¹⁸ I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. ¹⁹ For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷ And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. ²⁸ We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose.

Nels Ferre and his wife were members of Trinity several decades ago. He was also a great Biblical scholar. He wrote some marvelous books, and in one of those books he tells about a dream his wife had which gave him his philosophy on worrying. She was sitting at a table with pen and paper, and she had been given the task of writing down the answer to the question, "How can I quit worrying?" In her dream she wrote at great length, but when she woke up, she could remember only the three words of her outline; they were: WORSHIP, WORK, and WAIT. That's a pretty good formula: worship, work, and wait.

The going gets tough for all of us at times. Yet our lives are easy compared to St. Paul's who never lost his enthusiasm or dedication to a cause larger than himself. His faith allowed him to keep going and to overcome obstacles that confronted him. Paul's patience, persistence, perspective, prayer, and perspiration allowed him to worship, work and wait and to just keep hanging in there. And keep in mind the promise that sustained St. Paul: "I consider that the sufferings of the present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us." Christianity is about doing our best in a broken world and living in a community that welcomes us back.

Thriving churches worship, work and wait. Hang in there!

Bio:

Michael Anthony Howard has been serving as the Minister of Faith in Action since March 2019. From the wooded knobs of the Kentucky countryside, Michael is a teacher, community organizer, and prophetic Christian leader. He has taught and served around the world, including Peru, Brazil, India, Malaysia, Korea, and Ethiopia. He has also served in traditional pastoral ministry in Kentucky, Virginia, and New Jersey. Additionally, Michael has coached and co-founded several community organizations, nonprofits, and small businesses. Michael is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ and has a Master of Public Administration from Morehead State University and an MDiv from Drew Theological Seminary. During this Women's History month, The Anti-Racism Coalition at Trinity (ACT), are highlighting women of color who might not be well known but have played a role in the history of this country. This time of year, many turn their thoughts to the Spring Season and the blossoming of flowers, well my thoughts turn to my favorite sport – Baseball. I can hear the sounds of the bat hitting the ball and anticipate the roar of the crowds and the glorious baseball season begins. I would like to introduce you to Toni Stone. Many likely have not heard of her but Toni Stone was an American female professional baseball player who played in predominantly male leagues.



Toni Stone was born as Marcenia Lyle Stone on July 17, 1921, in West Virgina. Her family moved to Sanit Paul, Minnesota when Toni was 10 years old and she enjoyed playing baseball with the boys in the neighborhood. Her mother, who worried that baseball was not ladylike, bought a pair of figure skates for Toni. Although Toni performed well in city wide figure skating competitions, she had a strong interest in baseball. Toni would often skip school to play baseball. Toni's parents looking for help turned to their Catholic Priest in hope his guidance would help them steer Toni towards something else. The Priest recognizing Toni's strength as a pitcher encouraged her to try out for the Claver Catholic Church boy's baseball team in the Catholic Midget League, which is similar to today's Little League. Because it was a church activity, her parent's consented to her playing. Unfortunately, the coach of the team had no interest in cultivating Toni skills, so Toni taught herself by reading the rule books, in hope of learning how to be a better player. Toni joined the girls' softball team, HighLex, but was not satisfied with playing that sport. Still searching for instruction on playing baseball, she would show up and watch the baseball school run by the St. Paul Saints' manager, Gabby Street. At the age of 16, Toni Stone was playing weekend games with the barnstorming Twin City Colored Giants. She got paid about \$2-\$3 a game, so her parents let her play. She eventually dropped out of high school with the hope of making a living playing baseball.

In 1943, Toni moved to San Francisco where her sister lived. Making a living doing odd jobs while living in the Fillmore District, she took on the name "Toni Stone" which she felt was more fitting of her identity than "Marcenia". In 1950 she married her husband Captain Aurelious Pescia Alberga, whom she had met while working at Jack's Tavern, the first black-owned nightclub in the area. Spending time at Jack's Tavern on Sutter, Toni became friends with one of the owners, Alroyd "Al" Love. Love introduced Toni to the local American Legion Baseball team which was part of the national network of amateur baseball teams for teenagers. Although Toni was 27 years old at the time she claimed that she was 17. She played with the team from 1943 to 1945.

In 1953, she became the first woman to play as a regular on an American major-level professional baseball team when she joined the Indianapolis Clowns in the previously all-male Negro Leagues (two other women would later play on the team). Toni played second base, the position Hank Aaron played for the team before he joined the Milwaukee Braves. Toni also played for the San Francisco Sea Lions in 1949, the New Orleans Creoles from 1949 to 1952 and the Kansas City Monarchs before retiring from baseball in 1954. Toni reported that she retired from baseball because the manager of the Kansas City Monarchs barely let her play.

Throughout her playing career, team owners and manger often suggested that Toni wear a skirt on the field

because they felt it would boost attendance and she refused. It was widely reported that attendance at games increase because fans wanted to see how she would do. Toni played 50 games for the Indianapolis Clowns in 1953 and ended the season batting .243.

In 1993, Toni Stone was inducted into the Women's Sports Hall of Fame as well the International Women's Sports Hall of Fame.
