We say the words of the Lord's Prayer; "Give us this day our daily bread" whenever we gather in worship.

When we hear in the 23rd Psalm, "You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies." This doesn't mean that I get to eat and my enemies don't! The table and sharing bread were about covenant making and equal sharing in ancient Israel.

Bishop Desmond Tutu, said "I don't preach a social gospel; I preach the Gospel, period. The gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ is concerned for the whole person. When people were hungry, Jesus didn't say, "Now is that political or social?" He said, "I feed you." Because the good news to a hungry person is bread." What are you hungry for?

The rise of Christianity-offered an alternative to the world. As Paul said in Ephesians, people were united into "One New Humanity." They broke down social barriers. There is no social climbing in the household of God. No posturing. No jockeying for position at the table by disciples of Jesus, only what was for the good of the community. They were all one in Christ. "They broke bread together at a common table with glad and generous hearts." That is the description of the disciple's fellowship in the book of Acts!

Despite living in an age of technological connection many people suffer loneliness and economic insecurity at a much greater rate than previous generations. In Jesus, we see the vision of a world of abundance. May God give us eyes to see spiritual hunger in one another as we gather around the table.

August, 2023

For many years my husband Dan and I have attended the annual Edith Chase Poetry Readings at Kent State University, where Dan has been one of the readers. These readings, in conjunction with the yearly Edith Chase Symposiums on the environment (whose theme this was Rewilding Ohio), bring together poets engaged with nature and environment from northeastern Ohio and beyond.

This year the poetry reading's theme was "Songs for Wild Ohio." The five sections all addressed interesting aspects of our contact with the wild, non-human world: "Where Does the Wild Begin?," "The Wild Uneasy," "Our Wild Wetlands," "Bring Out the Children!," and "The Sacred Wild. " Every section contained outstanding poems that explored and celebrated the natural wonders of Ohio's landscape, wildlife, and natural resources. But the one section that seemed the most connected to our "creation care" concerns was "The Sacred Wild." There were so many poems and passages that I would like to share here, but for lack of space I can only provide a smattering of stanzas as examples from the collection to ponder.
