

Beatrice J. Adams is an Assistant Professor of History at the College of Wooster. She received her Ph.D. in African American and African Diaspora History from Rutgers-New Brunswick in the spring of 2021. While at Rutgers, she served as a researcher for the Scarlet and Black Project and contributed to three volumes of the project's award-winning book series. She also served as a researcher for the Rise Up Newark Digital History Project—a public history project that explores the dynamics of the Modern Black Freedom Movement in the urban North. Her book in progress, "We Might as Well Fight at Home: African Americans Claiming the American South," examines the experiences of African Americans who remained in and returned to the American South during the Great Migration and the emergence of the New Great Migration. Her research has been supported by the Rutgers Center for Historical Analysis, the John Hope Franklin Center at Duke University, the Andrew Mellon Foundation, and the James Weldon Johnson Institute for the Study of Race and Difference at Emory University. She received her BA in History and Religion & Philosophical Studies from Fisk University in 2012 and her MA in Social Sciences from the University of Chicago in 2013.

Abigail Reed; Returned GMI

In July of 2021, I began working as a Global Missions Intern through Global Ministries, a joint witness in mission between the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ. This internship aims to allow young adults a chance to learn more about themselves, their relationship with God, and their place in God's world. Over the course of two and a half years, I had the opportunity to work in English ministry programs at two different placements. The world we live in is becoming more interconnected with a global mission towards compassion and understanding. By embracing the language and culture of our global neighbors, these programs set the foundations for future English language education and experiences. As a strong believer that children are the future of the church, and the world itself, witnessing the work done in these programs provided me reassurance and a sense of hope.

Since returning home, I have had the immense honor of speaking to many churches about my experiences and sharing the importance of Global Ministries' work around the world. Throughout all of these engagements, I have witnessed how powerful the love and commitment to Christ' teachings is amongst various churches within the DOC and UCC. It is this love that has made these visits both eye opening and fulfilling. It has brought me a constant reminder that God's love is strong and at work. That even when I look around me and see a world filled with anger and hate, that love and joy still exist. They exist right here in our church, they exist in this state, and they exist in this world. Being a GMI isn't always easy, it requires one to look deep inside themselves and assess not only what they need from God, but what they need from God's beloved community. The insight, passion, and beauty of this internship and the work of Global Ministries, is that we get to see all of God's world and view it with fresh eyes and a full heart.

For the past month, I have had the opportunity to work as our church's secretary. This time has provided me with a clearer understanding of the work our church is doing out in the community, and strengthened the immense respect I have for our church staff and volunteers. Trinity is a place where people feel safe to come in their times of need, and where the members and staff are able to both provide support and affirm the dignity of others; a few of the things Jesus himself stood for. Next week, I will be starting a new role at the UCC National Offices within the Global Ministries team as the program assistant for their Child and Elder Sponsorship program, as well as United Nations program. These two programs have similar goals to that of our church: affirm the dignity of others, and spark change out in the world beyond the walls of the church.

I am ecstatic for this new role I will be taking on and look forward to sharing more about it, as well as my time in Korea with all of you on **World Communion Sunday**, **October 6th!**

What can I do for you?

This phrase "What can I do for you?" is expressed many times throughout the day. Whether you are looking to buy a new pair of shoes or trying to find a certain item on a grocery store shelf, someone will ask you this question.

People ask each other "What can I do for you?" when there is a problem they would like to help with. In circumstances like a funeral, illness, emotional stress or financial need, concerned people ask this. They truly want to help but sometimes do not know how to help.

In the early 1990s, when Trinity was evaluating whether to stay as a downtown church or move out of the City, we asked the downtown "What can I do for you?". The answer was to remain downtown to provide a place for the community to gather for celebrations, meetings, educational events, meals, etc. This led to the major renovations that were done in the early 1990s. Now in 2024, Trinity needs to renovate our facilities so we can continue to be a place of community.

The same question should be asked by the congregation in regards to the renovation project Trinity is currently undertaking- "What can I do for you?". Members and friends may want to help financially but do not know to what extent they can help. It was suggested this info of financial needs for the renovation be given to you so you can decide how you want to help financially. You can see what the items or services cost and donate accordingly.

This first list contains the contractors and suppliers who have worked with the project thus far: Vince Mariola Construction Ltd, HLH Engineering Consulting LLC, EcoSeal, Tri Mark appliances, Martin Interiors, Koorsen Fire and Security and numerous sub-contractors used by Vince Mariola Construction. Everyone of these has asked the Renovation Team "What can I do for you?" and we have been working with them to do the best that we can for Trinity.

Some of these are in the Renovation Catalogue in the narthex and are included here so you can see the project's costs in its entirety. NOTE: this list does not include change orders or situations that need repaired/relocated in the process of construction.

During April our income was roughly \$6k under budget which generated a \$11k deficit which was slightly above our budgeted deficit of \$9.4k. On the expense side, utilities combined were right on budget with our electric being \$400 over and our gas \$400 under budget. Our other expenses were in line with projections.
