Walking Through The Country"	#44-U.S. + #34-Canada & #61-Australia/1970	Third line-up.
21	Grass Roots	"Baby Hold On"	#35-U.S. #20-Canada & #52-Australia/1970	A-side. Third line-up.
22	Grass Roots	"Get It Together"	–/1970	B-side. Title theme from the 1970 ABC-TV music series created by Dick Clark Productions. In the tradition of <i>American Bandstand</i> , <i>Get It Together</i> was a show where the hottest bands of the day appeared to perform their latest records in front of a live teen audience. Ran from January 3, 1970 to September 5, 1970 and was hosted by Mama Cass Elliot and Sam Riddle.
