Philippians 4:8 is one of my favorite bible verses, "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable--if anything is excellent or praiseworthy--think about these things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me--put it into practice." -St. Paul.

We are in the middle of Lent. Lent is a time to reflect on the life and teachings of Jesus. Life is richer when we take time for discernment. Albert Schweitzer called it "reverence for life". We need reverence in life and bring to God those things that humble us. We have been humbled during this pandemic. We hardly imagined that our lives could be altered so deeply by one virus. Yet for decades some people spoke loudly about our need to be prepared for such an event. As Ash Wednesday's Ashes symbolized, Lent reminds us of our mortality and this pandemic has been its wake up call.

How do you process a number as staggering as 500,000 COVID-19 deaths in the United States?

The number is 25 percent more than the U.S. military death toll in World War II. It would be like imagining every person in a city the size of Atlanta had been lost. Or every postal service worker in America. National Geographic tried to graphically visualize the number of COVID deaths in America, because a number as large as 500,000 is hard for us to imagine. It translates into 645 miles of caskets spread end to end or a hundred times more than all the stars visible to the naked eye, according to National Geographic's visual journalists.

When we get to the other side of this pandemic and this time of isolation, join us in observance of reverence for those who died and those who suffered, and those who mourned. We become more aware of the nature of life and our place in God's eternity. Think about these things.

Comments: We start off 2021 operating basically the same financially. We continue to run under budget with both income and expenses. During January we paid waste management \$185 as we upgraded to a lockable dumpster.

Due to the late mail delivery we received \$5,180 in donations for 2020 after our books were closed. With these donations, our deficit for 2020 went from \$14,033 to \$8,853. We added these donations to our church reserves. Members were given credit on their 2020 statements as the mail was delayed.

ACT: Anti-Racist Coalition at Trinity

The journey to civil and human rights for all is lined with barriers, but we are called to address these challenges by opening our eyes and minds to the possibilities of a better world. It was through this mission, this calling to understand, that members of our congregation were called to A.C.T. At first, those members sought a safe space to discuss the events of the summer of 2020. They gathered seeking knowledge of the issues that were being discussed in public and at home around the dangers of white nationalism and systemic inequality. This safe space led a group of faith-based individuals, invested in growing, to propose forming a Trinity UCC coalition with the mission of dismantling the systems and structures of institutional racism. The group strives to learn about the way these systems are perpetuated in daily life and how we as a congregation can work together to create an equitable and just world for all. It was through this mission that A.C.T. (Anti-Racist Coalition at Trinity) was formed. Building off of the UCC's statement on racial justice, A.C.T. intends to educate members of our community, motivate each other to be open minded, and advocate for the civil and human rights of all people. We welcome all persons who feel called to have an open dialogue and engagement with the truth to join us in the pursuit of justice. It is to this end that we encourage anyone who wishes to participate, or learn more about A.C.T., to reach out and help make this group into what our congregation has been to all of us; a space for growth, love, and understanding.
