In his book "Wishful Thinking" he writes; "God was making a body for Christ, Paul said. Christ didn't have a regular body any more so God was making one out of anybody who looked as if they might just possibly do. God was using other people's hands to be Christ's hands and other people's feet to be Christ's feet, and when there was some place where Christ was needed in a hurry and needed bad, God put the finger on some maybe- not-all-that-innocent bystander and got them to go and be Christ in that place for lack of anybody better."

In the 3rd chapter of the Book of Exodus, "Moses said to God, Who am I, that I should go unto Pharaoh, and that I should bring forth the children of Israel out of Egypt?" Most of us feel this way when we are confronted with a moral dilemma. We echo the well-known words of Moses when the voice from the burning bush. Moses ran away to shepherd sheep, leaving his life in Egypt. But God called him back. Are you annoyed at interruptions to your daily plans?

Martin Luther King Jr. wasn't searching for popularity at the beginning of the civil rights movement. He intentionally took a church in Montgomery because he wanted to focus on the everyday life of the church. He went there to get away from Atlanta and the center of a political movement. But God had other plans. He ended up in the middle of the Montgomery Bus Boycott and his name was lifted up as a national civil rights leader and the rest is history. Most of the significant things that happen in this world don't come in the ways that we think they will. God's hand is always on the unlikely one.

Our faith teaches that God is no respecter of persons. You just might be in innocent bystander hanging around when God needs to do something. When God wants to move over the waters and bring change, it will happen in God's time, not ours. Like they say, "Life is what happens when we're busy making other plans."

Instead of unwanted disruptions in your day. We can become so annoyed with life's interruptions! Think about the ways that you have been chosen to be the body of Christ. In the midst of God's interruptions, "Be completely humble and gentle be patient bearing with one another in love."

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Comments:

During December we received strong contribution income of over \$37,000! We want to thank those members and friends who answered Pastor Kevan's appeal for additional donations at year-end to help us to balance the year. On the expense side, \$3,000 was spent for various mission related donations under the discretionary portion of our mission budget. Even with this spending this line was \$2808 under budget for the year. Also, OCWM donations were above budget as a result of our high income month. There were no other extra ordinary expenses for December.

As a result of our strong contribution month, we ended the year with a deficit of \$13,789 which was covered by church reserves to balance out 2021. After using those funds the church still has \$72,138 in reserves. Please note that as a result of Pastor Kevan's appeal, a few of our annual contributors will be donating approximately \$10,000 in January to partially offset the 2021 deficit. These funds will be added back to our church reserves

Associate Pastor's Message

Trinity Friends,

We are in a time of great change, and as we know, change is messy and scary and amazing all at once. How are we going to become who God called us to be? In this time, I learn from the promise of covenant through the rainbow. Here are some ways you can learn from the rainbow again (and again, and again) as the journey goes on.

Rainbows are a promise of hope. God is a God of creativity. God's self even changed - and we can change, too - before, God destroys, in the future, God ceases destruction. We can lean into the trust with a God who is so relational with humanity that they will allow God's own self to change - in a response of love.

Rainbows are God's love for us. God wishes all of us to have a place of belonging. In our time, we put a rainbow on our building and it prophetically speaks - as an Open and Affirming church, we recognize the need of LGBTQ+ people to hear the good news that all are truly welcomed in God's house. It means all people belong. Inclusivity is a principle we strive toward. We are not perfect; but we want justice for all people and belonging is a part of that.

Rainbows also show that diversity is a part of God's plan. Look at the beautiful colors out on the rainbow flag. It is more beautiful with many colors than it would be with one only. We can trust our communities of diversity are equally as beautiful to God and to each other.

This is a rainbow church. God gave Noah the rainbow and it sustained us through part 1 of COVID - even if the rainbow is not always visible, we can hear the story and bring it to mind. Hear it and its good news, wisdom, and hope again.

<u>Climate Crisis Committee</u>

I don't know if you've seen the recent film Don't Look Up. This satire contains laughs, but is also a horror story. It's about a group of scientists who determine that a planetdestroying comet is going to hit earth, but when they try to get word out, both elected officials and the news media only ignore, trivialize or, yes, try to make political and economic hay, out of the looming disaster. This Netflix film has set a new-record for the most viewing hours in a single week on this streaming service; and, just within a month of its release, it is Netflix's second most-watched film of all time.

Of course, Don't Look Up is in fact trying to dramatize how our politicians continue to deny the coming dire impact of climate change, while so many of us also try to remain oblivious as possible to the need for change in our coun-

try's big picture policies as well as in our own personal habits and lifestyles.

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To me, this is a sign that people really are worried, and also feel helpless in the face of the multiple disruptions to nature in the coming decades, including traumas to humanity itself. It's easy to not "look up," but our insistence on the creature comfort of being oblivious now will cause great pain to come.

And this film also got me thinking about a related question—how movies can change our perspectives, to cause us to have an epiphany, a realization that the world is not what we thought it was before this moment. In terms of our attitudes towards nature and our connections with it, is there a movie you remember seeing when you were a child (or maybe just a few months ago) that made such a revelation about nature come to you? If so, would you like to share your insights with us?
